



For the information of persons be onging to Newfoundland who propose to go to the United States of America, notice is hereby given that the Immigration Laws of the United States, which came into effect on the first May last;

1.-That all aliens entering the United States shall pay a tax of \$8, but children under sixteen years of age, accompanying their father or their mother, shall not be subject to such tax. In the Ignorance is case of persons not remaining sixty days in the United States, the said tax will be returned upon their leaving the country.

3.-Amongst other classes of aliens not admitted into the United States are the following:-Idiots, insane, epileptic, paupers, those physically defective and children under sixteen who are C. E. Russell, Publisher, unaccompanied.

Cases have been brought to the notice of the Government where Newfoundlanders for one or other of the above reasons have been refused admission to the United States, and much disappointment Indigestion and inconvenience, as well as expeuse, has been the result.




