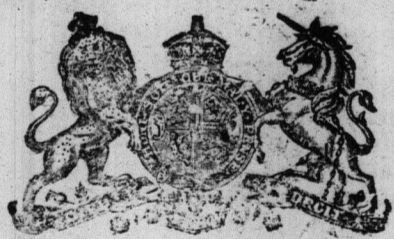

NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Canada, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Bay.

Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Labrador Fishery News

The S.S. Thetis, Capt. Burgess, arrived at St. John's five o'clock Tuesday afternoon from Labrador. Her fishery news is not over encouraging, as there is only one section of the coast on which the fishery is good. The Thetis went as far north as Hopedale.

There is a good sign of fish at Cape Harrison and as far north as Hopedale. No reports were heard from further down the coast. At Grady there was nothing doing, but since the ship came south we hear there is a good sign of fish there.

From Indian Harbor to Flat Island there is good fishing. Venison Islands, Snug Harbor, Dead Islands and Francis Harbor it was nearly a blank. At Battle Harbor there was good fishing.

At Bateau they are getting all the fish they can handle.

From Indian Tickle to Sandy Islands they are doing all they like with the fish.

At Macovic there is a good sign of fish striking in and they were doing fairly well. There was no fish at the time the Thetis was coming south.

At Ragged Islands, which is only a short distance south of Macovic, a sick man was taken on board at Bolster's Rock and landed at Carbonear. Ice bergs are numerous along the coast, and dense fog was encountered all along even almost up to the narrows. Passengers and crew say that Capt. Burgess is a most careful mariner and knows every inch of the coast. He is a worthy successor to Capt. Parsons than whom there was no better Labrador pilot in the country.

NEWS IN A LINE

The sum of \$2,450.00 has been voted by the House for fuel and light supplies for constabulary and fire halls, and under the heading of "Administrative of Justice," \$354.32 as additional aid to fire dept. Does this latter refer to the fire dept. at Bay Roberts?

Mr. Eli Mercer (of Chas.), has been appointed Inspector of Weights and Measures for Bay Roberts, Shearstown, Country Road and Coley's Point, in place of Mr. Thomas Calpin, deceased.

Naval Reservist James Thompson, of Coley's Point, who has been serving in the Navy ever since the war broke out, and who was granted a month's furlough, returned to his duties on Thursday last. He holds the rank of gunnery instructor. Reservist Thompson was on board a battleship at the Dardanelles when a large number of his mates were killed and wounded by shells from the Turkish forts. He escaped with a slight wound in the leg.

Increase Revenue By \$305,000,000

Washington, June 30.—Excess profits will contribute \$730,000,000 toward the war tax now being formulated by the Senate finance committee, if Congress approves the committee's recommendation, made to day. This sum is \$305,000,000 annually more than is now raised by the 8 per cent tax on excess profits. The present excess profits law is repealed and the following substituted, as recommended by the committee:

That in addition to the tax under existing law, there shall be levied for each taxable year upon the income of every corporation, partnership, or individual a tax upon the amount of the excess profits. Not in excess of 15 per cent, in excess of 15 per cent, and not of 25 per cent, 10 per cent, in excess of 25 per cent, 10 per cent, 20 per cent, and not of 50 per cent, and not of 75 per cent, 25 per cent, in excess of 75 per cent, and not of 100 per cent, 30 per cent, in excess of 100 per cent, and not of 150 per cent, 35 per cent, and in excess of 150 per cent, 40 per cent.

The Senate committee's decision would increase the revenue possible under the House bill levy on excess profits \$305,000,000.

Man Killed At Bell Island

A sad accident occurred in number one shop of the Dominion plant Friday morning, July 13th, in which Denis Power, of Shearstown, was killed. The young man was engaged driving the air hoist, and must have left his position at the throttle to make some repairs while engine was in motion. His clothes evidently got caught in the winding rope which carried him over the drum, and crushed him to death.

The remains were brought over from the Island on Saturday, and the funeral took place Sunday morning last, Rev. Dr. Whelan, P. P., officiating.

Deceased was a son of Michael and Sarah Power, and was only 17 years of age. We trust a strict enquiry will be made into the cause of the accident.

The attention of the Public is called to Section 32 of the Post Office Act, 1891, which provides that the P. M. Newfoundland Patriotic Association Employment Committee

The Employment Committee has been appointed by the Newfoundland Patriotic Association "to take into consideration applications for employment of Soldiers and Sailors of the Newfoundland Regiment and Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve who have been granted honourable discharges." The Committee can only perform this duty to our returned soldiers and sailors with the fullest help and co-operation of all those in the Colony who employ labour or require help or service of any kind in which these men may be employed. The Committee will prepare and keep on file a register of all men seeking employment, giving their age, qualifications and experience, so far as possible, of each applicant. This information will be available to prospective employers, and steps will be taken to bring about interview or correspondence between employers and soldier or sailor applicants. Every person or firm when requiring such help for either domestic or business purposes is therefore invited to communicate to the Committee the nature of the help required, and of the work to be done, and such other information as may be useful.

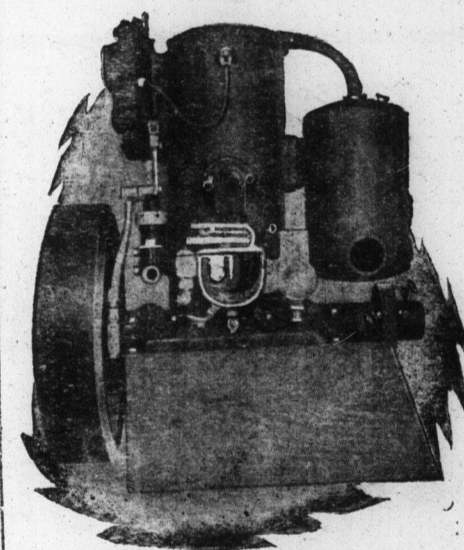

House of Assembly, 1917

Official Synopsis of Debates

THURSDAY, June 21.

MR. COAKER noticed that there were less than twelve members present, and demanded that the rules be adhered to.

The Chairman of Committees sent out, and sufficient members coming into the House, the debate proceeded.

MR. JENNINGS, referring to the Premier's visit to England, asked whether the Imperial Conference had considered the question of preferential tariffs with Newfoundland and other colonies. He was not sure whether it would be practicable or not. He should require to raise revenue from some other source, if we reduced tariffs. He hoped, however, that something might be done to develop our trade with other parts of the Empire, instead of with foreign countries. He then turned to the Estimates, and discussed the bay steamer services, including that performed by the "Earl of Devon," and the St. George's Bay Service. He referred to the report of the Inspector of Logging Camps. He thought the Inspector must have let it be known that he was coming, with the result that the camps were prepared for his visits. He should start work earlier in the season. He said that the Horwood Lumber Company, though a subsidiary concern, and also another neighbouring mill, had been taking timber from Thwart Island, in the Exploits, which was supposed to be reserved for fishery purposes; and desired to know what the Government intended to do in the matter. He thought the Reid-Newfoundland Co. ought to be compelled to keep the spark-arrestors and fireboxes of their engines in better order. It appeared from the Fire Patrol Report that 21 fires had been put out by the Fire Engine No. 21 in one day. It was sad to see the amount of splendid timber land along the railway which had been burnt over. He hoped the herring fishery in Green Bay would be supervised better than in the past.

MR. LLOYD said it was an outrage on the Opposition members that they should be kept in the dark as to whether there was to be an election or not. Why was not the Colonial Secretary placed on duty by preparing to take the voters list? He said the Colonial Secretary had no right to be in the House while he was receiving pay as Deputy Chief Censor. He demanded that a salary ought to be paid to the Prime Minister. It was not in keeping with the dignity of the House that the Prime Minister should be doing his work without a salary. He, Mr. Lloyd, would vote for an adequate salary for the Prime Minister. He also considered that the Ministers ought to be paid more than \$2,000.00. This amount was very small compared to those paid in other Colonies of our own size. Ministers ought to be paid adequate salaries and forbidden to take any other payment. The officers of the Department depended on the ability of the Minister and if the Government wanted competent heads they must pay for them.

The committee rose until tomorrow. The House adjourned until tomorrow at 3 p.m.

FRIDAY, June 22nd.

The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.

The Legislative Council's amendments to the Death Duties Bill were read a second time and concurred in. The House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply.

MR. LLOYD repeated that under any circumstances would the Opposition assent to any extension of the life of Parliament. He repeated also his remarks of yesterday, that the Premier ought to resign a salary and that Ministers of the various Departments should receive larger salaries, so that they may not be tempted to

MONDAY, June 25th.

The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.

Petitions were presented by Min. of Marine & Fisheries, Mr. Currie, Mr. Lloyd.

Various questions were asked and answered.

The Bill relating to the Volunteer Force and the Estates of Soldiers and Sailors Bill, passed them and rose.

The House adjourned to Monday at 3 p.m.

TUESDAY, June 26th.

The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.

Various questions were asked and answered.

On the motion to go into Committee of the Whole on Supply, Mr. Lloyd moved, and Mr. Clift seconded an amendment, calling upon the Government to state whether it was the intention to extend the life of Parliament.

MR. CLIFT said that if it were the intention to do so, he, for one, could not support it. He thought that even if there were unanimous consent, it would be a very doubtful precedent to extend Parliament, while, if it were done by a party vote, it would be unprecedented.

On a division, the amendment was lost, and the House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply.

MR. COAKER discussed various items very shortly as they went through. Several members commented on the inequality of the salaries of Deputy Ministers of Departments.

MR. LLOYD, Mr. Coaker, and others, repeated that the Prime Minister ought to receive a salary equal to that of the Deputy Ministers.

MR. COAKER suggested a salary also for the leader of the Opposition, as is done in Canada.

MR. CLIFT and MR. COAKER pressed these officials' precedents as a good deal in fees, which added to their remuneration.

MR. COAKER suggested that the Deputy Minister of Fisheries, and of Agriculture and Mines, should all receive \$1,500, instead of \$1,200.

MR. MINISTER OF FINANCE said these officials' precedents were a good deal in fees, which added to their remuneration.

MR. LLOYD strongly endorsed this. The Opposition would support any measure necessary to bring such a result about.

MR. GRIMES was of the same opinion. He also said that the Government ought to adopt the precedents laid down by the Postmaster-General in his report in relation to the salaries of public officials.

Published by Authority

For the information of persons belonging to Newfoundland who propose to go to the United States of America, notice is hereby given that the Immigration Laws of the United States, which came into effect on the first May last, provide:

1.—That all aliens entering the United States shall pay a tax of \$8, but children under sixteen years of age, accompanying their father or their mother, shall not be subject to such tax. In the case of persons not remaining sixty days in the United States, the said tax will be returned upon their leaving the country.

2.—All aliens over sixteen years of age, who cannot read the English language, or some other language, will not be permitted to enter.

3.—Amongst other classes of aliens not admitted into the United States are the following:—Idiots, insane, epileptic, paupers, those physically defective and children under sixteen who are unaccompanied.

Cases have been brought to the notice of the Government where Newfoundlanders for one or other of the above reasons have been refused admission to the United States, and much disappointment and inconvenience, as well as expense, has been the result.

The House adjourned to-morrow at 8 p.m.

WEDNESDAY, June 27th.
The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.

Various questions were asked and answered.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply.

MR. GRIMES attacked the Government's Agricultural Policy. In his opinion, any increase in the amount of agricultural produce was due to natural causes, not to the MR. DEVEREUX defended the agricultural societies.

He showed some of the difficulties which agricultural societies had to contend with. One of their greatest difficulties was partisan criticism.

MR. DOWNEY repeated that potatoes were being cultivated in increased quantities, only because the price had gone up.

MR. COAKER asked how the Agricultural Commissioners could take credit for increasing the production of meat since all they had done was to send out a few bulls, etc., to improve the breed. He read out extracts from a large number of reports of agricultural societies in which it was stated that cattle were not increasing. He advocated the setting of small groups of farmers in suitable places along the railway line.

MR. DOWNEY pointed out that, although in certain places there might be an immense amount of unused pasture, the people could only keep as many cattle as the acreage under cultivation would enable them to provide winter forage for. The number of cattle kept could not increase very greatly until the acreage of cultivation increased. The quality and size of the animals had, however, improved substantially. He thought that a certain amount of wheat might be grown on the West Coast.

The Committee occupied most of the afternoon in reading and passing the Estimates. Various members discussing briefly across the table various items as they arose. The Committee rose at 6.30 and reported progress, and asked leave to sit again to-morrow.

The House adjourned to-morrow at 8 p.m.

THURSDAY, June 28th.
The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.

Various questions were asked and answered.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply.

The Committee occupied most of the afternoon in reading and passing the Estimates. Various members discussing briefly across the table various items as they arose. The Committee rose at 6.30 and reported progress, and asked leave to sit again to-morrow.

The House adjourned to-morrow at 8 p.m.

FRIDAY, June 29th.
The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.

Various questions were asked and answered.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply. A number of votes were read, various members commenting briefly on various items.

The Committee then rose and reported progress and asked leave to sit again to-morrow.

The Premier moved second reading of a bill to prevent the keeping of collie dogs in St. George's District. Collie dogs there had lost their training and had become mongrels in many cases, and were now injurious to sheep-raising.

MR. LLOYD suggested that if there were still any properly trained sheep dogs in the District they should be exempted. The Premier agreed and the Bill was read a second time.

The Premier moved second reading of a bill to extend the Wreck and Salvage Act to articles driven off from shore, as well as wreckage from ships. The Bill was read a second time.

The House adjourned to-morrow at 8 p.m.

MONDAY, July 2nd.
The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.

A petition was presented by Mr. Jennings.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply.

The Premier introduced an amendment to the Bill relating to Collie Dogs in St. George's, so as to avoid the killing of any especially trained dogs, which was passed. An amendment to the Wreck and Salvage Bill was passed.

The House then adjourned to-morrow at 3 p.m.

TUESDAY, July 3rd.
The House met at 3 p.m., pursuant to adjournment.

Petitions were presented by Mr. Parsons and Mr. Devereux.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Resolutions to raise a war loan of \$3,000,000.

HON. MINISTER OF FINANCE explained that the annual naval and military expenditure now came to over one million dollars per year; besides this there was the back pay to be provided, as promised, for the Royal Naval Reserve. It was hoped that the present loan would carry us to the end of the war. If not another loan would have to be raised in the future. Part of the loan would also be used to repay a large advance received from the Imperial Government. In reply to Mr. Lloyd he gave some details of the calculations. The back pay of the Naval Reservists would take from seven to eight hundred thousand dollars.

MR. LLOYD said he thought it was time to create a Department responsible for the expenditure of war funds, headed by a Minister who could answer for it in this House. We had already expended three million dollars, and such sums as this should not be administered solely by Committees of private citizens, however estimable and devoted. The details of all expenditures should be before the House.

The Premier entirely agreed, but pointed out that practically the whole of our war expenditure consisted of the pay of the officers and men of the forces, so that in any event the Committees could not do far wrong. Most of the Committees did not deal with money in any way.

The Committee then rose and adjourned.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply, finished the last two items of the estimates and rose.

The Premier moved second reading of a bill to permit the exportation to Canada, and the United States, of pig props now lying in this Colony and cut before January 15, 1917. There were about \$500,000 worth of pig props in this country cut last winter or earlier, which it was impossible to export to England, and in order to avoid their lying here to rot, it was proposed to allow the owners to export them to the United States. The cutters were also given a lien on the pig props for their wages.

The Bill was read a second time. The House adjourned to-morrow at 3 p.m.

Fishing By Telephone

A strange way of discovering whereabouts of fish is practiced in some parts of Norway, and the method was discovered by a clever Norwegian. A microphone, which is an instrument that will transmit the slightest sound is lowered into the water from a fishing boat and a wire is attached to the operator fixed in the boat. The operator takes the receiver of the telephone and places it to his ear, ready to signal to the fishermen when he hears the least sound beneath the waters, and the fishing boat is immediately steered in the direction whence the sounds come. The result is—a splendid haul. As cod, herring, and mackerel swim in enormous schools, their passage through the water causes a rushing sound which is clearly heard by the fishermen, who immediately steer in the required direction and let down their nets.

Brazil Joins The U.S. In War Against Huns

Coinciding with the inauguration of Brazil's naval operations a plan for protecting her merchant ships in their voyages to allied ports with frozen meats and other foodstuffs has been put into effect.

President Wilson now has under consideration the personnel of the mission to Brazil. It probably will leave the United States within a month or six weeks, and will include men familiar with Latin-American conditions.

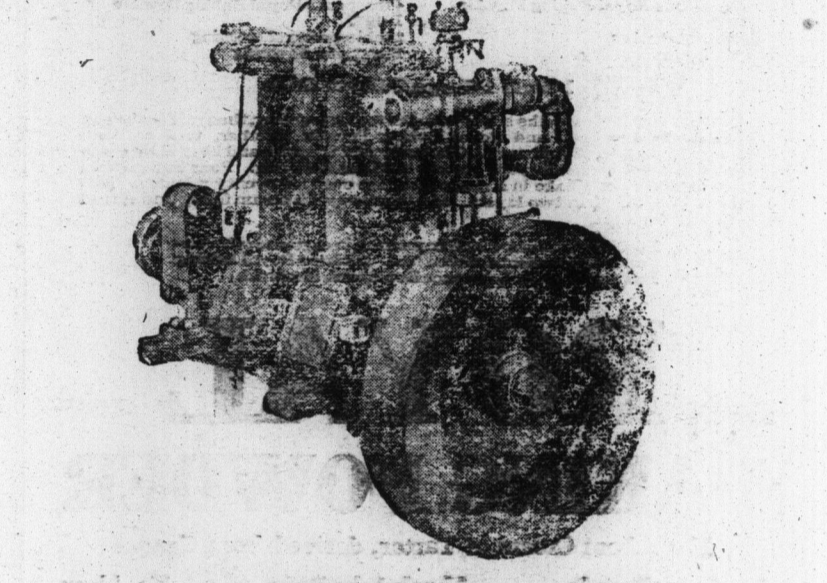

In the Assembly on Monday afternoon the Prime Minister, Sir Edward Morris, made the following announcement:

"For the past week or so negotiations have taken place between the two political parties in the Legislature in relation to the formation of a National Government. The terms upon which the two parties have come together have been concluded, and on the meeting of the House to-morrow I will be in a position to announce the names of the gentlemen who will form the new Government."

On Tuesday morning at 10.30 o'clock the members of the outgoing government held their last Executive Meeting at Government House, after which Sir Edward Morris tendered his resignation, which involved the resignation of all his colleagues.

In the new government both political parties have an equal representation in membership and in office. It took some time to work out the details, but after several conferences and much shuffling, an agreement was reached.

Reports have it that several members of the late Government and Opposition were much opposed to the Coalition, and what the immediate future will bring no person can say.

Big Liner Ashore

The big Norwegian-American liner Kristianiafjord, 10,669 tons, struck the rocks at Mi-taken Point, Trepassy Bay, in a dense fog on Sunday morning at 4.30 o'clock. The ship was bound from New York to Bergen, Norway. She had on board a general cargo and 841 passengers and 276 of a crew, including men, women and children. These included chiefly Russians, Norwegians and Swedes. All were saved, the passengers being safely landed in lifeboats at Bob's Cove, a half-mile away, within an hour after the ship struck. The ship is lying perfectly upright but with her bottom apparently ripped out.

All the holds are full of water, though the engine room and stokeholds are alright. The passengers were taken to St. John's and cared for. The cargo is being salvaged, and the passengers' luggage have been brought to St. John's. Wrecking tugs are at the scene.

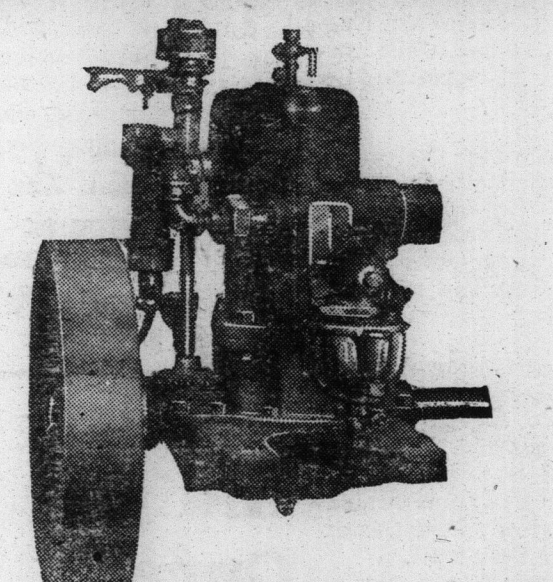
