The attention of Owners and Masters of British Ships is called calld Crown Colony Monro ,and to the 74th Section of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1894." 75 .- (1) A Ship belonging to a British Subject shall hoist the

> proper national colors-(a) on a signal made to her by one of His Majorty's ships. including any vessel under the command of an officer of R. Majesty's navy or full pay, and

(b) on entering or leaving any foreign pert and (c) if of fifty tons gross tonnage or upwards, on entering of leaving any British Port.

(2) If default is made on board any ship in complying with this section the master of the ship shall for each offence be liable te a fine not exceeding one, hundred pounds.

At time of war it is necessary for every British Ship to hoist the colours and heave to if signalled by a British Warship; if a vessel hoists no colours and runs away, it is liable to be fired upon. M. W. LeMESSURIER,

# The Newfoundland Memorial College and Normal School!

At the opening in September next advanced classes will be organized under the presidency of MR. JOHN LEWIS PATON, M.A., CAMBRIDGE.

In addition to the Professional training of teachers, the Institution will furnish courses for the first and second years of University work in liberal Arts and pure Science; the curriculum will include English, Mathematics, Chemistry, Physics (and other Sciences) French, Latin, Greek, Spanish, and other subjects for which there may be a demand.

The Memorial College will be associated with the principal universities of North America and the British Isles, and its certificate accepted pro tanto. In the case of the universities in North America, this will reduce the residence abroad to two years.
