LABOR CANDIDATES FOR ALDERMAN

An Enthusiastic Convention in the Temple Building Decides to Have Its Own Representatives in the Council and On the School Board.

Labor has started its campaign for better things. It proposes to have representatives in the City Council and on the School Board. A permanent organization has been formed, and a strong Executive Committee appointed to carry out the policy of reform as advocated by the trades unions for years past.

The convention decided unanimously upon the endorsement of Mayor Urdhart. In view of his good work during the past year, it was felt that labor people, who were largely responsible for his selection, could do nothing that again endorse him.

The ticket of candidates for the Board of Control of the city is as follows: Ward I—Jas. Wilson. Ward II—W. A. Douglas. Ward III—Arthur Collier. Ward IV—W. H. H. Wood. Ward V—A. H. H. Wood.

The nominations were also made for the Board of Education, and the four referendums necessary will be chosen by referendum from the twelve to fifteen nominees.

LABOR PROBLEM MUST BE SOLVED

Before the Stability of Any Country or Government is Assured.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Nov. 1.—"Why stand ye here all the day idle?" This was the text of a sermon by Herbert S. Bigelow in his pulpit at the Vine St. Congregational Church to-day.

Mr. Bigelow spoke of the value of the parable to the student of history. He said that Jesus in the parable, in parables was an unconscious historian. These little word-pictures of every day scenes, he said, throw much light upon the manners and customs of the time, and he referred to the parable of the employer who went into the market place to hire workmen as throwing some light upon the question of wages in that day.

"We learn from this parable that the customary wage for common labor was one penny, which is more properly translated shilling. "We might infer from this that the condition of labor was much worse then than now. But this would not be a safe conclusion. We may read of wages in India or China in ancient or modern times that seem astonishingly small in comparison with our own. But we know that there can be but little real difference, for there are uniform conditions which tend to reduce the wage to the point of bare subsistence for common labor.

"They had in ancient days what we have now, a system by which the richest vineyards and the most valuable mines and the enormous land values of cities gravitate into the hands of the few, and as population encroaches upon the land, these few have an increasing power to appropriate to themselves the products of labor; and as labor becomes more efficient through discovery and invention, the favored ones who monopolize the opportunities of labor reap the lion's share of the world's wealth.

"It is only in new countries where the supply of unused land is great in proportion to the population that wages are relatively high. "It is not our tariff wall, it is the abundance of free land that has made America the Eldorado of labor. But as population grows and this available land becomes monopolized, European conditions are bound to reappear in America and wages must go down to the dead level; and that is nature's penalty for the crime and the folly of land monopoly. And the two-penny statesman can no more avert this penalty without going down to the root of the evil than we can make fishes live in the air or men thrive in the sea.

"The employer went into the market place and found men at the close of the day in the busiest time of all the year who were idle and waiting to be employed. This is a striking portrayal of our mal-adjusted organization of industry. Even now we hear of approaching steps of a panic. The shutting down of the copper mines of Montana is an industrial earthquake, the rumblings of which will shake the continent. But in the face of starvation, if a besieging army were lying at the gates, this would not be more imminent. Great industries have been in the hands of gamblers. Already securities have shrunk to two billions. Now comes a shock which affects the whole world, directly or indirectly, of 200,000 men. Students or economic history know that this is only the beginning. Once again, as in the panic of ten years ago, that question of the parable will have a dreadful significance. One failure will bring another. The army of the unemployed will swell to monstrous proportions and hunger will ask us of old, "Why stand ye here all the day idle?"

REFUSE TO ARBITRATE. Los Angeles Packing Houses Will Not Meet Men—Strike-breakers.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 27.—(Special Correspondence.)—Recently the Butcher Workmen's Union adopted a resolution for endorsement. The Council of Labor for endorsement. The Council withheld its endorsement until the butchers would agree to arbitrate in case of a refusal. To this the butchers agreed. When the managers of the packing houses were waited upon they not only declined to arbitrate, but refused to meet their employees upon any proposition. As a result a strike followed, and every member of the union came out, and are still out. As usual, the Los Angeles Times is daily resorting to abuse and misrepresentation with the hope of prejudicing the public against the union. The Times has whipped the proprietors of small meat markets into acting as strike breakers, and many of these worked all day Sunday at the slaughter houses. There is a probability of a general strike in Los Angeles and a widespread industrial disturbance.

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
