It is the intention of the C. P. R. during the coming summer to commence work which will do away with the "big hill" grade, which runs steeply down between the mountains east of Field. The work is one of great engineering difficulty and will involve a cost of approximately \$500,000. The change will necessitate the swinging of the main line on a bridge across the Kicking Horse river near the foot of the big grade. When the river is crossed the trains will enter a tunnel curving through the mountains like the letter S for about 3,500 feet. Emerging from this it will recross the river on another bridge and again travelling through another curving tunnel, will issue again on the main line near the top of the big grade. The present grade averages over four and a half per cent. and extra heavy engines have to be used on it, but the change proposed will reduce it to about two and a quarter.

STATEMENT BY THE WESTERN SECRETARY

Rev. W. M. Rochester Says Attorney-General Has Exceeded His Power

Winnipeg, April 27.-Rev. W. M. Rochester, western secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, who has just returned from a two and a half months' campaign in British Columbia, refer-

"In the first place," Mr. Rochestet said, "the idea that any responsibility not later than September, 1908, in this matter rests with the executives of the provinces is a mistaken one.
Whatever responsibility rests upon any representative of the province with respect to the administration of this law, rests with the attorney-general, and with him alone, and no action of the government of the province can afford him release from this responsibility.

"The attorney-general, therefore, for British Columbia, if he refuses to consent to prosecutions under the Dominion Lord's Day Act, assumes all the reponsibility for such attitude. We be-leve that in thus doing he exceeded his power, which is not to veto the Act in his province, but to consider each case as it is laid before him, and to refuse or to consent to prosecution as in







Lettuce Hearts.—Divest a head of Boston cabbage lettuce of the outer leaves down to the hard head. With a sharp knife cut the head into quarters and arrange them on a dish, with the stalk ends toward the center. Sprinkle over them, if desired, a little celery cut into small dice. If celery is used place a little in the center of the dish and between the quarters. At the moment of serving pour French dressing, using a spoon, into the lettuce hearts, moistening them well. 


