





AUSTRALIA'S WELCOME offical Reception. Big Parade and Joint Military Display by the

MELBOURNE, Australia, May 22-The official programme for the recep-tion of the American warships has not yet been completed. It is understood that on landing in Sydney the Commonwealth authorities will receive Admiral Sperry and his chief officers. The party will then be received by the State authorities and later by the civic authorities at the town hall. An extensive procession has been arranged in which the visitors will be invited to take part and a circuitous route will be followed in or-der to afford an opportunity to as many of the citizens as possible to welcome the Americans.
