ITALIANS KILLED IN RIOT. FISHKILL, N. Y., April 29—An unknown talian was shot and killed in a clash between a rioting mob and the employees of the brick yard of the Waterous Company of this village today. Sheriffs, deputies were sent from this village to restore order and make the arrests. While this attack was taking place other mobs marched to two other yards near Fishkill androve workmen out.

SALONIKI, April 29.-The deposed covered in the height of a violent electric storm, completely consumed the elevator and its contents: The loss is estimated at \$1,000,000. Patrick McElligott was burled beneath the debris and instantly killed. The fire is belfeved to have been caused by lightning. For hours the electric storm, which burst over the city shortly past midnight, created havoc. Frequent alarms of fire kept the department busy in several sections of the city, and it was just after a bombardment of lightning that the elevator was discovered on fire. The sky for miles around was illuminated and huge burning embers spread over the city, driven by a high wind. Many times freight sheds of the Illinois Central and Wisconsin Central were on fire, and to save them from destruction necessitated a heroic and stubborn battle on the part of the firemen.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 29—Na-dir Pasha, the second eunuch of the palace under the regime of Abdul Ha-mid, was hanged at dawn today on the dir Pasha, the second eunuch of the palace under the regime of Abdul Hamid, was hanged at dawn today on the Bala bridge, the great thoroughfare that connects Stamboul with the quarters of Galata and Bera. The body was allowed to swing until 8 o'clock in the morning and thousands of the people stopped to look at the man whose name was a terror under Abdul Hamid. The excelsior packing immediately blazed up and before anything could be done the fire was well under way.

Geo. Stevens, who was in the room at the time, ran to give the alarm, while Christy Wilson and Chas. Curry, also employees, endeavored to extinguish the fire.

By the time the fire department arrived the basement was filled with flames and the whole building was filled with smoke. The chemical was put to work and an effort was made to get a hose around by another alleyway to the back door but there was not enough hose. Other streams were used at the side of the building and inside of half an hour the blaze was practically extinguished.

LONDON, April 28—Wilbur and Orville Wright will be the guests in London, May 3, of the Aeronautical Society of Great Britain. They will, on ety of Great Britain. They will, on this occasion be presented with the society's gold medal, which will be inscribed: "Presented to Wilbur and Orville Wright in recognition of their distinguished service to aeronautical science." The obverse side of the medal will bear an illustration of a fiying eagle and a balloon.

This is the first time the gold medal of the society has been presented since the establishment of the organization in 1866.

RUSSIAN FINANCES

ST. PETERSBURG, April 28—Count Witte, speaking on the budget at a meeting of the council of the empire today, said that the Jewish disabilities meeting of the council of the empire today, said that the Jewish disabilities caused a powerful body of Jewish financiers abroad to boycott Russian securities while Russia's recent allenation of German financiers had led to a further contraction in the market dealing in the securities. The Russian debt had risen to \$5,900,000,000, an increase of \$1,450,000,000 in five years.

M. Kekovscieff, minister of finance, in reply, paid his respects to Count Witte's authority in matters of finance, but said that the future should not be painted so black. He called attention to the current rise in the Russian market, imperial Russian fours being now 22 points higher than in 1906, when Witte was in power. The maintenance of peace and prudence, he said, was a strong factor in prosperity.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 28.—The final figures of Canada's trade for the last fiscal year issued today by the customs department show total imports amounting to \$298,123,792, a decrease of \$69,249,793 as compared with the preceding year, and total exports of donastic products amounting to \$259,-922,366, a decrease of \$3,446,586.

The trade for March shows continued evidence of an encouraging outlook for a large increase in this year's trade. The imports totalled \$53,893,302, an increase of \$3,811,130. Exports totalled \$18,397,974, an increase of \$454,437. During the year coin and bullion to the value of \$9,988,442 was imported, as compared with \$6,548,661 during 1907-08. The value of coin and bullion exported was only \$1,589,793, as compared with \$16,637,614.

Can the life tenants of the real estate of an insolvent testator, in the absence of a license to sell—such real estate being not specifically charged with the payment of the testator's debts retain the net rents until sold? By the common law of England the real estate of a deceased person was not liable for his general debts, but if the testator by his will expressly charged his real estate with the payment of his debts such a charge was effective in equity. To aid in enforcement of the payment of the debts of a deceased out of his realty the courts came to interpret where possible a direction to pay in a will into a charge, but even with this tendency it frequently happened that a deceased person's heir got his realty while the debts of the deceased remained unpaid. This was the law in England at the creation of this province. In order to remove this injustice the gengral assembly of the province of New Brunswick in 1786, at its first session created a charging upon the realty of a deceased person of all the debts which the personalty was insufficient to pay by enacting that where personal assets should be deficient for the payment of any debts the executor or administrator might apply to the governor or commander in chief and his majesty's council of this province, now represented by the probate court, who were authorized to grant the license for the sale of the realty and since then it has been enacted that upon such license being obtained the executor might recover the rents and profits of the real estate accruing from the death of the deceased. In this case no application was made for a license to sell, but after considerable delay the devisees under an agreement sold the realty. A question such as here arises, it is believed has not before been decided in this province, but following the principles laid down in Doe d. Hare v., McCall, Chipman 90, it is now held that the life tenants can retain the rents. The executor had as am atter of fact collected the rents, but this was as the agent of the leave to
