CONTINGENT AND HOME MISSION FUNDS.

QUESTION XIV.

What are the resolutions of Conference respecting the Contingent and Home Mission Funds?

ANSWER.

The Conference expresses its gratification that its action in relation to the Contingent Fund, and the Home Mission Fund, has met with the practical approval of our people, as demonstrated in the advanced income received from the Circuits during the year.

The Home Mission Fund has risen from \$826.13 to \$1493.33.

The Conference adopts the following resolutions which it respectfully commends to the consideration of the members of our Church and congregation, and hopes that during the ensuing year, the income of the Home Mission Department shall still be further advanced by their kind liberality, and also that the important objects contemplated by the Contingent and Circuit Aid Fund shall be more fully reached than they can be by the present income from the Circuits.

1. That the first of the two Funds, into which the Contingent and Home Mission Fund is separated, shall be known as "The Circuit Aid and Contingent

(3.) The amount of the grant to the Conference by the Parent Body, to aid in the sustentation of the work formerly carried on under its immediate direction.

THE HOME MISSION FUND.

1. That a Fund be formed, the object of which shall be the sustentation of the work on those more recently occupied fields of labor, which may with propriety be regarded as Mission Stations; and its extension to destitute portions of territory, yet unoccupied by our agencies.

2. That the sources of income for the Fund shall be (1.) A Public Collection to be made at the Home Missionary Meetings, which shall be held in all the principal preaching places throughout the Connexion,

(2.) Donations made for the promotion of the object contemplated by the Fund, and

(3.) The interest on monies vested.

3. That the committee for the management of the "Home Mission Fund" shall consist of the President, Co-Delegate, and Secretary of the Conference; the Chairmen of Districts; two laymen to be appointed by the Conference; and one layman to be elected by the Circuit Stewards of each District, at the time of the annual District Meeting.

N. B.—For the present year the probable income of the Home Mission Fund shall be distributed by the Committee of the Contingent Fund.

QUESTION XV.

What are the resolutions of the Conference respecting the Educational Fund for Ministers' Children ?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference regrets to observe that the collections on behalf of this Fund for the present year fall very far short of the amount they had reason to expect, and which is absolutely necessary to the fulfilment of the purposes of this branch of our economy. While believing that the impoverished state of many portions of this country may account in no small degree for this deficiency, the Conference confidently hopes that with the improved condition of our people, their support of this Institution will more fully consist with its claims upon their liberal consideration.

2. That the Conference re-affirms the following resolutions of the past year, viz :---

(1.) That those senior members of the Conference, who do not expect to derive benefit from this Fund in the education of their children, shall pay *two dollars* annually. That all other members of the Fund shall pay an annual subscription of *three dollars*, except those who are actually receiving from the Fund, who shall pay *four dollars* per annum.

(2.) That the attention of our people be especially called to this Fund, and that its claims upon their generous support be affectionately and strongly urged in all our congregations.

(3.)That the Chairmen of the respective Districts be authorized to draw on the Treasurer of the Fund for the amounts due to the claimants within their charge.

3. That the cordial thanks of the Conference are due, and are hereby presented to the Rev. Charles Stewart, and William B. McNutt, Esq., the Treasurers, of thi of the

THE SUPERNUMERARY FUND.

QUESTION XVI.

What does the Conference resolve respecting the Supernumerary Ministers' and Ministers' Widows' Fund?

ANSWER.

1. The Conterence records with thankfulness, that as the result of increased attention to the rules for securing an income to this Fund, there is an improvement in the amount contributed by the Circuits.

2. The Conference is hereby confirmed in its conviction that by a seasonable explanation to our Societies of the principles and objects of this Fund, it need not be long before there shall be realized a yearly sum equal at least on a general average of all our Societies to ten cents, of which as yet the contributions fall far short.

3. The cordial thanks of the Conference are respectfully presented to R. D. Robertson, Esq., formerly of St. John, N. B., but now of Rangoon, Birmah, for a donation to this fund of fifty dollars.

4. The thanks of the Conference are most respectfully presented to G. H. Starr, Esq., of Halifax, Executor of the late Mr. Moses Johnson, for the payment of a legacy to this Fund of Two hundred and four dollars and ninety-seven cents.

5. The cordial thanks of the Conference are respectfully given to the esteemed Secretary of the Fund, the Rev. E. Bottcrell, for his faithful and valuable services during the past year with an earnest desire that he may long be spared to render such services in this and other departments of our work as he may feel qualified and disposed to undertake.

PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN AND BOOK ROOM.

QUESTION XVII.

What are the resolutions of Conference respecting the Provincial Wesleyan and the Book Room?

ANSWER.

I. That the Conference is more deeply impressed than ever with the importance and necessity to the spiritual prosperity of our connexion, of a well sustained religious periodical, and while grateful to Almighty God, for the benefit which it has reason to believe continues to follow the circulation of our official organ, *The Provincial Wesleyan*, expresses its earnest purpose to do all in its power to make this agency of our Church, by the Divine blessing, more efficient as a means of advancing the work of God.

2. That the Conference believing that this purpose may be better accomplished, and the present serious embarrassment connected with this department of our work more easily and speedily removed by an immediate collection of all outstanding dues, and an enlarged list of prepaying subscribers, earnestly enjoins upon all our ministers conscientious attention to the calls of duty in this matter, and also respectfully requests the intelligent and hearty aid of all the families of our charge, in giving to the *Provincial Wesleyan* a much more widely extended circulation than it has yet attained.

3. That the Conference regards with great interest the success and efficiency of our Book Room, as an important means of checking the current of unscriptural and soul-destroying publications, and spreading abroad a sound religious literature, adapted to all ages and circumstances, and therefore solicits the continued and increased patronage of this agency of our Church, in order that the difficulties in the way of its management may be removed, and its usefulness greatly promoted.

That the cordial thanks of the Conference are hereby presented to the Rev. J. McMurray, the retiring Editor and Book Steward, for the diligence and fidelity he has shewn in his endeavours to discharge during the past year, the trying duties of his responsible position, duties which from the commencement of his term of office have been of an exceedingly onerous and difficult character, owing to the heavy embarrassment in which the concern was even then involved; and the Conference also prays that his resumption of the direct ministerial and pastoral work may be accompanied by the abundant and increased blessing of the Head of the Church.

5. That the Conference greatly appreciating the long-continued, and invaluable services of the Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., in connection with our Educational Institutions, with which he has been so closely allied from the commencement, most cordially and unanimously appoints him to the position of Editor of the *Provincial Wesleyan*, and Book Steward; and the Conference expresses its sanguine expectations that under his immediate supervision and direction, and with the co-operation of all our Ministers and people, this important connexional work may be relieved from all financial burdens, and become a means of increased good throughout our entire bounds.

QUESTION XVIII.

What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting the Mount Allison Educational Institutions ?

Answer.

I.---THE ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT.

1. The Conference rejoices to learn that the circumstances of the Mount Allison Academies present

a marked improvement during the past year; and trusts that, by the Divine blessing, the anticipations of the Board will be realized in the entire liquidation

of the debt during the present year. 2. The Conference would express its high appreciation of the efficiency of the College and Academy; and its conviction that, while a change has been made in the management, that efficiency will be fully maintained. It hereby presents to the Principal and his efficient coadjutors its thanks for their faithful and successful service during the past year.

3. Believing that in these institutions a first-class education may be obtained in connection with those religious influences and teachings to which we as Christians can never assign a merely secondary importance, the Conference cordially recommends them to the patronage of our people, and trusts that the present year will witness a large increase in the number of students.

II .--- THE COLLEGIATE AND THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENTS.

1. The Conference has received with satisfaction the Report of the Treasurer and the President of the College respecting this department for the past year.

2. The Conference has again to record its deep solicitude and regret that the number of Candidates for our ministry is still inadequate for our work, and begs to commend this subject to the prayerful consideration of God's people that more laborers may be sent into the vineyard.

3. The Conference anxious to secure the efficient working of the Theological Institutions, and desirous of complying with the wishes of the Board of Trustees, that some person be appointed to the Chaplaincy of Mount Allison College and Academies, has great pleasure and confidence in appointing Rev. QUESTION XIX.

What are the resolutions of the Conference respecting our Sabbath Schools.

ANSWER.

The Conference rejoice to see so large a numerical increase in our Sabbath Schools, as compared with that of the previous year, many of whom have been converted to God, and united with our Church, and they do most earnestly urge to continued zealous exertions therein during the ensuing year. They would suggest the adoption of such measures whereby not only all the children of our own people, but also those who are unconnected with any Church, should be visited and gathered into our Sunday Schools, and they would recommend to all our Ministers the practice of meeting the children as often as possible on some day in the week, if convenient, or the Sabbath, for the purpose of speaking to them, more especially upon their early conversion to God, and they would also recommend the substituion of a monthly meeting for prayer in all our Sunday Schools in the place of the ordinary routine on the Sabbath, thus to seek to obtain that grand and ultimate object-the early salvation of our youth and their membership with our church.

PARSONAGE AID FUND.

QUESTION XX.

What are the resolutions of Conference with regard to the Parsonage Aid Fund?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference would again call the attention of our members and congregations to the importance of securing on every Circuit a suitable Parsonage free from debt.

2. That applications to this Fund for assistance, in support of local efforts may be made by Circuits in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island.

3. That the grant to any Circuit shall in no case exceed two hundred dollars.

4. In order to accomplish the intention of Conference in the formation of this Fund, and to insure greater uniformity in the applications thereto, and in the distribution of its grants, the following regutions are adopted, viz:—

(1.) In regard to applications for grants in the crection of new Parsonages.

In every case where it it is proposed to seek for a grant in aid of a new Farsonage, the parties about to build shall communicate with the Secretary of the Committee of this fund, and procure from him a copy of the Model Plans; and shall also fay before the Committee full particulars in regard to size, location, tenure, and value of land upon which it is proposed to build; the plans of the building, details of size, height, materials, and estimated cost, amount of reliable subscriptions in aid of purchase of land and erection of building, and also the amount of the anticipated grant.

(2.) In regard to applications for grants in aid of purchase of land and buildings.

In every case where it is proposed to purchase land and buildings for a Parsonage, it shall be necessary in order to obtain a grant in aid of such purchase, for the Superintendent of the Circuit to communicate with the Secretary of the Committee, and furnish full particulars respecting the situation, size, value, and tenure of the land, and also a plan of the house, shewing size, height, and arrangement of the nooms, a statement of the materials of which the house is built, and of the estimated present cash value of the property, and also of the extent to which the buildings are completed, together with the amount of local subscriptions.

(3.) In every case when a grant is sought to be obtained from this Fund, it must appear that, with the assistance of the grant, it shall be entirely free from the burden of any debt.

5. In regard to applications for grants to liquidate debts on Parsonages:

(4.) Applications for grants can only be received from Circuits where there has been a distinct charge upon the Circuit accounts, and a claim upon the Contingent Fund for rent, or interest.

6. No grants can be made from this Fund, to assist in defraying the expenses incurred in repairs and alterations of parsonages, or for the purpose of assisting in the erection of outbuildings in connection with Parsonages for which no grant is obtained.

No grant shall be paid from this fund until the committee shall receive satisfactory evidence that a sum, amounting to at least three times that of the grant sought, has been secured by local effort towards the accomplishment of the object proposed.

8. Every application for aid from this Fund must receive the sanction of the District Meeting, either Financial or Regular, before it can be considered by the Committee.

9. The Treasurer of this fund shall not pay the amounts which may be granted in aid of local efforts until he shall have received from the Secretary of the Fund, satisfactory evidence upon the following points, yiz:

 That the title of the property is valid, and that the deed is executed upon the Connexional plan.
 That the whole of the sums subscribed on the Circuit are available and secured, so as to relieve the Circuit account from any charge for rent or interest.
 A Certificate from the Registrar of Deeds must be forwarded, stating that the Connexional Deed is recorded, and that the property is free from all encumbrance, whether by way of mortgage, judgment, widow's thirds or otherwise.

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37 TEMPERANCE.

The Conference deeply impressed with the conviction that intemperance is a sin against God, and most destructive to the best int rests of our race, and that the use of alcoholic liquors, even in moderation, tends to the increase and perpetuation of drunkenness—

Resolves—1. That in view of this great evil, we would reiterate and earnestly enjoin upon all our people the most careful and conscientious observance of that Rule given by the Rev. John Wesley to the Societies under his care, respecting the u e of intoxicating drinks, viz: "Neither buying or selling spirituous liquors, nor drinking them, unless in cases of extreme necessity."

2. That we hail with delight, all well-directed efforts of individuals and organizations to promote the cause of temperance, and so far as practicable, will heartily co-operate in those laudab'e efforts.

3. That as the Church of Christ should be the most effectual promoter of moral reform, we pledge ourselves to renewed efforts to purify and preserve her from reproach, by discountenancing all complicity of her members with the great evil of intemperance whether by drinking, manufacturing, selling, sigging petitions for license, or furnishing or renting places for the sale of intoxicating liquors.

POPULAR AMUSEMENTS.

This Conference, deeply affected by the painful fact that much of the lukewarmness and backsliding in the Church arises from the unwise association of professors with the unconverted in the ever-changing amusements and customs of the times;

Resolves—That while we would not restrain our people from those Annocent pleasures and pursuits, which in themselves are harmless and tend to invigorate the physical system, we would caution them against giving encouragement to those diversions, such as dancing, attending theatres, and such other

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amusements as cannot be taken in the name of the Lord Jesus.

2. That as much trouble has been caused at different sessions of Conference in consequence of alterations made in the District Minutes, it is determined, that when the minutes of the several Districts shall have been signed by their respective Chairmen and Secretaries, they shall not be altered, except by the special permission of the Conference.

II.-PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN.

The Chairman is also to examine the case of every Minister or Preacher who has married during the year, to ascertain whether the Rule has been obeyed which says: "Take no steps towards marringe, without first consulting with your brethren;" and the Minutes shall report to the Conference any cases in which this important direction shall have been violated.—This Rule is considered as requiring, in particular, consultation with the Chairman of his District; not excluding, however, the other Ministerial colleagues of the party concerned.]



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PASTORAL ADDRESS.

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TO THE MEMBERS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF BRITISH AMERICA-1869.

The return of the season for our assembling in Conference, calls us again to the pleasing duty of addressing to you our Christian salutation. Grace unto you, and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

"We are bound to thank God always" on your behalf, for "you," with us "hath he quickened who were dead in trespasses and sins," and "hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus;" therefore unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood, and hath made us Kings and Priests unto God and His Father, to Him be glory and dominion for ever and ever.

The review which we have taken of the past year is suggestive of many important lessons, both to us and to you. Our churches have almost universally enjoyed great peace. The ranks of our ministry are unbroken by death. "The gospel of the grace of God—of grace for every sinner that he may be saved and for every believer that he may be saved wholly, and preserved blameless, unto the appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ—has been preached from our every pulpit, and to many has come "not in word only, but in power and in the Holy Ghost and in much assurance." In others the work of rrace if less visibly has not less really advanced. 'Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name give glory, for Thy mercy and for Thy truth's ake." In the conversion of souls, in their growth a grace, in their preservation amidst the activities of life, and in the final triumph accorded to many in he hour of death, "the Lord hath done great things or us whereof we are glad."

But can we be satisfied with our efforts or their results? We are grieved and humbled to find that the number of our members to-day is somewhat less than it was twelve months ago. Death has deprived us of not a few. Emigration has borne from our midst many of our beloved families. On this account alone some of our circuits have suffered the loss of a third or more of their entire membership. Failure of the fisheries in Newfoundland and depression of trade in other places have seriously interfered with the prosperity, with even the stability of our work. Yet allowing for these disadvantages we cannot reconcile our present position with our sense of the Divine claims. We might have been more zealous, more faithful towards men, more powerful in prayer to God. Then unquestionably had we realized more largely the fulfilment of the Divine promises. After long and serious conversation on the religious state of our churches, and earnest prayer and humbling of ourselves before the Lord, we have bound ourselves anew "to think and speak and act for God ;" and now we exhort that ye sympathize with us, praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thercunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints and for us, that utterance may be given unto us, that we may open our

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mouths boldly, to make known the mystery of the gospel."

At such seasons as the present we feel peculiarly impressed with the solemnity of the charge we have received, to "feed the flock of God which he hath purchased with His own blood." Suffer then. brethren, the word of exhortation in which the solicitude of the collective Pastorate finds its expression. for we "watch for your souls as they that must give an account." We affectionately exhort you to cultivate deep personal piety. You are pledged to unswerving fidelity to the Divine will, and "this is the will of God, even your sanctification." Neglect here is inexcusable. The dangers which threaten you, and the magnitude of the interests involved, afford the strongest motives to your giving all diligence to make your calling and election sure.

Be consistent in your profession. We remind you of the solemn engagement made in the hour of your espousals to Christ. You surrendered yourselves implicitly to the Divine will in all things. Deliberately and cordially you embraced the principle that "no man liveth unto himself" as the foundation of your entire life-of every thought as well as of every action. Your strict adherence to this principle is all the more necessary, because many walk-professedly the friends and followers of the Redeemer-who "are enemies of the cross of Christ." who "make provision for the flesh to fulfil the lusts thereof," "who mind earthly things." "Let no man deceive you with vain words, for because of these things cometh the wrath of God upon the children of disobedience. Be not ye therefore partakers with them." Steadfastly avoid those vain and sinful amusements by which some in our day are seduced from the simplicity of Christ, and those soul-destroying habits which are in direct contravention of our rule, discountenancing the use of spirituous liquors.

Seek the grace which you require in the appropriate means. Pour out your hearts at stated times

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he appropritated times every day before God. Gather your families together for domestic worship. Lead them to the house of God on His own day, and call the Sabbath a delight, he holy of the Lord honourable. Prize greatly the veek evening services, and both by precept and exmple recommend to all our youth the Class meetings and Love Feasts which have so long and so happily distinguished our denomination, and to which the Great Head of the Church has so signally set the Seal of His approbation. Let the spirit of devotion pervade your whole life "Continue in prayer, and watch in the same with thanksgiving."

The work of the Lord is your work. Engage in it intelligently, perform it zealously, and continue in it perseveringly. Begin in those cases which are nearest to yourselves, but embrace the remotest of your fellow men in your efforts to do good. "Blessed are they" who with liberal soul and open hand "sow beside all waters."

Too much attention cannot be given to the young people of our congregations. For them and for the children whom we may gather from abroad are our Sabbath schools maintained. In this department of Christian exertion there is scope for the highest talent and the most mature spirituality of mind. Let there be no lack of labourers. Place before you the design of securing the conversion of the children, and not only aim at, but expect this glorious result. And here let us warn you against undoing in whole or in part, your own work, by the introduction of trifling, much more of pernicious books into your Sabbath school libraries. From our own Book Room you may expect to be furnished with suitable and trustworthy works which have been selected with great care.

Several changes have been made in the management of our Book Room and Educational Institutions. The former devolves on us personally a large pecuniary liability. This we would more willingly bear if we could but see our own literature as widely diffused

and as highly prized as it deserves to be. We have shown our sense of the importance of this means of reviving, extending and conserving the interests of true religion, by appointing a brother greatly beloved and highly qualified for its successful managementthe Rev. Dr. Pickard-to be our Book Steward and We trust that you will confirm our choice Editor. Let the Provincial by every means in your power. Wesleyan be found in all our families. Let the works of Wesley, Fletcher, Watson and Clarke, as well as the more recent productions of our writers, have a place in your homes, and be employed in the instruction of your households, at once, in the saving truths of Christianity, and the principles and history of Wesleyan Methodism. Here we repeat let your own libraries and especially those of the Sabbath school be replenished, if you would promote a wise and vigorous piety among yourselves.

In consequence of Dr. Pickard's removal from Sackville, we have had to re-arrange our staff of The College, and both the Male and officers there. Female Academies will continue in operation as formerly. The President of the former is David Allison, Esq., a gentleman well fitted by his natural abilities, his scholarly attainments, and his Christian excellence to stand at the head of such an Institution. The Rev. C. Jost, A. M., continues in his position as Vice Principal of the Male Academy, and will, as formerly prove a friend, as well as an instructor to those committed to his care. J. R. Inch. Esq., is placed at the head of the Female Department, and his gentlemanly deportment, his superior literary qualifications, and his true piety afford us the assurance that the work which he has so successfully performed during the past few years will continue to be prosecuted with zeal and efficiency. We bespeak the patronage for these Institutions which they well Let their halls be filled with the youth of deserve. our Church, who desire to

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"Unite the pair so long disjoined Knowledge and vital piety."

And for both those who impart, and those who receive instruction, let fervent prayer daily ascend to the throne of grace. Much of the future prosperity of the work of God among us, depends upon the religious and liberal training of the rising generation, and much of the success of this must rest with the fervent supplications of our own people.

With thankful feelings we inform you that two brethren, who have honourably fulfilled their probationary course have been ordained to the full work of the ministry, and that three young men who give evidence of their divine vocation, have been received as candidates for this holy work. But we have to regret the smallness of these numbers, while many and pressing calls from various portions of our work reach us for additional ministerial help in places but partially supplied with Divine ordinances. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth more labourers into His harvest."

We commend again to your enlightened Christian sympathies, our various connexional Funds. We are gratified to find in the very considerable increase of the Home Mission Fund, the proof of your interest in the evangelization of our own land. We have distinctly placed before you this year, in the Minutes, the list of those Circuits which form our Home Mission field. We trust the income of the fund will be so increased at once, as to provide for the wants of this most necessitous work.

'The current income of our Supernumerary and Ministers' Widows' Fund, always administered with the utmost care, is found insufficient this year to meet the very moderate claims upon it. This statement of a fact, so nearly affecting our beloved supernumerary brethren, and the widows of those who have ceased from their labour, will, we are sure, be sufficient to secure yet larger proof of your Christian liberality.

And now brethren we shall at once quickly be with you again, at our several posts of duty. We pledge ourselves to entire devotion to the work of soul saving. We are determined to know nothing among you save Jesus Christ, and Him crucified. We shall not entangle ourselves with the affairs of this life, that we may please Him who hath chosen us to be soldiers. We ask your enlightened and faithful co-operation. "Now the God of peace that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus that Great Shepherd of the sheep, make you perfect in every good work to do His will working in you that which is well pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

ADDRESS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA, 1868.

Reverend and Dear Brethren,----

We have received your Address with great satisfaction. We rejoice with you in the honour it has pleased God to place upon our beloved brother, the Rev. William Morley Punshon, M.A., and in the work which he has been enabled to perform. He is followed by the affection and prayers, not only of his brethren of this Conference, but of multitudes throughout the land.

We receive with delight the assurance that you "adhere with unabated tenacity to those clear and well-defined views of the truth as it is in Jesus, which were held by our fathers." Similar assurances reach us from Methodist communities throughout the world. It is a subject of devout thanksgiving in these days, when many are being led from the simplicity of the faith, either by a pretentious Rationalism, or by open or half-concealed Popery, that among Methodists purity of doctrine is universally maintained. May God grant that this, the true source of our strength, may continue; and that both we and you may have grace faithfully to preach, and to exemplify in our lives, those doctrines of experimental religion which are the only foundation of a pure morality, and which have ever proved "the power of God unto salvation ! "

We thank God for the "showers of blessing"

with which some of your Circuits have been favored. The increase in numbers of your members, and the large number you report as "on trial," give us great encouragement. We also have been blessed during the past year, and we gratefully report an increase of 5,310, with 24,926 on trial. We desire to see, both for you and for us, days of wider and richer Let only the Ministers, office-bearers, and blessing. members of the Church faithfully discharge their respective duties, seeking to win souls for Christ, giving especial heed to the young people of our congregations, and striving to bring under Gospel teaching those who have been accustomed to neglect public worship, and, by God's grace, we shall be favored with a far larger numerical increase than we have yet seen.

We sympathize with you in those financial difficulties, in which your Connexion has been placed. The causes of them, we trust, are only temporary. If for the present your contributions to the Missious be somewhat less than in former years, we feel assured that this arises from no diminished attachment to this blessed work; but you will pardon us if we refer to the efforts that have been made among ourselves to reorganize and to give fresh stimulus to our District and Circuit Missionary Auxiliaries, and if we commend a similar work to you.

We are solicitous that the political difficulties to which you refer may not in any way militate against the interests of the Church. We commend your adherence to a principle, which from the first has guided ourselves, that, while a Christian man should strive faithfully to discharge his political duties, he should anxiously guard against introducing anything like party-strife into the Church. We unite with you in the earnest prayer that your Provinces may be favored with returning commercial prosperity, with quiet and contentment; and that in conjunction with the Canadian Conference, you may be able to accomplish great things for the spiritual welfare of Canada.

We hear with great satisfaction of the opening of the new academical building at Sackville, after the sad destruction of the former one by fire, and of the efforts which you are making to raise each of the institutions there to a higher status. We rejoice also in the progress and efficiency of your Sunday-Schools. We trust that no discouragements in the work of giving to the young a thorough and religious education will lead you in any way to relax your labours. No work can be of higher importance to the future welfare of the Church in your country. We wish also continued success to your efforts for the efficient training of candidates for the Ministry.

The reference which you make to the loss which we have suffered by the removal from among us of eminent men is exceedingly grateful. It reminds us of the true unity of our Churches. These holy men were yours as well as ours; yours not only in their sympathies and prayers, but in their efforts to do good. They are not lost either to us or you. Their example and influence remain, and we pray God that a double portion of their spirit may rest upon the brethren called to sustain the official positions which their removal has left vacant.

We are thankful that in our Church the past year has been one of uninterrupted peace. Our numbers have increased. New Chapels in all parts of the country have been erected, and many others have been enlarged. Our Sunday and Day schools continue to flourish. Our Home-Missionary enterprise, though as yet only in its infancy, is doing much both for the cities and villages of Great Britain. Our Foreign Missions are, we believe, laying fresh hold upon the sympathies of our people. We need, and anxiously wait for, a general and abundant outpouring of the Holy Ghost. May it please God soon thus to favor our Zion !

The election of a President and Co-Delegate, for your next Conference we leave, for this year, to the assembled brethren.

And now, dear brethren, believe that our sympathy and love are still yours. We regard with unabated affection the excellent men to whose retirement from active service you refer, and we look with hope to those who are just joining our ranks. May they prove themselves good and successful soldiers of the Cross! You also who are bearing "the burden and heat of the day," we would gladly cheer, at least with words, and assist with prayer. We heartily commend you and your work to the blessing of our common Lord.

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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE

OF THE

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF FASTERN BRITISH AMERICA, 1869, TO THE BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1869.

VERY DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,-

By the favour of God we are assembled to hold our fifteenth Conference, in the city of Charlottetown, the finely situated and spacious capital of the beautiful and fertile Island of Prince Edward.

It was one of our first duties, agreeably to your instructions, to elect a President and Co-Delegate, from "the assembled brethren." We have chosen to the former office, our esteemed brother, the Rev. Henry Daniel, who, of all our number, has had the largest experience in the Home Work, the benefit of which he wisely endeavours, from the Presidential chair, to infuse into our own proceedings. The Rev. Henry Pope, jr. was cordially elected Co-Delegate.

As soon as our Conference was thus properly constituted, we were privileged to hear your answer to our address of 1668. The terms of unabated affection in which you speak to us; the approval you give to our efforts for promoting education on Christian principles; and the sympathy you extend to us in our financial and other difficulties, gladden our hearts. Our determination has thus been strengthened, through God, simply to pursue the great objects of Wesleyan Methodism, by those firmly grounded, well-tried means, that have ever been so greatly henored in the Parent Body.

We are fervently thankful that you could inform us of an increase in your Societies of upwards of five thousand members, and more than twenty-four thousand on trial. To God alone be the glory. We have had a good year in our Circuits. In some places, especially the city of Halifax, there have been revivals of spiritual religion. It is not, however, our happiness to report an augmentation in the total number of our members.

Our unremitting attention is directed to our youth. We purpose herein to abound more and more. The number of scholars in our Sabbath Schools is fifteen thousand, seven hundred and forty-two, an increase on the year, of eight hundred and four. The service annually held by us for the Sabbath Schools of the Conference town, was this year pre-eminently delightful, edifying, and full of hope.

Our Institutions at Sackville have prospered. The unequalled opportunities, in these Provinces, which are there afforded for the higher branches of education, and thorough training for general business and the professions, as well as for the cultivation of youthful piety, unite to enable our educational establishment to lay a firm hold on the mind and heart of our people generally. More students have availed themselves of its advantages of late, than for some time previously. In this vital department of our enterprises the future is full of promise.) The indebtedness on account of our valuable possessions at Sackville, has been considerably reduced. Wesley College has continued in successful operation. Assuredly it will yet be more numerously attended by those of our ingenuous ardent young people, who may be able to gratify their laudable aspirations for a complete colhearts. Our determination series of un determined and a series of the se

The class of theological students was not large last year, owing to the urgent demands of our work, and the comparatively limited number of candidates for our ministry. At this Conference we have received three young men on trial. Two of these must at once be appointed to Circuits. Efficient arrange-

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ments have been made for the training of such probationers as can be spared from our work, all of whom are anxious to enjoy the advantages of further and specific mental, and methodist culture. The 'two brethren who, at this Conference, acceptably completed their probation of four years, have been ordained. The ordination service was most numerously attended. It was a season of sacredness and gracious visitation, we most thankfully add, also, of obviously divine approval, inasmuch as it was a service of holy reviving to us all.

The affairs of our Book Room and Provincial Wesleyan office, have received our best attention. We have appointed our excellent brother, the Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., Editor and Book Steward. Other changes have been made, each of which is likely to be beneficial.

Our Funds have in general been well supported. The contributions to the foreign missions are slightly in advance of those of last year. We thank you for the suggestions to try to give fresh stimulus to our general and local Missionary Auxiliaries. It is one which we shall act upon to the utmost of our opportunities. Our Home Mission Fund was last year separated from the Contingent Fund, and it will henceforth have its own peculiar sphere. This has commended itself to our people who have supported it liberally. We believe they will continue to do so, which is a matter of most urgent necessity. The fields of our labor are very extensive. The extreme points are separated from each other by many hundreds of miles of land and sea. Many of the Circuits are much too large. The population is often sparse. Missionaries are required that the people may be effectually reached. These when set to work must be sustained by grants from our Home Mission Fund. But, alas! we fear it will be long before we shall overtake the demand and give an adequate supply of laborers to those vast fields which are white already

to harvest. We resolve to do our best herein, and pray that God may be pleased to call forth from the educated and converted youth of our Church, men after his own heart, to preach his word "with the Holy Ghost sent down from heaven."

We thank you for your expressions of fraternal love to those of the Brethren who have become Supernumeraries. They render frequent and valuable assistance to the Superintendents of the Circuits on which they reside. It has become our duty to inform you that the Rev. Ingham Sutcliffe and the Rev. James Narraway, M.A., have been obliged to ask for permission to desist from our full work, for at least for We have consented to these brethren beone year. ing Supernumeraries until the next Conference. The former will be remembered as a Missionary who was sent to Canada in 1831, and has since labored with equal acceptance and success, sometimes in much affliction, in all the provinces of Eastern British America. Brother Sutcliffe designs to visit England in the course of the year. We beg to recommend him to your highest esteem, and affection, as a faithful fellow laborer in our Lord's vineyard. Brother Narraway has been for twenty-eight years an eloquent and successful minister amongst us. He has occupied with honor, some of our most laborious, and others of our most important Circuits. Compelled at present to seek rest from his customary toil, he is presented for your warmest friendship, as a brother greatly beloved.

We have learned that our honored ex-President, the Rev. William Morley Funshon, M. A., is enabled to continue "in labors more abundant" We shall rejoice if his successes shall be so great and enduring as to earn for him imperishable fame as the evangelist of Canada. ADDRESS OF THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST CHURCH OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA, 1869.

To the President and Members of the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Eastern British America:

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,-

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With unaffected pleasure we address to you our Annual Letter. The interchange of friendly greetings which passed between us, awakens and sustains an interest in you and your work which we are pleased to feel and acknowledge. Your letter, in reply to the one we addressed to you from our Conference of last year, was duly read to us, and listened to with the attention to which it was justly entitled. And we take this opportunity of assuring you that we shall ever feel such an interest in all that concerns and interests you, as to make your communications ever welcome, and the relation of your success a matter of joy and rejoicing. We are thankful to say that the good hand of the Lord has been upon us for good during the past year. Many mercies have crowned our people and our ministry through its progress, while frequent baptisms of the Holy Spirit have attested the divine authority of our calling, and the faithfulness of the promise : "Lo, I am with you alway; even unto the end." The addition of 2156 members to our Church, with the quickening and santification of believers have resulted from this: to God be all the praise.

Deeply impressed with the great and growing need of a fuller and more systematic attention to the youth of our people, that their spiritual culture and guardianship may be the more effective and salutary, we are laboring to perfect measures for greater unity, harmony, and efficiency in our Sabbath school agencies. A pernicious and seductive literature abounds, and many incentives to attract and beguile the unwary, are everywhere present, and we therefore feel that a deep and solemn responsibility rests upon us to speedily perfect and apply such measures as may more fully accord with the exigency of the times, and the duties we owe to the rising generation.

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The endowment of our College, now made a stern necessity, we are laboring to complete. In the face of formidable difficulties, arising from great and wide spread commercial embarrassments, we are pressing onwards. We are thankful in saying that more than half of the minimum sum of \$100,000 we have put before us for that object has been reached. A return of more prosperous times, which we think we are justified in regarding as at hand, encourages the hope that ere long the whole amount will be obtained, and our connexion thereby saved from a dependence seldom other than uncertain and unsatisfactory.

Our mission at the Red River has been so successful that we have felt constrained to so listen to appeals from thence, as to send an additional laborer to strengthen the hands of our brethren in that quarter. A young brother, of undoubted piety and zeal, volunteering for the work, is being sent, and yet more encouraging results are looked for. Fourteen young men who have finished their probationary term, were last Sabbath ordained to the work of the ministry, and received into full connexion with the Conference, while no less than 46 candidates for our ministry have this year been received on trial. We are rejoiced to believe that you are being freed from hindrances to your work, which in several portions of your field must have painfully affected you. Fierce political agitations are ever obstructive and damaging to the work of grace; and we could not but feel for you in the struggle you must necessarily have had to surmount them. Days of peace and hope are, we trust, now opening before you, and while our Dominion shall be saved, in every portion of it, from disloyalty to a throne our venerated founder and his helpers ever revered and defended, so may unity and harmony, in patriotic and spiritual bonds, unite us each to other, and all to the banner of truth, that God may be glorified and the Kingdom of the Redeemer be established throughout our land.

We are closing a Conference remarkable for great oneness of judgment and feeling, and for heartiness of purpose, to devote ourselves to our holy calling. The importance of securing on the part of those who are in the bloom and vigor of early life, a prompt and intelligent consecration of themselves to the service of God cannot be questioned. To this end the perfection of measures for greater unity and efficiency in your Sabbath School agencies will we have no doubt conduce.

The resemblance of our Ecclesiastical System to the earnest Christianity of Apostolic times is perhaps nowhere more apparent than in the deep and unquenchable desire, which has marked alike its ministry and its membership, to send the Gospel to the regions beyond.
