Life In Winnipeg.
Cor. of Hamilton Times.
An extract from Northwest correspondence will give an idea of the state of matters in Winnipeg, industrially. A resident correspondent of the Hamilton Times writes:
"There is a lack of work for the men who went to the Northwest with no definite ideas of what they intended to do. An advertisement for a book-keeper brought over 70 applications. The railway mania was returning from the works in large numbers with their pockets full of money, and business is brisk in the saloon line. The proprietor of a little grocery reports that he is clearing \$100 a day, and he keeps a sort of savings bank for the man, sometimes having as much as \$20,000 of their money lying in his safe over night. Living is very dear. Coal is \$16 a ton and wood \$12 a cord, and it costs \$20 a month to warm a house which rents for \$10 a month. Large profits are necessary to make life endurable amid such surroundings. Then provisions are dear, especially because all the land near Winnipeg is locked up in speculators' hands, and market gardeners cannot locate with profit. Owners ask \$100 an acre for wheat land 10 miles away from the city. This looks like killing the goose that is ready to lay the golden egg. As a result of the dearth of living, most of the men who have families keep them at the East and send their remittances."


