### Dominion Parliament.

(Continued from first page)

who took the ground that Canada was called on to support the idea of arbitration because many of the disputes which the British empire was likely to have with the United States would relate to Canada.

Sir John Thompson supported the resolution. It had been well said in the British commons, when this resolution was before that body, that the professions of many nations in this respect outran their performances; with Canada it was not so. She not only professed her desire to arbitrate, but acted up to her profession. We have already had two arbitrations with the United States, and were now offering to arbitrate other matters in dispute. He (Sir John) was, however, sorry to know that certain people in Canada, out of partisan feeling, had allowed themselves to say things about the hearing of arbitration, that, if true, would make this resolution ridiculous. Reflections had been made on the good faith of her majesty's government in that matter, and on the conduct of the agent who represented her, and arbitrators, especially the neutral arbitrators who decided the case, that, if believed, would force him (Sir John) to oppose rather than support the resolution before the house.

Laurier complained of Sir John's reference to the hearing of arbitration and the opposition criticism of it, and went on to explain that the arbitration might be bad while war would be a great deal worse. The resolution passed unanimously.

Dillon McCarthy moved for the papers in the celebrated Woodstock customs case in which Rev. J. C. Farthing and Rev. Father Brady are concerned. The motion was supported by the Controller Wallace had tried to favor Father Brady by permitting him to import vestments while the duty from clergymen of the Church of England on the same articles.

Hon. Mr. Wallace replied, reading the correspondence which showed clearly that the collector at Woodstock, and he alone, was to blame. He dealt with McCarthy without gloves, and intimated that the member for North Simcoe had left the conservative party because the party had ceased to employ him. McCarthy complained of the attacks made on him, but still insisted that Wallace's explanations were not satisfactory.

Sir John Thompson remarked that if the controller had shown warmth the member for North Simcoe had shown unaccountable suspicion. The whole case was a very small matter. Father Brady had received as a present one hundred dollars worth of goods, of which forty dollars worth was free. Sixty dollars dutiable at twenty per cent. Then by a mistake the collector at Woodstock had admitted all free, but when complaint was made by Rev. Mr. Farthing, and the collector's attention called to the matter, he admitted that Father Brady's twenty dollars duty was not apologized for the mistake. There was not a single circumstance casting the slightest suspicion on the controller.

McCarthy's motion, as amended, passed.

Mr. Mills, of Annapolis, then made his resolution in favor of disfranchising the officials of the provincial government who disfranchised dominion officials, and spoke at length in support of it.

He was followed by D. C. Fraser. Hon. Mr. Daly moved the adjournment of the debate and the house adjourned at midnight.

Sir John Thompson gives notice that on Wednesday he will introduce the following bills: Bill to amend the criminal code; bill to amend the electoral franchise act; bill to amend the revenue act, and bill to amend the Dominion elections act.

On May 22.—In the house today Sir John Thompson moved his resolution to take tomorrow for government business, and to adjourn from tomorrow night till Monday.

Mr. Laurier consented, but Mr. Mulock objected unless the government would

give some assurance about his bill regulating ocean freights on cattle.

Sir John Thompson said he would do the best he could for him, and Mr. Mulock withdrew his opposition.

Then Mr. McCarthy objected on the score of his bill to abolish the French language and separate schools in the Northwest. He referred to the reports in the press that the long time spent on Dr. Welton's bill had been spent with the object of preventing the discussion of his bill.

Col. Amyot resented the imputation and requested Mr. McCarthy that he only made his appearance when he had some constructive bill or motion calculated to arouse racial and sectarian prejudices.

Hon. Mr. Carran also reminded Mr. McCarthy that already his bill had been reached on the order paper and allowed to stand at the request of the member for Winnipeg, Mr. McCarthy not being in his seat. The resolution passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Foster to go into committee of supply, Mr. Chaffin objected on the ground that the house should finish the tariff. Mr. Foster explained that the tariff was already as good as completed but that before going further with it he thought it best to have it reported, so that members could see exactly what they were doing.

In supply the house proceeded to vote the estimates for government savings banks.

Mr. Mulock wanted to know why the Halifax agency cost more than the Toronto one.

The minister explained that it was because there was more business done at Halifax.

Sir Richard Cartwright wanted the rate of interest to all depositors with more than five hundred dollars on deposit reduced to three and one quarter per cent. He added the cost of maintaining these banks to the interest paid depositors, and made out that this was a very expensive method of borrowing money.

Mr. Foster replied that in 1878 the cost of these banks was twelve thousand dollars more than now, though the business done was infinitely greater now than it was then.

When the item of contingencies for the office of the high commissioner in London was reached, Sir Richard Cartwright objected to going further, intimating that they wanted to debate the high commissioner after a night's rest. So the committee rose and the house adjourned at mid-night.
