PRESS CONFERENCE

Will Traverse St. John Valley St. John to Edmundston-Not to be Diverted to North Shore

In July and August Canada will be visited by the Imperial Press Con-ference which will consist of 160 of the greatest journalists in the British Empire. Among these is Lord North-cliffe, the greatest newspaper owner in the world, Lord Durham, Sir George Newnes, and noted newspaper men of London, Manchester, Liverpool, Edinburgh, Glasgow and Dublin as well as representatives from India, Straits Settlement, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa. The party will land at Halifax and proceed to the Pacific coast and return, making a six weeks' tour.

The local interests in this noteworthy excursion is that the party will traverse the whole St. John Valley from St. John to Edmundston. If the beauties of the St. John Valley are not exploited as they should be The Observer asks what on earth can give them so much world fame as the visit of these great men?





Carleton Circuit Court.

The Circuit Court of the April te had more cases than any court to some time. There were no less that six criminal cases on the docket. Th grand jury threw out two, the King vs. Charles Clark darged with stab-bing Henry Blackmore of Debes. C. J. Jones for the Crown, R. L. Simms for defence. The King vs. Samuel Meltz charged with robbery from Philip Isaacson. R. L. Simms for the Crown, Jones & Jones for the defence.

The following cases were tried be fore the petit jury :

King vs. Shaw-Alonzo Shaw, of the parish of Kent, was charged on three counts, assaulting his wife and thereby did occasion actual bodily harm, and two counts for common as sault on separate dates. On pleading, counsel for the defence moved to quash the indictment on the ground that the wife was compelled to give evidence before the grand jury and the magistrate on the preliminary hearing. The court ruled in this in hearing. The court ruled in this in favor of the prisoner open for him to show such compulsion. On a consultation between counsel the Crown with drew the first count and the accused pleaded guilty to the common assault and was given five days in gaol. C.

King vs. Percy Walker—Percy Walker, colored, was indicted for stealing a harness of George Dent. Walker and Dymond conducted a livery stable and Dent left his harness there about a year ago. It disappeared and was found this April in possession of Walker. The jury disagreed 10 to 2 in favor of the prisoner. C. J. Jones for the crown, R. L. Simms for the defence.

King vs. Vantassel—Prisoner charged on two counts, first, with breaking into Asa Thornton's store and stealing goods and money, second breaking and entering with intent to commit an indictible offence. It seems th t Thornton found his store unlocked several times and missed goods and money. On February 2 he caught the boy with a key unlocking the door. Witnesses also told that the prisoner said he had a key that would unlock the store and that he had taken two dollars and some cigarettes. The boy claimed he got the key the night before from another boy. The judge withdrew the second count from the jury and the jury found the lad not guilty of the first count. Then the court directed them that they might find him guilty of attempt in the se cond count which they did. He was allowed to go on suspended sentence.



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
