EMPLOYERS WHAT ARE YOU DOING FOR THE RETURNED MAN?

The discharged soldier demands a job with a future and has no room to wander along in the same old rut. Life in the Army has broadened his views; that is why the different employment agencies of the Government are having trouble to place the returned man. A decent job, a place where he can earn a living wage and at the same time learn a trade. He has no taste for his former trade or calling and feels now is the time to decide. A year or two in the Army has opened his eyes and this, you will agree, is a good sign. What are we looking forward to in a better citizen for Canada and now is the time for the employers to step in and assist the different Government organizations to this end.

The Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment has done splendid work in fitting the returned man in the niches and grooves of civil life. Although they are doing very good work for these men, what they need is the co-operation of employers. Take the case of Smith for instance who before existing occupied a position as a clerk in a local warehouse and earned about fourteen dollars a week; had four years service Overseas; rose to the rank of sergeant and was decorated. This man acquired a new confidence in himself and in his ability. Just after his return he met the boss who had employed him before the war and who made of him a clerk in the store. "You can have your old job back again." "You don't think that I am going back to that again? No, I am worth more than that." There wasn't any future in it for him. There had been opportunities for him in the Army. HE HAD GRASPED THEM. Now that he was home he did not want to get back to the old style of living. He wanted something to fight for a job with a future, and the chance to learn a trade.

HOW TO GIVE HIM THE CHANCE—There are a number of American firms who are employing such a returned man; running a training school in connection with their works and at the same time paying him a living wage. A large number of American manufacturing plants have installed such schools and investigators from the Government Re-employment Bureau report that they have increased the average working output of the unskilled laborer from thirty five per cent efficiency to as high as sixty and sixty five per cent. Increase in a worker's efficiency means increased production which in these times of great demand means more business and prosperity when such things are needed. Only by increased production can the cost of living be reduced in the opinion of many students of that question. The increased output that springs from the enhanced efficiency of the workmen. The big aim is for the worker himself, by increasing a man's efficiency by increasing his own estimation of himself. Consequently, proponents of this scheme advance its claims as a remedy for the ills springing from the present industrial restlessness. What our returned man is looking for is a chance. He might be a laborer but what he wants is the opportunity—give it to him—TRY HIM OUT, and should be a failure I am sure he will be the first to admit it and make way for a better man. But you will find that if he is the man who is struggling to get out of that you will not be able to keep him there. TRY IT FOR AN EXPERIMENT, and do not forget, employers, that the Information and Service Branch of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment has that man's application on file. Call and ask to see the Representative in person.

The extension, through all the streets of the village, of the aqueduct and sewers; the purchase of the Valpy Lake Aqueduct; (which gives 135 lbs. of pressure in the village); to take advantage of the recent housing system, by building 50 houses for our workmen; to favour the construction of a harbour for oceanic navigation; the erection of our village into a town, (and this, without the least possible delay); the lighting of our streets; and all these ameliorations to cost our proprietors a tax of not more than one and a half per cent, this, due to the generosity of the St. Lawrence Pulp & Lumber Corporation, who, although exempt from taxes for twenty-five years, engage themselves to pay more than their very large share.

The constitution of the church and presbytery, (by the "Falerique") is planned for next spring, also of a hospital (by the Sisters of Providence) and of an Academy for boys; the present three-story school house, being too small for the children of both sexes, will be devoted to the education of girls only.

At the present time the Church, Presbytery and Parochial Hall, were put at the disposal of the people and their pastor, by Mr. J. A. E. Dubuc, of the St. Lawrence Pulp & Lumber Corporation.

All these projects will be realized. We may walk courageously towards the future, now that we have capable men to promote our interests and make of Chandler a large town.

TEACHERS OF TWO COUNTIES MEET

(From the Northern Light.)

The attendance was not very large as on account of the unsatisfactory condition of the Carquet Railway, practically none of the down shore teachers were able to be present. However, the attendance from Restigouche County and from the upper part of this County was good.

Miss Edith Hachey of West Bathurst called the meeting to order. Miss Josephine Duguay of Moncton was on motion elected chairman and Mr. J. Paul Chisneau of Laminon, secretary. The chairman announced that the object of the gathering was to organize the second and third class teachers of this section so as to be able to affiliate with the New Brunswick Teachers' Association, an organization established some time ago.

Miss Anna Poirier of Belledune read the constitution and by-laws, which, with the motion of Misses Josephine Duguay and Frances Lordon were appointed as members of the Committee of five which is to meet the executive of the First Class Teachers' Association to consider the question of amalgamating the two associations. Misses Anna Poirier and Edith Hachey were on motion named as members of the executive to represent the Counties of Restigouche and Gloucester.

The committee named for the two counties to assist in the organization of the teachers in each, were as follows:—
Restigouche:—Misses Henrietta Dempsey, Adeline Daly, Margaret McCormack.
Gloucester:—Misses Ida Frenette, Marie Eddy and Mr. J. Paul Chisneau.

There was an interesting discussion on the question of salaries, and it was decided that the members should meet from the different trustee boards an increase of 20 per cent, until such time as a minimum salary basis is recognized and established.

This concluded the business of the afternoon session, and after passing a vote of thanks to Miss Anna Poirier for her services in preparing for the gathering and to Mr. B. C. Mullins for his courtesy in arranging for the use of the Court House for the occasion, the meeting adjourned.

In the evening the public was invited to attend, but doubtless on account of the peculiarly very pleasing nature of the attendance was rather small. What was lacking in quantity was made up in quality, however. Mr. J. L. Ryan was called to the chair and officiated throughout in his usual able and pleasant manner. Short addresses appreciative of the work of the teachers and sympathetic with their desires for better remuneration were delivered by Rev. G. A. Ross and Fr. Levesque, and Messrs. O. Turgeon, M. P., Hon. P. J. Veniot, Angus McLean and C. T. Richard.

SEED OATS SITUATION

In those districts where the oat crop was a partial or total failure last season, farmers are becoming somewhat anxious as to the available supply of seed oats. There is a general tendency on the part of farmers who have seed oats for sale to withhold them until later in the winter. The movement of seed oats is delayed also because transportation has been needed for coal, feed and livestock.

Possibly 400,000 bushels of seed oats may be required in Ontario and Quebec, and a much larger quantity in Southern Alberta and Saskatchewan. The Canadian Government seed Purchasing Commission already has substantial supplies in store in the Interior Terminal Elevators, and large quantities of good-quality early-harvested oats are still to come forward. Alberta and Saskatchewan requirements will be given first consideration from the seed oats produced in these provinces.

The shortage in Ontario and Quebec may quite easily be met from the large and excellent oat crops in Prince Edward Island and Eastern Nova Scotia. No. 1 quality Island Banner seed oats are now being delivered as far west as Toronto at a price comparable with Western seed oats of the same grade. The price of No. 1 seed oats delivered in bulk carloads at any point in Ontario and Quebec should not exceed the current Fort William cash price for No. 2 Canada Western oats by more than 35c per bushel. Registered and other select stocks true to variety may be higher in price.

The Dominion Seed Branch provides a system of grading and inspection, so that shippers in either Western Canada or the Maritime provinces may make delivery of seed inspection certificates with their bills of lading. Purchasers of seed oats in any part of Canada may now buy on the basis of grades No. 1 seed, No. 2 seed, etc. and subject to the delivery of seed inspection certificates.



INVEST IN LOCAL BONDS

Show Your Faith in Town By Buying School Bonds.

The Campbellton School Board is offering to the public about thirty thousand dollars of five and a half per cent Restigouche citizens having money in excess to cover the cost of erecting and equipping the new school and are first class investments. They are issued in denominations of \$500, with the interest payable semi-annually.

Restigouche citizens having money in the savings bank at 8 per cent should show their faith in their own county by investing in these bonds. Already about ten thousand dollars worth have been disposed of.

SAWDUST AS A LITTER

(Experimental Farms Note.) The amount and value of manure produced on the farm is in a measure dependent on the nature and supply of the litter used. For the purpose of a litter is not only to act as a bedding material, to keep the animal warm, dry and comfortable, but also to serve as an absorbent to take up and hold all the liquid excreta—the most valuable part of the manure.

Straw is the universal litter and there are few better but there are seasons in which the supply is short and it may then be advantageously used alone dry sawdust is quite satisfactory. It is clean and easily handled but is particularly valuable for its high absorbent power for liquids, which is two or three times that of ordinary straw. It is not rich in plant food constituents but its subsequent decomposition in the soil gives rise to much humus—forming material. It should be used in sufficient quantity to absorb completely all the urine.

There is a more or less general impression among farmers that the manure from stables and cowbarns in which sawdust has been used as a litter would not be so rich in plant food as that in which straw has been used. This is not true. While we would not say that this suspicion may not have some foundation we have never been able to discover a single instance of such injury and enquiry has been made both in Canada and in the United States in this matter. Such injury could only occur on very light soils following very heavy applications. Most satisfactory evidence has been obtained from many farms upon which sawdust has been used as a bedding material for a number of years following which the soil is light and sandy. Naturally it is on heavy soils that this class of manure proves most effective.

One word of caution is necessary. Horse manure from stables using sawdust heats very rapidly, especially if left in the pile and the excessive fermentation that may take place will seriously injure the manure. Such manure should be mixed with that from the cowbarn, which can readily be managed when manure carriers are installed and a manure spreader used. Mixed manure (horse and cow) may be handled in the same manner as that made with straw. The saturation of the sawdust with the liquid excreta promotes the ready decomposition of litter under favorable conditions of temperature and the best place for this to take place, in order that the full manure effect may be obtained, is in the soil. If the manure cannot be spread at once, the heap should be kept moist and compact, as in the case of manure made with straw.

The sawdust of hardwoods, decomposes more readily and further is richer in potash and phosphoric acid than that of pines and conifers generally, but no harm due to resistance to decay need be feared from the use of the latter provided that it is not employed in larger quantity than is sufficient to absorb and retain the liquid excreta.
