The whole service was there discussed, and also the advisability of abandoning Rectory street, and the extension of tracks on the Hamilton road to Egerton street. It was then agreed that the matter be laid over until I could consult my board, as to these changes in the tracks. I succeedthese changes in the tracks. I succeeded in this, and called upon the mayor on the 19th and advised him of the company's willingness to make the change. The mayor promised to bring the matter before the council and advise me. The car service was discussed in the car service was discussed in the car service was discussed in the car service. cussed in your presence, and I then submitted a winter schedule of seven-teen cars, which the mayor said was puite satisfactory, and the matter was referred to you to work out with me on the afternoon of the same day, which was done. This was, I understood, the last of the matter, and I have been daily expecting an order for the winter service to go into effect on Dec. 1. I may add that the mayor undertook to have the winter schedule of fifteen cars approved, in consideration of the strike difficulty being settled, and we certainly must ask you to be good enough to carry







It is 351/2 miles in length, is excavated to a depth of 26 feet and the bottom width is 120 feet. There are 157 depots for goods and produce at Manchester, and a network of railways directly connecting the city with every populous center.
