Mr. Stanley accuses me of cowardice in not interfering when I saw Major Barttelot getting into trouble with the natives. He told me I should have forced my advice upon them. He also told me that I should have put the Major in irons for shooting that soldier and sent him back to England in diagrace. What nonsense. Mr. Stanley knows I had no right to interfere with the commander of the camp. Major Barttelot would have been justified in shooting me on the spot. He was in command, not I. While that was not a military expedition, it was absolutely necessary to have discipline, and good discipline requires but one head—one commander. He was selected by Mr. Stanley and I reiterate my charge that Mr. Stanley is primarily responsible for any blunders made.

"Now, I'm not going to talk any more about the matter until Mr. Stanley makes public the charges which he intimates he will make. Then I may have a reply to make. Mr. Stanley says he has his proof. Well, so have I. I am not going to sustain Mr. Stanley against Major Barttelot until I know what he is going to say, neither am I going to deny blindly what he intimates. Mr. Stanley is a great explorer, but he went into this for fame and what he could get out of it. He has no more philanthropy than my boot. I will go further and say that the expedition was in the nature of a speculation, and not a philanthropic relief movement. The capitalists who backed it

WORK OF THE LADIES. Annual Meeting of the Women's Chris-tian Association—A Successful Year.

The annual meeting of the Women's Christian Association was held in the purlors of the Aged Women's Home yesterday afternoon. Among those present were: Mrs. Carfrae, president; Mrs. (Rev.) Roger, vice-president: Mrs. (Rev.) Rescauser: Mrs. (Rev.) Res The number of infants in the flome at the last annual meeting was 5; since then 51 had been received; 9 were still in the Home. The cash donations for the Home during the year amounted to \$87 18. The management was also indebted for gitts of clothing and furbiture and to Dr. Cl. T. Campbell for his attention upon the inmates. Religious services had been conducted during the year, in which Miss Freeman and the city clergymen assisted.

The Aged Women's Home continued still to flourish, the present matron having proved an efficient manager. During the year it was found necessary to increase the accommodation, and for this purpose a house adjacent to the Aged Mon's Home was reuted. Three deaths occurred in the Home during

accommodation, and for this purpose a house adjacent to the Aged Men's Home was rented. Three deaths occurred in the Home during the year. The thanks of the association were due to Dr. MacArthur for his attention to the sick. The number of inmates in the home at the last annual meeting was 12; 18 had been admitted since; remaining in the institution, 19.

The matron of the Aged Men's Home had given satisfaction. Four deaths have occurred during the year in this Hone. The inmates numbered 19 at present, as against 16 one year ago; since the last meeting 22 had been admitted. Dr. Mitchell kindly gave his attention to those of the inmates requiring the same, for which the association desired to return thanks.

The members of the Relief Committee had attended to the mants of 86 families, and paid 751 visits during the past eighteen months. The hospital and jail had been regularly visited, and religious services had been held at each institution at regular intervals. The thanks of the association were tendered to the Ministerial Association and the Episcopal Church ministers for holding religious services in the several homes, as well as in the jail and hospital, and also to the ladies who assisted in the musical services. The city papers had also placed the association in their debt. The musical services. The city papers had also placed the association in their debt. The report concluded with an earnest request that all ladies eligible should join the as-

Iron and wood on the one hand have been demonstrated to be too heavy, and to carry coal to generate enough gas to keep a vessel in the air would but handicap the aeronaut.

Invention, however, has proved that aluminium and electricity meet the requirements of the air navigators, and the ventors assert that these two elements have now been brought to such perfection that they will form a most important feature in aerial machine construction. It is claimed for the air ships which the inventors are about to present to public approval, that safety, speed, fort have been taken into consideration; they assert that they have perfected their ship so that it is under absolute control of the operator, and can be raised and lowered at will, go to any given point and or the savage wastes of the Mojave lowered at will, go to any given point and return, attain a speed of 200 miles an hour or come to a standstill in mid-air. The design of this aerial ship is on the same principle as the hull of a ship, with about the same proportions. Its appearance, except being A shaped, is round, and conical at both ends, having attached at either side two large wings extending the full length. These wing are arranged with devices that will adjust themselves automatically into a parachute, allowing the machine to descend to the earth gradually in case of accident. On the outward corners of these wings are placed propeller wheels, which run right or left, for raising or lowering the ship. At the bow is a very large propeller wheel, which propels the ship forward and backward, and directly on top of the buoyancy chamber is a rudder extending its full length and half the width of the wings, that is used to steer the ship borizontally. 


