Austria's Royal Family Furnishes a Victim.

Paris Hospitals Full of Influenza Patients.

Many English Members of Parliament Prostrated-64 Victims in New York Last Week-A Strange Story from Texas.

VIENNA, Jan. 26.—The Duchess Ludvica of Bavaria, mother of Empress Elizabeth of Austria, is dying of influenza complicated

with pneumonia.
PARIS, Jan. 26.—All the hospitals of this city are so crowded with patients as a result of the epidemic of influenza that there is no room for sufferers and the municipal authorities have been compelled to ask the Government to permit the use of vacant barracks as temporary hospitals for the large number of afflicted persons seeking

barracks as temporary nospitas for the large number of afflicted persons seeking relief.

London, Jan. 26.—There is a growing demand for a Royal Commission to inquire into the possibility of relief from the scourge of la grippe. The epidemic is somewhat less virulent this year than formerly, but is more widespread in its ravages. There are thousands of victims among the employes of the Underground Bailway and thousands more among the postoffice clerks. These services are robadly crippled as to cause public inconvenience. The number of members of Parliament prostrated by the disease is so large, and the sanitary condition of the Houses of Parliament is so bad, that the Ministers are likely to postpone the session until the wave of illness shall have subsided. Funeral directors are reaping a golden harvest due to the grip. The increased demand for their services has had the effect of stimulating competition. A novel method of attracting custom has been adopted by one undertaker in the East End. OTTAWA, Jan. 26. — Yesterday at 10 o'clock the Privy Council met, and with J. C. Patterson, ex.M.P. for North Essex, proceeded to the Government House, where Sir Adolphe Caron and Hon. Mackensie Bowell formally surrendered their portfolios and Hon. J. A. Chapleau, by the Premier, surrendered that of Secretary of States. Hon. J. C. Patterson was then sworn in as Secretary of State, and Hon. Mackenzie Bowell as Minister of Militia and Defense, vice Sir Adolphe Caron, resigned, and the announcement was made to Lord Stanley that Hon. J. A. Chapleau had accepted Hon. A WOMAN'S SACRIFICE.

Will Marry a Convict to Save Him from Punishment.

Julia Dempsey Comes from Newfound-land to Wed Laurance O'Toole and Finds Him Charged with Burglary.

New York, Jan. 26.—An attractive young woman pleading for the release of a convict, that she might marry and reform him, was one of the strange pictures that attracted attention yesterday morning in the Adams Street Court, Brooklyn. Her plea was successful and the man was released on condition that he marry the girl and leave Brooklyn to-morrow morning. The story has a prelude. On the night of Jan. 10 Detecrives Rall and Ryan caught two thieves breaking into a show case at Washington and Myrtle avenues. The men scampered off, but were recaptured. They declared that they were sent in the city at the time they were caught smashing the show ease. They were remanded for sentence. Two men, friends of O'Toole, called on Judge Walsh Frimsy and said they had an odd proposition to make.

"State it and be brief," said the judge. They said that O'Toole wanted to reform and give up his wayward career and marry a young woman who was in love with him. The young woman who was in love with him. The young woman was Julia Dempsey, the daughter of a well-to-do grocer of St. Johns, Newfoundland. She had become acquainted with him while on a visit to Brooklyn and was captivated by him. Hearing of his last trouble she had determined to come to Brooklyn and marry him if his release could be secured. When they had finished their story Judge Walsh said he would answer the matter after he had seen the girl.

Yesterday morning an attractive and neatly dressed young woman, accompanied by O'Toole's friend, called at Raymond street jail. The girl was Miss Dempsey. One of the keepers conducted them to O'Toole's cell. The young woman was greeted effusively by the prisoner, who put his hand between the iron bars to shake that of his sweetheart, who cried bitterly. Her escorts stepped back and there was a whispered conference between the couple. When it was finished the cell door was opened and the prisoner was told to get ready to go to court. The party walked down to Myrtle avenue and boarded a car. The young woman and the prisoner sat side by side and talked most carnestly about their plans. When Adams street was reached the party got off and hurried to the court room. ed the party got off and hurried to

Judge Walsh disposed of the cases before him and then he called the party up to his desk. He questioned the young woman closely and her answers seemed satisfac-tory. She said she had just come from St. closely and her answers seemed satisfactory. She said she had just come from St. Johns and desired to marry O'Toole. She shelleved he was a good man at heart, and would reform if he got a chance. Addressing the prisoner, his Honor asked him if he appreciated "the sacrifice this girl is ready to make for you?"

"I appreciate it thoroughly," said the prisoner.

His Honor then paroled the prisoner, but said it was on condition that he marry the girl and get out of Brooklyn by Tuesday. "Unless you carry out the promise you make I'll have you rearrested and will give you the full penalty."

O'Toole said he would carry out the agreement and leave Brooklyn, and the party left the court happy.

O'Toole is about 25. His family are respectable people and keep a little store on Hudson avenue. He is an ex-convict, having served five years for highway robbery. The resolution closed with: "Leo XIII. is verging upon the grave. His hast acts are words of cheer to Christ's poor. Even as we write he is slowly lesing his vitality, and may not see this year out. It has been thought proper by our union to send him a word of sympathy, a message of love and loyalty, on the coming anniversary of his birth."

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





Canada at the Word's Fair.

"Canada wants at least 35,000 square feet of space for her exhibits at the Exposition, not counting the space she will ask for in the manufacturers' building after the applications have been summarized. Such was the encouraging outlook presented yesterday by Professor William Saunders, the special commissioner from Canada. Professor Saunders passed nearly the entire day at headquarters arranging the preliminaries for the Canadian exhibit, visiting all the departments. He gave notice that the Canadian Government would ask and expect at least 10,000 square feet of space in the horticultural building to show its fruits, and the same amount of space would be wanted in the mines and mining building for the display of Canada's mineral resources. He also thought that 15,000 square feet of space would be most too much for the exhibit that would be made by his Government. Professor Saunders says that the fruit display will constitute a considerable section of the Canadian exhibit, but that the Government hopes to make such a display of all its products as will be worthy of Canada. Good exhibits are also expected in the fisheries."—[Chicago Herald.

I may say that when the matter was brought before the council by No. 3 Committee I doubted very much the utility of the measure. However it was adopted, contrary to my judgment, and a honest endeavor on the part of our city officials has been made to enforce the by-law with very unsatisfactory results to the city and to the farmers, gardeners and producers generally who attend our market. Therefore, after carefully considering the interests of the citizens, and from a practical knowledge I have that the great want of the farmer is a prompt sale, I would recommend that the bylaw be rescinded in the best interest of all concerned. We should encourage the tarmer to offer his produce on our market, and the readier sale he can obtain from any purchaser, no matter who he may be, will make it a greater inducement to the seller to come to our city, patronize our market, and will here to nurchase from our to come to our city, patronize our market, and while here to purchase from our merchants in preference to going elsewhere. All of which is respectfully submitted." All or which is respectfully submitted."

It is likely that as a consequence of these recommendations the bylaw will be withdrawn, and the farmers and hucksters will regain their liberties to sell to the best advantage.
