A. R. Hibbett, a young Toronto traveler, was found dead in his room at the Grigg House at noon today from asphyxiation by gas.

Mr. Hibbett registered at the Grigg on Wednesday, July 25, and had been drinking heavily up to the time of his death.

Mr. Hibbett had occasion to go to his room, and finding the gas turned on he closed the tap. At 8 o'clock at night a bell boy again found the gas turned on, and when he shut it off he woke Mr. Hibbett up.

Mr. Hibbett then came down to the bar and called for a cocktail. He drank the cocktail and Mr. Horsman tried to induce him to go to the dining room and have supper.

"Oh, I'll come up later on," replied Hibbett. "That means that you intend to go without any," said Mr. Horsman, and so he did.

"I noticed a faraway look in his eyes," said Mr. Horsman this morning, "and I told him that he had better be careful or he would be having an attack of delirium."

He had been on a spree for a couple of weeks before he came here. He has come here in the same condition before, and he always managed to put him on his feet and send him about his business again.

Mr. Hibbett had another cocktail and then went up to his room again. The bartender told him that he thought he would have a hard time of it trying to sleep after sleeping all day, but Hibbett smiled grimly.

When he went to his room he locked the door and closed the transom. Then he closed the window tight and, after turning on the gas he lay down on the top of the bed with all his clothes on and folded his arms across his breast.

He apparently died without a struggle, as he was found at noon today with his arms crossed as they were when he lay down to die. The fact that he did not rise early this morning did not cause any alarm at the hotel, and it was 12 o'clock before a bell boy thought it necessary to wake him. He hammered on the door, but got no response.

Hamilton, of Alivinston, late pastor of deceased, preached a powerful sermon in the Methodist Church, and was assisted by Rev. Dr. Aylesworth.

THE OPEN FORUM. The Preacher and the Workers. The Editor of the ADVERTISER: The babel of utterances on the labor problem reminds me of the Arabian Nights fable, the journey of Hassan of Balzora through the island of the birds in Wak-wak. The bewildering of opinion is so great that one might well despair of a solution of the difficulty but that the force of events is compelling utterances from all classes and creeds, showing that the world is thinking. We know that the solution is found and that the last stumbling-block in the way of its acceptance—ignorant inability to think—is being rapidly removed. We are thus saved from despair, but are compelled to acknowledge that while much of the literature of the day on the subject bears the stamp of investigation on its face, yet more of it makes nothing clear but the ignorance of the authors. The shop, the rostrum and the press are about equally mixed in their discussion of the subject, while capital and their ignorance under the cloak of authority. Among late pulpit utterances, for baselessness of assertion, ignorance of the subject and misapplication of the text, that of Rev. E. B. Lancelley in the Central Methodist Church last Sunday evening seems to stand foremost. He says: "A desire for some kind of notoriety is the reason why Debs and Sovereign were striving for supremacy, they fought for the throne of the empire of labor. They would have all the working-men bow beneath their scepter and obey their unjust mandate." The above quotation is a mere baseless assertion, an utter slander of Debs and Sovereign. The only justification of the reverend gentleman is that in ignorance alike of the workers' need and their leaders' motive he did it. His general ignorance of the whole question between labor and capital is exhibited so clearly by the whole selection from the sermon that any sentence will do as a quotation as well as any other.

"Their plan of operation was a violation of the laws which lie at the basis of the brotherhood of man, the

greatest good to the greatest number, and it was a violation of the law of God." The greatest good to the greatest number would be an excellent motto for a soup kitchen, but as a statement of the laws that lie at the basis of the brotherhood of man it is the only law that makes a brotherhood or any society possible, and the quantity of justice obtainable among any people is the measure of the national stability of that people.
