THE FRENCH GRAIN CROP. Panis, Feb. 2.-According to the official report just issued the area of two departments, shows an increase of from 1 to 5 percent; in nine departments the area is equal to that of 1895, in sixteen departments it is from 1 to 5 per cent less, in twenty departments it is from 6 per cent to 10 per cent less, in 21 departments it is from 11 to 20 per cent less, and in eighteen departments the area of growing grain is over 20 per cent less, when compared with 1895.

This annual killing of the slaves is a custom which has prevailed for many years in Benin city.

A FEARFUL SITUATION.

Bombay, Feb. 2.-Two more Europeans have died in the hospital here from the plague. The position of things is still fearful in the extreme. Two convicts died of the plague in the house of correction, and a number of other convicts have been attacked by the malady. The significance of this arises out of the fact that the house of correction was planned and laid out upon the most approved sanitary principles, and yet the plague made its way within its walls. The medical deputation from Egypt, which has been here a little time, visited the jail, where a number of convicts were inoculatea with specially prepared prophylactic vaccine by Prof. Hagfcine. Members of the police force are suffering severely. The position of Karachi is a most critical, and a perfect panic prevails in several other

Candlemas, oc-curring as it does on the second of February, may well be the survival of the Roman Lupercalia, the Februa, or rites of lustration performed on the fifteenth of that month for centuries before the Babe lay in the manger before the Babe lay in the manger of Bethelem. The use of candles, although considered typical of the pro-phetic words of Simeon, "A Light to lighten the Gentiles" is probably the relic of that feature of the Lupercalia, when during days of riotous license under the cloak of pious ceremonies, the people ran hither and thither carrying candles to represent the torch ith which Demeter sought her lost Persephone through the Plains of En-Beautiful myth-symbolizing so much truth, spiritual and physicalfair Persephone, reincarnate in the daffodils which sprung up on the banks of Cyane! The transition from the Lupercalia to Candlemas was but one of the many compromises by which pagan customs were baptized with Christian names.

In Scotland, where the time is of some official importance, as the chief quarter day, great fires called the "Candlemass bleeze" — glimmerings from the ashes of the long extinct worship of Baal-were lighted on the hilltops, and woe betide that neigh-borhood where for any reason the fire did not burn the livelong night. Candlemas is one of the few festi-vals of the church of which Puritanism has left no tradition in popular parlance. This may be because it is a noteworthy "observation day," and in every northern land there cluster about it proved predictions of the duration of winter. It is the one day of the year when the sun is unwelcome. A German proverb declares the shepherd would rather see the wolf in his fold than the sun on Candlemas Day. The story of the bear who rouses himself from his long slumber Day. and comes out of his hole, returning to sleep six weeks longer if he sees his shadow, is told of the woodchuck (or groundhog), and in many countries of the badger and other hibernating animals. A Scotch saw runs thus:

"If Candlemas Day be dry and fair, The ha'f o' winter's to come and mair; If Candlemas Day be wet and foul, The ha'f o' winter's gane at Yule."

Its substance is embodied in our own saying: "Half your wood and half your hay on Candlemas Day," a practical measure of the winter stores.

The general meteorological truths crystallized in these proverbs, many of them hoary with the rime of ages, are obvious to one who studies the "skiey influences," and they may thus tend to preserve something of our vanishing fireside lore. If, as has been well said, popular customs contain the germs of history, it is equally true that the current beliefs and even the superstitions of a people are the seedfields of philosophy and of sociology, from which may be reaped a

Copper in Canada.

Canada produces far more cooper than she uses. In 1895, 8,789,162 pounds were mined in Canada, valued at \$949,-229. Of this quantity Ontario exported \$123,997 worth; Quebec, \$15,692, and British Columbia \$97,276; total value of copper exported, \$236,965. The year 1894 was the first in which British Columbia appeared as an exporter of this metal. In that year the value of copper exported from British Columbia was \$54.883. This year the yield will be much increased. In these circumstances, it is satisfactory to know that there is a better outlook for this metal in the world's markets. The recent demand in Europe and the United States has been exceptionally heavy, the increase being chiefly due to the growing use of copper wire for electrical purposes. The application of electricity on the continent,

particularly in Austria-Hungary and Germany, is extending rapidly, and an enormous demand for copper in those countries has depleted the general stock. According to the New York Mail and Express the demand may exceed the supply in the near future.

Cubans Fired on Them From the River Bank.

The Spaniards Lose Over 100 Men in the Encounter.

How the Dons Conduct Their Side of the Struggle-Hospitals Burned-Surgeons, Nurses and Patients Butchered.

New York, Feb. 2.-A Key West, Fla., special says: Another marine disaster to the river expeditions was badly used up. Fifteen boats are said to have been sunk, 100 men are reported to have been killed or to be missing, and the number of wounded is put at 75. Hearing that the insurgents had fortified some heights near Paez, on the River Caunao, Santa Clara Province, Gen. Weyler sent Col. Serves with 300 Liverpool, Feb. 1.—The following are the stocks of breadstuffs and proviproceeding up the river about 20 miles, a heavy fire was opened on the ex-pedition with rifles and six-pounder

field pieces.

The fourth shot from the cannon sank one boat. A second later anlard, 67,000 tierces; cheese, 57,400 boxes; other boat was sunk. The Spanish drove the insurgents off, but could not capture the cannon. A few miles from Paez the Cubans opened fire with two cannons. Six boats were quickly sunk, and then the rebel rifles played havoc with the Spanish soldiers as they struggled in the water. Four of the wounded men were caught by alligators near the shore and

dragged under. Coi. Serves was forced to order a retreat, which speedily became a route. Hastily the boats pulled back, but the Cubans pursued, keeping up a constant fire and sinking more boats. Had not a reinforcement met the Spanish ten miles from Cienfuegos not 100 men would have escaped. Gen. Weyler has made no official re-port of this disaster.

SPANISH TACTICS. New York, Feb. 2.—A special from Key West, Fla., says: A horrible story comes from Remedesa, in which the Cubans had a large hospital, where were quartered sick and wounded soldiers. Near the insurgent camp was also located the well-known leper hospital of Cardosa, in which were about twenty unfortunates. Guarding the insurgent hos-pital was a company of Cuban amazons, numbering about 70, under com-mand of Senorita Inez Alvarez, whose father and brothers had been butchered by Spaniards, and who had taken

up arms for revenge.
The hospital was in a solitary location, and was thought to be safe from Spanish molestation. But a colonel of the Spanish Regiment de Bourbons operating in that district, learned of the hospital's location, and sent 500 men to destroy it.

fired the buildings. The inmates and amazon guards awoke to find flames roaring about them. The sick and wounded soldiers could not escape, but the amazons rushed out only to greeted by a murderous fire. FOUGHT BRAVELY.

The amazons fought bravely, but they were only a handful compared to the Spaniards, and were soon shot down. Many of these were butchered, except eight, whose beauty led the Spanish commander to order them saved for a fate worse than death In the hospital were more than 70 sick and wounded soldiers, six surgeons and ten nurses. Not one escaped, and including the amazons,



Premier Laurier.

Enthusiastic Welcome at Orillia. The Liberal Leader on Live Public

Questions. Orillia, Ont., Feb. 2.-Hon. Wilfrid Laurier spoke yesterday in the opera house to a crowded audience. Hundreds of people were unable to gain admission, and an overflow meeting was held in Shaftesbury Hall, where the Premier spoke again for a few minutes. When Mr. Laurier arrived at 12:20 p.m. on the Northern he was met by an immense crowd of people, who gave him an ovation. The town band played, and Mayor Sanderson was present in his official capacity to welcome the distinguished campaigner. A mounted guard of honor preceded

the Premier's sleigh up town, and then followed a long procession of

In the course of his address the Premier said that through Mr. Fisher's efforts the Government had just had the embargo against Canadian cattle removed by the United States, and he wished to state here that the policy of the Government would be that of more intimate trade relations with the United States. Whenever this was spoken of there was always a cry of "treason" from the Conservatives, but nevertheless that was the Government's policy. They were not going to approach their neighbors to the south in a cringing manner, asking for favors, or as annexationists, but as Canadians and as British subjects looking for friendly trade relation between the two countries. His instructions to any commission which he may send will be to approach the American Government in that spirit but if they expect or hope for us to go back on Old England, then we will have to close all negotiations.

THE SCHOOL QUESTION. As regards the school question, he had heard that Mr. Foster was not satisfied with the terms of the settle ment. He did not expect to satisfy everybody, Mr. Foster least of all. There were only two ways in which the ruestion could have been settledcoercion or conciliation. The Conservative Government had tried the former for six years, without success the school question, but he had anremedial legislation. 
