



world knows, were days of disappointment and deprivation. His resourced were small, his genius unappreciated his hearing entirely gone, and-small wonder!—his temper was a very irritable one. He dragged out his life in a workhouse near Baden, often needing the ordinary comforts of life An incident connected with these last days, an incident of the utmost pathos, is told in Temple Ear by Alice Quarry. "He had been deaf for 25 years, nearly half of his life, when, in 1827, a letter reached him at Baden from his nephew, the being dearest to him on earth.
