Juarez, April 1 .- Juarez waited today for definite news of General Villa's position in his attack on Torreon. Reports received by General Carranza last night indicated that fighting still was in progress. No idea was obtained as to when the relative positions of the rebels and Federals would change.

General Carranza today seemed confident that his military chieftain would conquer the Federals under General Refugio Velasco. The report that heavy reinforcements for the federal leader were approaching Torreon did not shake his

confidence. Both armies are said to be so worn and exhausted by continued fighting that the present action lacks the virility of the rebel conquest of Gomez Palacio.





Rev. S. E. McKegney Lays Poverty in Ireland at Door of Heavy Taxation.

In an address on "A Trip Around Ireland," last night in Dundas Center Methodist Church, Rev. S. E. McKegney gave some interesting facts on home rule and its effect in Ireland. It was not a political question, but rather a religious and national one, the result of which would leave a big im pression on the pages of history, said the speaker. One of the chief causes of poverty of the Irishman in his homeland was largely due to the great burden of taxation imposed on them by the Roman Catholic Church. In one neighborhood one would find a magnificent cathedral surrounded by hovels that the crudest of hygienic laws should condemn. The Protestants of Ireland have always been Government and law supporters.

"During the Boer war," said Mr. Mc-Kegney, "it was learned in the City of Armagh, mostly of Roman denomination, that a Catholic was fighting in the ranks of the Boers. They were jubilant to learn of this. Later a report came through that this deserter had been killed. They immediately erected a monument to his memory in he main street of the city. When the Irish troops of the neighborhood returned home after the war they asked permission of the civic authorities to erect a monument to the memory of their dead comrades. This permission of was refused and the monument was erected on private property. Any one visiting the city at the present time can see this monument, as described.

### WIDER POWER FOR THE RAILWAY BOARD

Proposal of Bill Consolidating Railway Act-Second Reading Granted.

Ottawa, March 31. - After a second reading being granted to the bill consolidating the railway act in the Senate today, Hon. Mr. Lougheed moved that it be referred to a joint committee of the Senate and House of Commons. This precipitated a discussion when Senator Bostock, the Opposition leader, opposed the move.

In moving second reading, Hon. Mr. Lougheed said the past revision had been in 1906. Since that time there had been twelve amending acts, which had been embodied in the revision. In the revision the experience of the law in the courts had been observed, and counsel has been taken from railway organizations, rail-

ways, the railway commission, etc.

The representations of boards of trade and other public bodies, made from time to time, had also been considered. In revising the railway act, care had been taken not to disturb the phraseology of sections which satisfactorily had stood the test of experience and time. When sections had not proved satisfactory they had been remodeled.

#### More Power for Commission.

The rates charged by telephone, telegraph, power and electricity companies, well as express rates were placed under the jurisdiction of the railway com mission, as well as jurisdiction over charges of transportation of goods in Canada by water. Heretofore the commission has had jurisdiction only over the carriage of goods on water by railway companies. There were changes in the expropriation provisions, and it was made more clear that the board could submit questions of jurisdicition to the supreme







TO CLEAN OLD HOUSE. Do you remember what Nathaniel Haw-thorne says in "The House of the Seven Gables"-that each generation is entitled to new houses, that old houses are tainted of their past? That is just the way every housekeeper feels when moving day comes and she must see that her family gets omfortably settled in a new abiding place that has before that time been the home

of somebody else. Moving is bad enough at best, but it is surely more difficult when the house to be moved into is old than when it is new. However, intelligently directed cleaning will do wonders to freshen up old and dingy rooms and to remove any stains or spots that have been carelessly left in coms that have been refurnished

If mortar or paint have been spattered on the window glass, it can be removed with boiling hot vinegar, applied with a heavy cloth; and after the paint or mortar are entirely removed, the window should be washed in the regular manner. If there is a choking odor of fresh paint in the house it will be largely absorbed by pails or tubs or jardinieres of water containing each a handful of hay which should be left in the rooms which have

been painted for twenty-four hours. Grease stains can be removed from the loors by making a mixture of a quarter of a pound each of pearl ash and Fuller's ash, and a quart of boiling water. This should be spread on the floor and left there for twenty-four hours, and then the floor should be washed with hot water in which washing soda, a little of it. has been dissolved.

If any of the drains from sinks and wash basins seem to be clogged, they can be cleansed with washing soda. of it should be crumbled into the pipe and then bubbling, boiling water should be lowly poured over it. This solution will clean the pipe from grease and if it seems still clogged, a plumber's attention will probably reveal the presence of solid subances hair or dust or bits of paper or



## COUNTY PRISON FARM CHAIRMAN BECK IS SUMMER SUNDAY SOME DISTANCE AWAY OVERRULED ON

Newspapermen Denied Admittance to Hydro Meeting in Spite of Him.

RUMPUS OVER THE RATES

Minister Points Out Conference With London Commission Was Not Private.

Toronto, April 1.—Publicity was denied yesterday in the controversy between the Provincial Hydro-electric Power Commission and the civic body over the reduction of rates in Toronto. Representatives of both bodies got together in the Parliament Buildings to discuss the situation and see whether the mandate of Hon. Adam Beck and his colleagues was to be obeyed.

When Beck thought differently. "The reasons for refusing to reduce the rates in Toronto have been fully set forth in the press for the past three months ty the members of the Civic Commission. This is now a matter of public interest.' "That has nothing to do with this eeting," replied Mr. McNaught.

"This is not a private meeting," declared the Hydro Chairman, who supported his position with a letter written by the Commission to the city ordering a reduction of rates, and a controversy followed stating why the reommendation was not adopted.

"That has nothing to do with eeting," persisted Mr. McNaught. "Since this Commission has been established we have never had a public neeting," interrupted Col. Hendrie.

'No one objected to the press being admitted when we discussed the city of London rates," said Mr. Beck, pointing to an accepted precedent. "That is different," continued Mr. Mc-

AT THE CANADIAN CLUB

Antarctic Explorer Refers To Noble Character of Comrade Who Perished.

Commander Evans, who succeeded the late Capt. Scott in command of the Antarctic expedition in which the latter lost his life, was the guest or the London Canadian Club at luncheon in the Tecumseh grillroom today at noon. He commented on the "magnificent spirit of patriotism," which was so much in evidence in Canada, a finer patriotism than which he doubted if any Britisher had ever set eyes upon. Delighted With Welcome.

The speaker was delighted with Canada from every viewpoint. He spoke of the intense feeling of welcome which he had experienced in Canada, and of the loyal spirit of co-operation evidenced in each of the component parts of the empire n defeating the married women's bill Each part of the empire had mannerisms and habits of its own, but out on the bleak Antarctic stretches of uninhabited territory these mannerisms did not irritate as they did in civilization. All were brothers with British ideals.

Commander Evans spoke of the noble politics, who are openly asking, "Why do and self-sacrificing character of Captain Scott, of his solicitude for the welfare of other members of his expedition, and of the noble, altruistic and thoughtful spirit evidenced in the last message written before his death. Commander Evans stated that all obligations incurred by the expedition had now been met.

All the officers and scientists had been granted a bonus of a full years pay, besides their pay for the expedition. the naval members had been promoted in the British navy. All the members of the expedition had benefited personally by broadened ideals, greater powers of endurance and greater readiness to meet troubles and difficulties. Ready To Man Ships.

## FIGURES IN REALTY FIGHT

Hume Cronyn is Principal in Big Land Transaction Being Sifted Out.

An interesting legal fight, involving a big realty deal which was being arranged by Hume Cronyn, of this city, is now being fought in the supreme court of British Columbia at Victoria.

Robert W. Clarke, a real estate broker of that city, is suing George W. Swan, a dealer in lands, for \$14,000 damages, basing his claim on the assertion that through misrepresentation of the quality ugh misrepresentation of the quality of certain Naas Valley lands he has been unable to complete the deal, which involved a sum of \$115,000. Mr. Cronyn, volved a sum of \$115,000. Mr. Cronyn, it is said, paid \$50,000 without seeing the property, on the strength of Mr. Swan's description, but after making a personal investigation he refused to complete the transaction. On the witness stand, Clarke stated that Swan, who surveyed the land in question, did not tell him that it was all bottom land, but him that it was all bottom land, but gave him to understand that it was good average agricultural acreage. Justice Macdonald is trying the case, which is provoking much interest.

Mr. Cronyn is at present absent from the city in England, and no confirmation as to the extent of his interest in the big deal could be obtained.

#### Century Old Exercise Book Quaintly Tells of Old Time Arithmetic

"John Park, Newland Hill, March

19th, 1813 Year." This is the copper-plate-written inscription on one of the yellowed leaves of a schoolbook which belongs to Thomas Grieve, R. R. Carrier No. 1, Wilton Grove, near this city. It was handed down to him from ancestors. The book was John Park's Arithmetic, which is quaintly stated, above another signature of the owner. The writing has faded in its century-old age, to a dark brown, but it can be quite easily read, although the flourishes and the double s' are puzzling at

Arithmetic seems to have been as different, in those long-ago days, as the fashions were. The chapters book are written in large, shaded scrolls at the head of every page, and such headings as: "Of Simple Rule of Three" and "of Fellowship" would make a modern scholar wonder.

In those days of '13 when the very atmosphere cried "War," and national and martial spirit was rife, and when an insult meant a duel, nevertheless little Johnny Park was like all youngsters of all time; he started his nice new Arithmetic Book in beautifully written script, but toward the end of those sixty-odd pages, Johnny, no doubt, became mightily tired of his Rule of Three, and his Barter and Exchange, for the writing is far from neat, and the double-ruled lines are awry and thick. This is one of the signs that John Park, of 1813, was just like young Mr. Schoolboy of 1914, No doubt they were similar in hun-
