

Mayor Judd Elected for a Second Term; Has Majority of 922 Over Ald. Greenlees

Chairman Darch Re-Elected to the Water Commission--Nine of the 1906 Aldermen Again on the Council--Five Conservative School Trustees Returned-- Three Bylaws Carry and as Many Defeated.

Mayor Judd was re-elected over his opponent, Ex-Ald. Greenlees, yesterday by a majority of 922, which is 259 more than the majority he received over Ald. Elect Stevely a year ago. Yesterday Mr. Judd received 3,421 votes in a total vote polled of 5,299, Mr. Greenlees polling only 2,499 votes. A year ago 6,405 votes were polled, or 185 more than yesterday.

GERMAN VIEW OF CANADA'S POLICY

After discussing Canada's three tariffs—general, intermediate and preferential—Export says that the situation or relations with Germany are still strained. The differentiation in Germany's tariff rates that resulted in laying burdens on Canada, it is claimed, resulted from misunderstandings.

The writer hopes that Germany is ready to remove the burdens with which she met Canada's importations in favor of the United Kingdom and about which Canada complained when they were put on and concerning which she complains.

Germany is ready to reciprocate, says this writer, and he urges an arrangement that will benefit both parties. Possibilities are pointed out that would benefit the exports of sugar and other manufactured products under the intermediate tariff schedule.

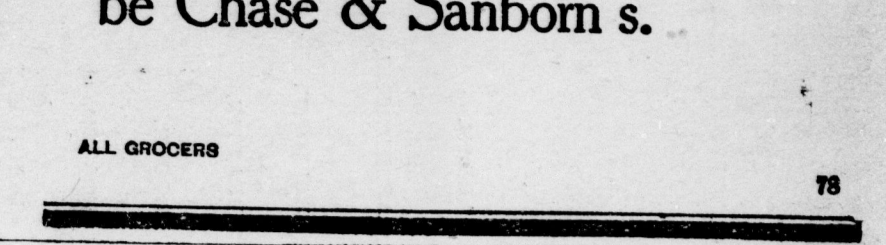

HOW THE SKYLARK WENT ON ROCKS

Left Toronto to Go to Port Stanley, Was Disabled, and Drifted Ashore.

Toronto, Jan. 8.—The tug Skylark, of the Haney and Miller fleet, which went ashore in Lake Erie, near Port Maitland, Friday morning, and was battered to pieces by a southwesterly sea the next day, was on route from Toronto to Port Stanley. She was 65 feet long, and was rebuilt three years ago.

A bylaw must not be submitted for a period covering a year and a day, so that it could not be put before the electors in January, 1908, as election day will fall on the first Monday of the new year, Jan. 6, and the year and a day from Jan. 7, 1907, will not have elapsed by that time.

Thus according to present figuring, it will be necessary to submit the scheme at a special vote, if it is again placed before the people in 1908.

In certain quarters the fear was expressed today that the insurance men will increase the rate of insurance. Many businessmen scouted the idea, however.

"We have one of the finest fire brigades in Canada, they are well equipped and by careful management we will be able to pull through without danger until our water supply is increased."

The management of the London Canning Company and the Wortman & Ward Manufacturing Company were deeply disappointed at the result of the votes against the exemption by-laws.

Canning Company's Position. The city is in a peculiar position regarding the canning company. The manufacturers' committee a year ago strained every nerve to bring the company here, and the council guaranteed the company a fixed assessment of \$4,000 for ten years. Now the people have refused to endorse the bargain made by the manufacturers' committee and the council a year ago.

Mr. R. P. Allen, manager of the company, stated to The Advertiser today that he was not yet in a position to say what effect the defeat of the company's bylaw will have.

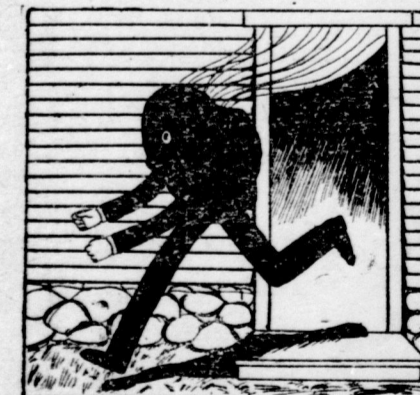
