



Attractive Exhibit.

In the main hall, the centre and larger space, is practically given over to the displays of fruit. On either side of the fruit the exhibits of cut flowers, poted plants, ferns and palms, and special exhibits are arranged. The arrangement of the potted plants and ferns has been most beautifully accomplished. In former years there was a tendency to have all the flowers together and the plants off by themselves. This year, however, both flowers, ferns and plants have been arranged in a most attractive and tasteful manner, and all visitors to the building are loud in their praise of the new method.


