Dr. E. E. Braithwaite Reveals Western Ontario's Greatness

Dr. E. E. Braithwaite, president of Western University, gave some remarkably interesting statistics to Premier Hearst yesterday in senting the claim for a grant of \$150,000 toward the building of a Medical School. He said that the thirteen counties tributary to London had a population of 717,000. The corresponding thirteen counties of Eastern Ontario, of which Kingston was the centre, had a population of only 456,000, while the thirteen counties tributary to Toronto in Central Ontario, excluding York County and the city of Toronto, had a population of 525,000. Western Ontario also had the greatest number of high schools, continuation schools and collegiate institutes of any part of the province, and these were the most important feeders of a university.

Young people, he said, did not go in large numbers to a great distance for university education. Harvard, for instance, with students from all over the United States, and even from abroad, drew 44 per cent of its students from the state of Massachusetts, in which it was situated. It was a most important thing that a greater proportion of the population should be well educated. The safety of democracy depended on the intelligence of the people, for if the majority of the people were not well educated the will of the ignorant majority would prevail.
