NEW TECHNICAL SCHOOL ROOMS RECOMMENDED

Advisory Committee Plans Wing To Accommodate 150 More Pupils.

URGENT NEED CLAIMED

Motion of Trustee Rowe Is Passed and Sent to Board of Education.

The first meeting of the Advisory Vocational Committee of Board of Education was held in the Technical School Monday evening, at which Principal H. B. Beal submitted his report for the month of January, together with the proposal for building the auditorium which was left out of the original building at the time of erection on account of the lack of funds. The addition to be added to the school includes a gymnasium on the ground floor with an auditorium and two class rooms above it which will be situated in the center of the present building so that three of the walls of the new part consisting of retaining walls already standing.

It is felt that physical training and auditorium accommodation is urgently needed for the 580 full-time students at present in attendance at the technical school. The most pressing need, however, is for class room accommodation. The present day attendance taxes the entire class room accommodation and several rooms which have been taken for that purpose. If more class room is ot provided before next fall, it is feared that from one hundred to one hundred and fifty students will have to be refused admission.

Moves Approval. A motion from Trustee Rowe to approve of the proposal, was passed and sent to the board of education for sanction, these in turn to be sent to the department of education. As the unit is to be erected for technical school purposes, one-half of the cost of the building and equip-

KINGSTON, Ont., Feb. 6.-W. F. Nickle, K.C., Conservative, was elected in today's provincial by-election over R. F. Elliott, Liberal, by a majority of 517 votes.





A NEW-ENCYCLOPEDIA OF FREE-MASONRY. By Arthur Edward Waite, P. M., P. Z., Past Senior Grand Warden of Iowa, etc. In two volumes. Illustrated. Philadelphia: The David McKay Com-

FREEMASONRY now has about two and a half million adher-ents throughout the world. It is not only the largest, but also the oidest and most distinguished of existing

To the general non-Masonic public it has always been somewhat of a mystery, though in truth it is not so. The difficulty in understanding Freemasonry has been due partly to its extensive and varied symbolis partly to its curious historical development, which dates back many centuries. At first it may seem surprising that royal princes, presidents of great republics, generals and men eminent in all walks of life should belong to a society which has been described as the lineal descendant of those craftsmen who raised the few men watched the promenade of mannequins gliding to and fro with buildings of the Middle Ages.

dant Orders. The concordant orders, the associations and movements which have arisen from time to time within the fraternity, have added largely to the ritual and symbolism, which to outsiders are so bewildering, and the explanation of which occupies the greater part of Mr. Waite's two large

This new encyclopedia represents an enormous amount of research, is informed by a keenly critical spirit, and reveals a fine literary sense. The only complaint to be made is that Mr. Waite is too much inclined to write in a discursive and yet elliptical style which makes it hard for any one not learned in Masonic lore to catch his meaning. For a work of this kind a simpler and more directly informative way of writing would have been vastly preferable. However, one cannot help liking the vigor with which Mr. Waite wields the new broom of his up-to-date criticism and makes a clean sweep of errors old and new. An enormous quantity of pseudo-historical speculation, invention and legend has gathered around the various rites and orders of Freemasonry.

While the examination of these matters will appeal primarily to Masons, such as the connection of Freemasonry with the mysteries of the ancient Egyptians and Greeks, or the article on the Building Guilds, where we get a good example of Mr. Waite's manner. After commenting on "the forced and unconvincing analogies which are instituted between the proper usages of operative tools and the moralization made upon them-at once stilted and ineffective." he goes goes on to dal very emphatically with the grossness and crudity of the suggestion by modern Masonic expositors that the "art of building temples in the heart arose by direct and historical derivation from the art of material building."






