The diner and sleeper did not go down. Dry Creek empties into the Fountain less than a half mile below the wreck, and it was dry two hours after the accident. The bodies of two women and a girl, probably 15 years old, which were the first to be recovered, were found half a mile below the wreck. They were among the occupants of the chair car. The bodies were covered with mud and have not been identified.

## Will the United States Submit?

The Russian prize court at Vladivostock has given a decision in the case of the steamer Arabia, captured by the Russian cruiser Gromoboi. The Arabia is a British ship, but carried a cargo of flour consigned by Americans to Japanese ports. The prize court orders the confiscation of the flour, laying down a principle which no other nation has affirmed in recent times namely, that provisions are contraband of war. The United States cannot consistently submit to this ruling. In 1793, when war was being waged in Europe, she resisted the attempt to make foodstuffs contraband, except when consigned to a blockaded port, or obviously for military use. She has never receded from that position, but has continually asserted it. In the Boer war when a British cruiser seized a cargo of American footstuffs in Delagoa Bay, the United States demanded and was at once awarded damages.

Great Britain is in accordance with the United States on this question. Their interests are mutual. Last year the United States shipped to the British market \$160,000,000 worth of provisions. If Great Britain were at war with any European power, this ous. enormous commerce would be imperiled if the Russian doctrine prevailed. Every vessel under an American or any neutral flag, carrying foodstuffs to Great Britain for consumption by the British people, would be liable to confiscation of cargo. It is plain, therefore, that neither the United have forgotten something, sir." States nor Great Britain can afford to allow the decision of the Vladivostock prize court to pass into international law. The confiscation would have been regular had it been shown that the cargo of the Arabia was intended for the troops in Manchuria and Korea, but the Russians seem to have acted on the assumption that the destination of it has been beaten. The United States last year shipped \$12,000,000 worth of wheat and flour to Japan, so that her Pacific commerce will be paralyzed during the continuance of the war, if the Russian decision holds. Great Britain has already entered a protest against the seizure of the Arabia. This war has shown the necessity for a convention of the powers to frame laws regarding contraband of war, which shall be binding upon every country.

# LONDON GIRLS

Blacking Packers Act as Their Czar's Officers Pre e. Talking Japanese were repulsed with tremenof Swords Rather Than Own Pickets in Defiance Strategy. of the Police.

Aug. 8. - One of the strangest sights in London now is the wonderful crowd gathered round the sword, and you will constantly see them discussing the quality of their blades, gates of Messrs. Day & Martin's blackjut as in other armies officers discuss ing factory in the Southwark bridge the latest type of pistol.

It is made up of excited work girls and blase policemen. The work girls are mostly young, and are moved strangely in different ways; at one moment they are shricking defiance, at the next they sit down in rows and sing comic songs to the accompaniment of a tambourine obligate on the crown of their straw hats.

Any work girl who approaches the works is instantly surrounded. She is reasoned with by half a dozen excited young women, she looks up at the big works, and her jaw sets. "Not me," she says, and the crowd cheers. All newcomers hear the same story Once upon a time Messrs. Day & Martin paid 15 cents a gross for packing some of their goods. This they gradually reduced to 8 cents, and they now propose to pay only 6 cents. Notice of force and 48 girls employed in three rooms struck work in consequence.

Yesterday morning other girls employed by the firm were asked to do the work of the strikers. They refused, and amidst scenes of the greatest enthusiasm left the factory and joined their sister strikers in the street. Now nearly 100 out of the 150 female employes of the firm are out on strike. e of them, a wretched little overworked girl, spoke. She came out of a room where russet cream for brown boots was packed. For labeling, dusting, wrapping, boxing and packing a gross of these bottles 8 cents had be paid, which was now reduced to 6. The girl declared that her average earnings had been only about \$2 50 a week, and the reduction they would not

graceful does he ride.
"As for the Grand Duke's moral make-up. I fear there is little can be said in praise of it. He is an inveterate gambler. While he was in New York he went to Canfield's at every opportunity. Sometimes he lost quite heavily and at others he won. "He probably didn't average more than four hours' sleep a day while in this country. He is a flery-tempered, courageous, imperious man and when he went to the front some months ago I looked for some kind of trouble. I see he soon got into it. He collided with Kuropatkin and the latter reprimanded him. This angered the Grand Duke, who drew his sword on the commander-in-chief. This resulted in Boris recall by the Czar to St. Petersburg."
