

HISTORY OF STANLEY CUP.

THE STANLEY CUP, emblematic of the professional championship of the world and the prize most sought after in hockey, was donated to the Amateur Hockey Association of Canada in 1893 by the late Lord Stanley of Preston, then Governor-General of Canada, as a challenge trophy to be competed for and held by champions of recognized senior leagues at that time, one match only to be necessary to decide the winners.

The first holders of the cup were the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association team, as champions of the A.H.A. of Canada, 1893.

1894—Osgoode Hall Hockey Club, challenged, but match declared off on account of lack of ice. 1895—M.A.A.A. defeat Queen's University, 5 to 1; Montreal Victorias, champions A.H.A., take the cup.

1897—Montreal Victorias defea Capitals of Ottawa (Cen. Can. Association) 15-5.
1898—Montreal Victorias hold cup. No chal-

1899—Decided with trustees' permission to play two out of three series instead of suddendeath game as heretofore. Montreal Victorias defeat Winnipeg Victorias, first game 2 to 1; second unfinished, Winnipeg leave ice owing to dispute over referees' decisions.

1900—Shamrocks of Montreal, as champions of A H A take care

GEORGE BOUCHER—Played hockey for New Edinburgs and Aberdeens and Royal Canadiens, of Ottawa; has been a pro several years.

HARRY BROADBENT—New Edinburgh team Ottawa City League and was also a member of Ottawas in 1915. Won honors in France.

CY DENENNY—Comes from Cornwall. Cy has played for Toronto and has been with Ottawa several years.

MORLEY BRUCE—Played for Hopewells in the Intermediate City League and then New Edinburgh. He was overseas for many months.

JACK MCKELL—Played for Munitions and New Edinburghs in City League and turned pro this season.

COZY DOLAN—Trainer of the club halls from the U.S.A. A well-known baseball player, "Cozy" is a skillful "masseur" and the team shows the result.

PETIE GREEN—"Crafty" Peter has handled more winners than "Pop" Geers and has the ability to inject that harmonious spirit which is so conspicuous in the Ottawa camp.


