Household Hints.

Salt.—Apart from its use as a seasoning salt is invaluable to the house-keeper. Following are some of the uses to which it may be put.

To clean willow furniture use salt and water. Apply it with a nail-brush, scrub well and dry thoroughly.

When broiling steak, throw a little salt on the coals and the blaze from dripping fat will not annoy.

Damp salt will remove the discoloration of cups and saucers caused by tea and careless washing.

Brass work can be kept beautifully bright by occasionally rubbing with salt and vinegar.

Wash the mica of the stove doors with salt and vinegar.

Salt in whitewash will make it stick better.

Carpets may be greatly brightened by first sweeping thoroughly and then going over them with a clean cloth and clear salt and water. Use a cupful of coarse salt to a large basin of water.

Salt as a tooth powder is better than almost anything that can be bought. It keeps the teeth brilliantly white and the gums hard and rosy.

If, after having a tooth pulled, the mouth is filled with salt water it will allay the danger of having a hemorrhage.

If the feet are tender or painful after long standing great relief can be had by bathing them in salt water. A handful of salt to a gallon of water is the right proportion. Have the water as hot as can comfortably be borne. Immerse the feet and throw the water over the legs as far as the knees with the hands. When the water becomes too cool rub briskly with a flesh towel. This method, if used night and morning, will cure neuralgia of the feet.

Cleaning Bright Silver Work.

Solution No. 1. Dissolve a piece of soap three times as large as a walnut in one quart of water; add a wineglassful of ammonia. Use boiling hot.

Solution No. 2. Dissolve a piece of cyanide of potassium (poison) twice as large as a walnut in one quart of water. Use warm.

Directions. Wash the article and brush with solution No. 1, then rinse in boiling water, after which dip it in solution No. 2. Rinse again in boiling water, and this should be followed by washing and brushing with solution No. 1; then rinse with boiling water and wipe it dry. This method must not be used to clean oxidized work.

To Loosen Glass Stoppers.

Take a narrow strip of woolen or cotton cloth about a yard long. Fasten one end to the knob of a door or any other fixture, holding the other end in the left hand. Hold the bottle firmly in the right hand, loop the neck in the strip of cloth and while stretching the strip pretty tight move the bottle quickly backwards and forwards between the knob and the hand until the neck becomes heated by the friction. Allow it to cool and the stopper will generally come out easily.

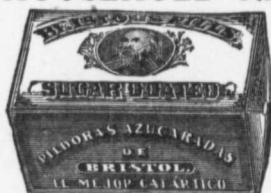

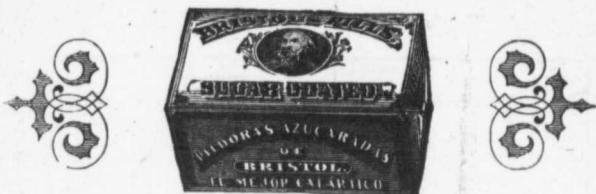

ODD ITEMS.

THE WORLD'S POPULATION.

Married Persons Live Longer than Single Ones.

There are about 1,500,000,000 inhabitants on the globe. Of these 33,033,033 die every year. There are 3,064 languages, and over one thousand religions professed by the people. The number of males and females is about equal and their average life is about thirty-three years; one fourth of the inhabitants die before they reach their fifteenth year. To 1,000 persons only one reaches the age of 100 years, to every 100 only six reach the age of 65, and not more than one in 500 lives to see the eightieth year; 33,033,033 dying every year, make a grand total of 91,824 per day, 3,730 per hour, sixty a minute, or one every time the clock ticks!

Married persons live longer than single ones, and the tall have a better chance for long life than those of short stature. Women have more chances of life in their favor previous to 50 years of age than men have but fewer afterwards.

The number of marriages is in proportion of 75 to every 1,000 born; the time when the greatest number of marriages takes place is in June and December—about the time of the summer and winter solstices. Dark-haired persons have a better chance in the great struggle for existence than those of the opposite complexion, except in contagious diseases, where blondes are comparatively exempt. A person born in hot weather stands the heat a great deal better than one born in the cold months of winter; of course, the rule works vice versa. Those born in the spring are usually of a more robust constitution than if born at any other time of the year. Births are more frequent by night than by day.

—Up to the fifteenth year, most young people require ten hours, and till the twentieth year nine hours' sleep. After that age, everyone finds out how much he or she requires, though, as a general rule, at least six or eight hours are necessary. Eight hours' sleep will prevent more nervous derangements in women than any medicine can cure.

Persons who have passed middle age have only a certain amount of reserve force, and all that they draw upon in hurries is abstracted from that which should be distributed through the remainder of life. The secret of longevity is probably skill in so economizing the reserve of vital energy as to make it last out an unusual period.

Eight Words and All the Letters.

Half a dozen members of the Press Club were discussing the peculiarities of the English language one evening when Dr. F. E. Rice took the Argus to task for printing a paragraph which read about as follows; "The following is said to be the shortest sentence in the English language containing all the letters of the alphabet: 'John P. Brady gave me a black walnut box of quite small size.' The entire sentence contains less than twice the number of letters in the alphabet." "That's a good sentence of its kind," said the Doctor, "but I think if you will carefully study the sentence, 'Pack my box with five dozen liquor jugs,' you will find that it contains less letters than the sentence you published, and yet omits no letter in the alphabet."
