ANNUAL REPORT.

The Board of Directors present this, the Thirty-Ninth Annual Report of the affairs of the Hospital for the year ending September 30th, 1889.

The income for the year, as compared with last year was :-

The total sum expended during the past year for provisions, medicine, fuel, salaries and wages was \$8,985.95; for the previous year the amount was \$10,690.76.

The total number of patients admitted during the year was 329. For the prior year the number was 415.

The aggregate number of days treatment in the Hospital was 15,011. For the previous year the number was 17,551.

The average cost of each patient per day was 59.4 cents; and for the year 1888 the cost was nearly sixty-one cents.

The Statistical, Financial, Medical and other Statements for the past year are hereto appended.

The repairs and improvements made to the building before the closing of the last year have conducted very much to the comfort and convenience of the patients and the working staff.

Two Life-Directors have died during the past year, namely, Charles T. Bate and Jonathan Francis, and one Life-Director has been added to the list, namely, Charles Macnab.

The old Hospital for infectious diseases is in an efficient state, and during the year now ending, has satisfactorily served its important purpose.

The Consulting and Attending Staffs of Physicians have, as usual, been assiduous in the discharge of their respective duties.

The Directors desire to thank the different municipalities that have contributed to the funds; the collectors for their services; the proprietors of the "Free Press," "Journal" and "Citizen" newspapers, for important announcements, etc.; James Lindsay and T. W. Kenny, Jr., Auditors; and Messrs. S. Rogers and Son, Undertakers, for donating their accounts for burials.

The Directors acknowledge with thankfulness, the visits of many of the city clergymen; members of the Young Men's Christian Association; the ladies appointed by the several churches; the young ladies of the Flower Mission; and persons in their private capacity.

The Directors with sorrow, record the lamented death of Benjamin Donaldson, one of the active workers of the Finance Committee.

Owing to the absence of funds, the Directors have not seen their way to conveniently commence the erection of the wing to complete the original plan of the building, and thereby meet the necessities caused by enlarged demands upon the Institution, but at no distant day they hope their successors, through the liberality of the friends of the Hospital, will be provided with means to complete the building and furnish the same for occupation.

Ottawa possesses no endowed charitable institution, yet an hospital should be one of the first institutions to commend itself to a Christian community; strange to say, however, the Directors have to announce that the only bequest received this year was one hundred dollars made by a widow, the late Mrs. Edward McGillivray; nevertheless, through the numerous and liberal contribution of the public, the efficiency of the Hospital has been maintained.

With gratitude to a Divine Providence, the Directors recognize the favorable circumstances which have prevailed during the past year, by the absence of any abnormal sickness or epidemics, and they close their work with the hope that the blessing of Almighty God will be upon the labor of their successors.
