To the Roman Catholics the Bible is a closed book-they are prohibited from reading it, and the result is lamentable in this country as well as on the continent of Europe. I point to these facts to show that the present and future prosperity of our Province depends on the thorough Bible education we give to our children. And I would ask-Where are they to get this? The District Schools do not furnish it; neither do the other schools established for secular education; and, therefore, we have to look to Sunday Schools as our only hope: and we expect, by promoting their interests, to attain the desired end. Proposed Concordat with Rome.

Hot Beds—How to Prepare.

Hot beds require attention during the first of this month. They are sometimes made by excavating the earth for the heating materials, though these are more frequently placed upon the surface. If stable manure alone is used, it is better to remove but little earth, but if leaves and tan are employed, and the ground selected for the bed is sufficiently dry, we prefer digging a pit two feet deep, and of any desired size, say twelve feet long and five feet wide, to be covered by four sashes, each three by five feet. If the ground holds water, a drain should be made from the pit, and stones, rails, or bones placed at the bottom. It is of the materials be kept dry after making the bed, else failure will be the result.

Pits are usually dug in the fall, because the frost is seldom out of the ground sufficiently early in the spring. These sides are sometimes built of brick, and kept for the purpose of forcing, year after year.

If severe weather should occur the whole may be covered with mats or straw for better protection.

After the plants have put out Itheir third leaf, the sashes should be raised a few inches every mild day to air them. This is especially important toward the latter part of their growth in the bed, as the heat and steam would soon scald or burn them up. The plants thus started are, of course, to be transplanted to the open ground as soon as the season will admit. With a single frame, and a very little expense and trouble, a large number of plants may be started so early as to gain three to five weeks over the usual garden growth .- American Agriculturist.

After speaking of the tragic scenes which have from time to time occurred in and around the Palace of the Tuileries, Dr. Baird related the following amusing occurence in a recent lecture :

Shortly after Bonaparte was made First Consul, and had installed himself in the Palace of the Tuileries, he held a grand reception and ball. But he experienced at that early day of his career no little difficulty in organizing his Court and making matters go smoothly. The old Noblesse, the splendid ornament of the deposed regime, were gone-fled from the country with the last remains of royalty itself. All was now new in the Palace of the Tuileries, furniture, people and everything else. On the occason referred to, the Palace was filled; four or five thousand people were there, many for the first time in their lives. Military officers of all grades and their wives, constituted the largest and by far the most self important portion of the company. 
