INTERNATIONAL COURTESIES.

Conveyed in a British Ship. LONDON, Maoch 4.—The British second class cruiser Talbot has been ordered from Bermuda to New York, in order to convey the remains of Lord Herschell from there to Portsmouth. The officials of the British foreign office say her majesty's government is deeply sensible of the courtesy and consideration shown by the government of the United States in offering a warship for the conveyance of the remains of the late Lord Herschell to England. But they add, the prior acceptance of a British warship for that purpose preclude the Lossibility of the family accepting the kind offer of the United States.

WASHINGTON, D. The ship will be under the command of Captain Cook and no flag officers will be aboard. This means that Admiral Schley will not be charged with this mission.
