Paris, Aug. 25 .- The French War Office has issued the following announcement: "The French and English, their plan of attack having failed owing to unforeseen difficulties, have retired on their covering positions West of the Meuse.

The English army on our left was attacked by the Germans but behaved admirably, holding its ground with traditional steadfastness.

The French assumed the aggressive with two army corps and an African brigade in the front line, carried away by their eagerness were received by a murderous fire. They did not give an inch, but, counter attacked by the Prussian guard, were obliged to retire, only however after inflicting enormous losses.

Prussian Guard Suffered Heavily

The Prussian guard especially suffered heavily.

East of the Meuse our troops advanced across an extremely difficult country and made a vigorous attack when they emerged from the woods but were obliged to fall back. After a stiff fight South of the River Semois, on order

of General Joffre, our troops and the British troops were withdrawn to the covering positions.

Our troops are intact, our cavalry has in no way suffered, our artillery has affirmed its superiority, our officers and soldiers are in the best of condition, morally, physically.

As a result of orders which have been issued, the aspect of the struggle will change for a few days.

Will Be Temporarily On the Defensive

The French army will remain for a time on the defensive but at the right moment, to be decided upon by the Commander-in-Chief, it will resume a vigorous offensive.

Felt It Less. Thus far, England has felt the war far less than any European nation engaged, probably less than Holland and Switzerland, but now, waitng for the issue of the battle and for the lists of the killed and wounded, the English people understand all that it means.

Every boat from Belgium comes crowded with impoverished refugees who have fled before the Germa ninvasion. An organization is being formed to care for these people and part of the Prince of Wales' relief fund, which amounts to more than \$7,500,000 will be sent to Antwerp for sufferers who have taken refuge there.

Thousands of Belgians have crossed the French border for asylum and the committee will arrange for their relief.

England and France apparently propose to care for their smaller ally who thus far has borne the brunt of the hardships which war entails.

Newfoundland responds to the Homeland's Call and promises to enlist, equip and despatch to England the First Newfoundland Regiment of 500 strong. We want to send our best, and we believe that Britain's Oldest Colony will gain greater honour and glory for Her Name.

If you are between 19 and 35 years old, will you answer your Country's Call? If you will, then go to the nearest Magistrate and enrol your name for service in the fighting line. If you live in St. John's go to the C.L.B. Armoury and enter your name at the Central Recruiting Office, or any evening between 8 p.m. and 10 p.m.

Tickets to St. John's will be provided by the Magistrate free of cost.

The terms of enlistment are: To serve abroad for the duration of the war, but not exceeding one year. It is intended the men shall leave within one month of their enrollment, and that in the meantime they shall receive a course of instruction and training in St. John's.

A complete outfit will be provided.

Each private will receive pay at the rate of \$1.00 per day and free rations, from the date of enrollment to the date of return, a portion of which will be paid to dependents left behind, or it will be allowed to accumulate for their personal benefit until termination of service.

Volunteers from outports will be given free passage to St. John's.

Any applicant for service, forwarded by the proper authorities and not accepted after arrival at Headquarters, will be provided with a free passage and maintenance back to his home.

Within seventy-five miles of the frontier, 1,000 Russians in the train ČČ by which they were travelling were tunrned out of the carriages and compelled to spend eighteen hours, without food, in an open field, surrounded by soldiers with fixed bay-

Renesoff and his wife made their way without money or luggage to Denmark and Sweden. Swedes provided them with money and passage to the Russian frontier. Five of Renesoff's fellow passengers went mad.

The Renesoff experience, however, was comparatively easy, as compared with the sufferings of others. Suffering women were turned out of German hospitals and many died. Several Russians were shot and many were beaten, some of their women having been naltreated.

It is noteworthy that only in Germany have Russians been thus treated. In Austria they have suffered nothing beyond inconvenience. In Russia there has been no personal attacks or demonstrations against German subjects. In Gernany, again, the cases of brutality are reported chiefly from Prussia. The stories of returned rtavellers awaken intense indignation here; but they are not likely to lead to anything. Indeed, while German and Austrian men, liable for service, are being arrested and segregated, the Provincial Government and the Mayor of St. Petersburg are taking steps to see that German and Austrian women do not suffer from want.
