There is an immense tract of more or less rocky land north of the Geor-gian Bay and Lake Superior, which has always been looked upon as a great empty space, which will be for-ever almost devoid of population, and form a great barrier dividing Canada into two distinct areas of peopled land. All who have passed through this tract by train, however, know that it is filled with almost

countless beautiful lakes, and that it could be made a vast camping-ground for hundreds of thousands of persons during the summer. If a great trunk road were constructed through this district for vehicular travel, it would become a vast sanitarium for the worn-out business men of New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, and numerous chants Bank, Mt. The road would probably extend from Halifax to Moncton, and from Moncton to some convenient point on the southern bank of the St. Lawrence, along which it would pass to a point opposite Quebec, where the river would probably be crossed. The last and by far the most difficult part of the great highway, extending from Calgary to Vancouver, is to a great extent completed already. This project of a great narready. tional highway had its inception in British Columbia, and the Government of that Province has been at work on it for years, the result being that out of 750 miles, the distance from Calgary to Vancouver by the highway, only 150 miles remain to be constructed. There are three gaps of forty miles each in the continuous stretch between the two cities mentioned, and one thirty

miles in length.

From Calgary to Banff and from Banff to a point within forty miles of the Columbia River the road is in an excellent condition for motoring. From the point mentioned to the Columbia River the road is in course of construction, the Dominion Gov-ernment having taken it over for the purpose of making it an approach to the National Park from the west; this gap, therefore, will soon cease

Britain's Generous Handling Crude Rubber Situation

Has Held Down Cost of Rubber Footwear While Prices of Other Necessities Soar

When, some twenty years ago, Great Britain began to establish great rubber plantations in her tropical Dominions, the outside world's industrial experts laughed in scorn. Were there not thousands of square miles of wild rubber trees in Brazil and elsewhere simply waiting to be tapped? Were not the marvellous chemists of Germany working diligently to devise a process for making synthetic rubber at a fraction of the cost of the natural article? Britain, they averred, was wasting time and money,

Six years ago the price of crude rubber jumped to \$3.00 a pound, because the 60,000 or 70,000 tons which seemed to be the limit of the forests fell far short of the enormously increasing demand-and the synthetic rubber promised by Germany failed to materialize. The 8,200 tons produced by the British plantations in 1910 was more than welcomed, and the scoffing ceased. By 1914 the plantations were producing nearly 100,000 tons, or 60% of the world's supply, and the price had been reduced to one-third of the 1910 figures. This year the plantations are contributing 150,000 tons—75% of the total production—and Britain holds a monopoly which has been of vital importance in the War.

Controlling the seas as well as the supply, the British Government has effectually cut off the Teutons, while providing an abundance for the Allies. To neutrals, who might easily have been forced to pay any price, the monopoly has been truly a benevolent one, for so long as they resell none to the Germans, they get all the rubber they want at a lower price than

No nation, neutral or belligerent, benefits more generally from Britain's foresight and generosity in this matter than Canada. Besides the general use of the scores of rubber products, practically every Canadian uses rubber footwear more or less for at least six months of the year. Now that leather has gone up 80%, and shoes are costing two to five dollars a pair more than normal, the advantage of wearing rubbers and overshoes this winter is strongly emphasized. They cost so little compared to the shoes whose term of service they practically double, that it certainly is economy to wear them at every sign of bad weather. And there's another point, even more

The need for leather at the Front is so great, and the scarcity so serious, that it is a patriotic duty to save it all we can by wearing rubbers and overshoes.





THE SPREAD OF WEEDS.

Farmers Are Forgetting Old Quarantine Methods. Mr. R. Y. Griffiths of Grey county

writing in Farm and Dairy, says that for twenty-five years a pest of mustard was confined to two farms in his neighborhood. These farms had become infested in the early days. They were owned by men who did not live in the neighborhood, and for years were the only rented farms within several miles. For these reasons they had become very badly contaminated, and at a certain season of the year each was a yellow flower garden. But these farms were under an informal quarantine. "The tenants had to wait for the threshing machines until the end of the season, and after the threshing was done the machines were always run empty for half an hour so that all the seeds would be shaken out. The local miller would not chop grain from those farms for fear of losing the cus-tom of good farmers. As long as these precautions were taken the mustard never spread beyond the line fences of the contaminated

farms.
"Of late years no such care has been exercised, with the result that the mustard has now spread largely throughout the neighborhood. I broke through the line about fifteen ears ago when the farmers started moving away and selling their farma The new owners were not so carefu of the land as the men and the sons of the men who cleared it. They would take the threshing machine whenever they could get it, with the result that the mustard soon got a start and is now found on half the farms of the neighborhood. Not only that, but other weeds equally bad have gained a foothold, and with the scarcity of labor and the rush of work have been neglected. Once the farmers got accustomed to the sight of weeds in the field they seemed to come careless whether they spread or not. The result is that they are spreading and spreading fast.

"If you were to ask me what is the root cause of the spread of weeds in this neighborhood I would say that it is far deeper than our good friends, the agricultural advisers, seem to think. It is the policy adopted in this country years ago of building up city industries at the expense of agriculture, as a result of which farming became less attractive to our young men than work in the When the farm boys began to leave the farms began passing out cleared the land and handed it down to their sons. There is nothing like the same pride taken in keeping the land free from weeds and in good condition by the new owners as was taken by those whose fathers hewed out the farms from the wilderness. That pride was the very soul of the agriculture of this district as practised twenty years ago. Had farming received as much encouragement tries there is every reason to believe that most of the farms would now be in the possession of the descend-ants of the old pioneers, and that these men would be taking as much pride in keeping them clean as their fathers and grandfathers did."


