Having gained some advantageous rositions in local fighting, the Allies are waiting for the next effort by the Germans, which already has been delayed much longer than in previous lulis since the beginning of the offensive on March 24. Meanwhile fresh troops with new supplies are pouring in to strengthen the Allied positions and this fact must also add to the perturbation of the enemy who has nothing remarkable in military achievement to show for his heavy losses of the past seven weeks.



What disasters might then have been expected one does not like to consider. Caillaux has long been a notorious hater of England, Sarrail shares these views, and his reports to the French Government are said to have been loaded with venemous remarks about his British colleagues. It is known that this sentiment was heartily reciprocated and that Gen. Sir Bryan Mahon insisted upon being recalled rather than longer associate with
