FALLACIES IN **EDUCATION**

A superintendent of education says there are five fal

- 1. That anyone can teach school without lany special preparation.
- 2. That schools cost too much 3. That the same type of train ing fits all children.
- 4. That parents discharge their obligations by sending children to school.
- 4. That the schools of yesterday were better than those of today.

Fallacy No. 1 has not many fol lowers. We realize that teaching is chniral profession requiring rigid training. We havn't gone as far as we might in our training; but we

To recognize that it is necessary.

We are split on Number 2. Some people think we are spending too much. But are we; While we spend thousands for dances, gasoline; chew ing gum and candies-much more in the aggregate than we spend for ed pucation probably; -it is impossible to say with justice that we are too lavish in training the youth.

Of course the same type of training does not! fit all children. We do attempt to to put some elastic in far as we might. Still; how to adapt the schools to the individual differences in pupils is a mighty difficult en ten cans of your corn syrup the first year's work in Teacher problem which it will take a long time to solve.

Fallacy Number 4 is the same as saying that too many parents act as if they had done their duty by their children when they ship them off to school. There is: in one sense: no credit to the parent in sending his children to the schools. The laws compel him to do so; whether he wants to or not. Most parents fall down in not taking a personal; ac ive interest in the progress of their offspring in the schools; in neglect ing to co-operate with the teacher in the development of the child. This cannot be reached by law. It is a rersonal matter with the parent. Of course the schools of today

are better than those of yesterday in many ways. But there is also some basis for the complaint that we are more superficial now than yesterday; as years ago; and that the child does not get the rigid training in fundamentals that previously obtained. No doubt we have too many frills in education; the country over; but nevertheless; our schools are better and stronger than they used to be. .



FRASER COMPANIES TO ESTABLISH BIG HARDWOOD PLANT

Plans of the Fraser Companies Ltd. for establishing a hardwood plant at St. Leonard's are said to be much more extensive and elaborate than have so far been revealed

The intentio,n it is learned is to erect a plant of sufficient caracity and equipment to finish hard wood supplies from all their 'various timberland holdings in New Bruns wick as well as in Quebec and that facilities will also be provided for finishing soft wood as well.

Huge planing equipment will be installed it is said, and jt js under stood that preparations are being made to enter extensively into the manufacture of hardwood flooring and other hardwood products such as sheathing and other finished products. It is also expected that the plant will be equipped for finishing soft woods the policy which promotes this departure from the former activities of the Fraser Companies being one to complete as far as possible the finished products of the natura resources in the country.

The drive from St. John to the Nova Scotia border is a picturesque one. Leaving the city road an asphalt road of nine miles length leads through the attractive suburbs of Renforth and Riverside: the home of the Golf and Country Club; to the beautiful suburban section of Rothsay with its views of the Kennebe casis and its attractive islands. Or to Hampton the motorists go; still following the river with the purple Norton hills in the distance and so through the thriving town of Sussex and the charming Susses Valley to the busy city of Moncton, thence to Dorchester; the locatio. of the Maritime Penitentiary; on to Sackville; the seat of the Mount Allison Educational Institutions; and over the fair famed Tantramar dyked lands to Amherst: the gateway to Nova Scotia.

Another beautiful drive is going north from Moncton; through Shediac; a Buctouche; Richibucto; Chatham: Newcastle; and along the Bay Chaleur by way of Bathurst; Daland on to Campbellton; whence a good road leads on to the Province of Quebec.

Still another motor trip; truly worth while; is that from St. John to Fredericton; the capital of New Brunswick; via the River Road. There is a shorter way by the Broad Road; 65 miles; but the river Road following the line of the C.N.R. Valley Railway is admitted to be unexcelled in its scenic attractions; distance 82 miles: From Fredericton still following the river; the road runs on to Woodstock; Grand Falls; Edmundston; and if he desires; the motorist may continue on to Rivere du Loup and Quebec.

Leaving St. Stephen a drive of

twenty miles over a perfect piece of road brings the visitors to St. Andrews; the leading summer resort of New Brunswick where the C.P.R. have a fine summer hote!; the Algonquin: and one of the best Go'f courses in Canada. Kennedy's; St. Andrews, is good hotel. Seventy-six miles of good hard gravel road leads from St. Andrews to St. John; through St. George, the home of the red granite, past the beautiful Lake Utopia and the hydro development at Musquash. On the left; eight miles from St. John; is Spruce Lake the source of the water supply for West St. John; and from there one gets delightful glimpses of the Bay of Fundy. Earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railway for the last ten days of March amounted to \$4,496,000, as compared with \$4,313,000 for the corresponding period a year ago. This is an increase of \$183,000 or 4.2 per cent.

Immigration to Canada during the eleven months ending February, 1924, totalled 135,128, divided as fol-1924, totalled 135,128, divided as fol-fows: British, 67,023; from the United States, 19,120; from all other countries, 48,992. This compares very favorably with 66,139 for the same period a year ago.

Forty pilgrimages to the famous shrine at Ste. Anne de Beaupre, Quebec, have already been arranged for June, July and August this year. Over 200,000 visitors are expected, most of them from Montreal, Toronto, Buffalo, Philadelphia, Chicago, New York and Boston.

Although it has already spent \$4,000,000 in drilling for oil in Alberta without very definite results, the Imperial Oil, Limited, proposes to keep at its development campaign. so F. J. Wolfe, director of marketing for the concern, states. Already the company's \$2,500,000 refinery at Calgary has had the effect of keeping prices down, he says.

An important industrial enterprise is being added to the list in Montreal in the plant of the National Cement Company, which is being constructed in the town of Montreal East on the site of one of the largest deposits of raw material for cement in Canada. The first unit of the plant will have a capacity of 900,000 barrels per annum.

A total of 969 communities in Alberta are now served by the Provincial Government telephone system. The total number of phones served in the system is 67,279, of which 32,260 are exchange phones, 20,252 are rural phones and 1,085 are private party lines and 13,385 are connecting subscribers. There are 264 exchanges in the province, with 301 toll offices and 62 private party lines.


The growing importance of Canada's trade in the Pacific is reflected in the official statistics of the Vancouver Harbor Board for the month of December, 1923, which shows a substantial increase in shipping in that port over the same month in 1022. Total shipping through the port amounted to 434,482 tons, related at \$21,41,129 an increase port amounted to 434,432 tons, valued at \$31,421,129, an increase over December, 1922, of 122,662 in tonnage and \$2,703,078, in value.

Ten 10,000 Imperial gallon tend-crs, for use behind the P.1 type en-gines used in the Western moun-tains, have been ordered from the Canadian Locomotive Company, Ltd., Kingston, by the Canadian Pacific Railway at a price of \$12,445 each, delivery to start in May and be completed in June this year. These tenders will give more efficient coal and water service than any others in this country.

During the year 1924, 96 arrivals and departures on the St. Lawrence route, with its different services, to be maintained throughout the summer months by its popular mono-class cabin and Empress class steamclass cabin and Empress class steamers, will constitute the Canadian programme of the Canadian Pacific Railway's steamships. A combined tonnage of 197,000 gross tons will be in operation on the Atlantic under the Company's flag, the largest amount yet assigned by a single line to steamship passenger traffic on the St. Lawrence route.

Canada's unfavorable trade balance with the United States is more than equaled by her favorable trade balance with the United Kingdom, according to trade figures of the Bureau of Statistics. For the year ending February, Canada's imports from the United States were \$603,000,000 and her exports to that country \$426,000,000, an excess of imports of \$177,000,000. As against this, Canadian exports to the United Kingdom were \$355,000,000, and the imports from Britain \$155,000,000, a surplus of \$200,000,000 on the side of exports.






