## Big Discovery of

Thought to Have Been Concealed

During the Eighteenth Century. Lisbon, March 29 .- An interesting discovery of buried treasure, concealed by buccaneers during the eighteenth century, is reported from Colenar. A workman who was digging on the site of a ruined castle near the

town unearthed a number of old Spanish gold and silver coins. He reported his discovery to his employer, and a systematic search was made in the castle ruins. After laying bare the foundations of the castle, which date from the

time of the Moorish occupation, the explorers uncovered a dungeon which had been carefully sealed by the buccaneers. In this apartment, the walls of which were of extraordinary thickness, were two rusted iron chests filled with treasure. The contents of the chests were

carefully examined by experts, who believe that they form part of the booty obtained from ships captured more than a hundred and fifty years ago. Old Spanish and Portuguese money formed the bulk of the treasure, but many gold and silver ornaments, including vases, jewellry, and ecclesiastical plates, were also con tained in the chests.

The discovery has caused great excitement throughout the district. The excavations continue under govern ment supervision.



The message was prepaid and it looks as if Capt. Barbour sent some of his crew ashore to wire the information. It is likely that the ship will have a full load, for no doubt a goodly portion of these seals are old

It will be remembered that Capt. Bartlett, of the Viking, expressed the belief that both the Labrador and Kite forced down through the Straits after the hoods, and unless the latter ship has become jammed or met with an accident it is not at all unlikely but that she also will have a good trip of seals.

This is one of the best springs in Gulf ever reported. Forteau, in the Straits of Belle Isle, is on the Canadian side, opposite Flower's Cove, and on the Labrador Peninsula.






