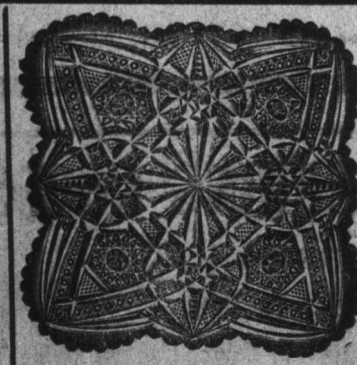

Big Discovery of Buried Treasure.

Lisbon, March 29.—An interesting discovery of buried treasure, concealed by buccaneers during the eighteenth century, is reported from Colenar. A workman who was digging on the site of a ruined castle near the town unearthed a number of old Spanish gold and silver coins. He reported his discovery to his employer, and a systematic search was made in the castle ruins.

The discovery has caused great excitement throughout the district. The excavations continue under government supervision.

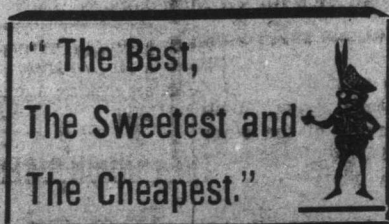

30th ANNUAL REPORT
Of the Cathedral Branch of the
Church of England Tem-
perance Society.

To the President, Officers and Members of the Cathedral Branch, C. E. T. S.

The undersigned, on behalf of the General Committee, presents the Thirtieth Annual Report as follows: Your Committee, on retiring from office, wish to return thanks to Almighty God for a year of singular blessing and great progress.

MEMBERSHIP.

During the past year 115 persons signed the pledge; 111 took the Abstaining, and 4 the General Pledge; of these 106 entered our ranks; 84 being males and 22 females. The average age of the new members is 25 years. Among those who have joined during the year, the male members greatly outnumber the females, and are most keen in bringing in others. This is a good sign, as in this country, at least, men are more exposed to the temptation to drunkenness than women. During the year the Branch has renewed affiliation with the Society in England. A Cradle Roll of parents has been instituted, and a number of parents have pledged themselves to bring up their children in the paths of Temperance by encouraging them to become total abstainers.

MEANS OF GRACE.

We believe that these results, the victory of our cause, the strengthening of our Society and all other evidences of progress are due, chiefly to the regular offering of the Sacrifice of Praise and Thanksgiving every month at our Corporate Communion; also to the continual intercession which has gone up to the Throne of Grace for our objects, not alone from members of our own Society, but also from those, both within and without our communion, who have the cause of Temperance at heart. The attendance at the Corporate Communion has been rather better than last year; but what might we not accomplish if only all the members would fully recognize their obligation in this respect? The Society's Annual Corporate Communion was held on the first Sunday in Lent at the Cathedral, and there was a good number present.

SOCIAL EVENTS.

In April the Band of Hope Tea and Entertainment took place, which was well attended. In October last the Total Abstinence and Benefit Society celebrated its Jubilee. On that occasion this Society was represented by the Patron, the President and Secretary. The latter conveyed to the T. A. & B. Society our hearty congratulations. A grand concert, under the auspices of the C. E. T. S., was held in November which drew a large and appreciative audience. During the Christmas season the Society arranged a re-union for its members, who spent a very enjoyable evening. Early in January a soiree, with candy and fancy goods for sale, proved a success in every way. The system of holding monthly teas, inaugurated last year, was successfully continued. REGATTA.

At the Regatta of 1910 a boat's crew from the C. E. T. S. contested in the "Society" Race, rowing in the "Blue Peter." Although the crew did not win the race they made a close second. At the public meeting of the Branch held on September 22nd, the members of the Regatta Boat's Crew were presented with silver C. E. T. S. medals, the gifts of certain members and friends of the Society.

ADDITIONAL EQUIPMENT.

The piano in the Parish Room not being suitable for our meetings, the Society invested in a new one. The cost of this grand instrument was raised by a series of entertainments, including the proceeds of the monthly teas. The Society also possesses a large quantity of crockeryware and other equipment necessary for the serving of refreshments. A large handsome cupboard has been provided in which this and other property may be kept.

NEW CLUB ROOMS.

In the course of the annual sermon, preached in the Cathedral on Quinquagesima Sunday, February 6th, by His Lordship the Bishop, while dealing with the work of the C. E. T. S., locally, he referred to the necessity of securing a headquarters for the Society with a club room for the male members. He suggested fitting up an unfinished part of the Synod Building for that purpose which had remained unoccupied. At the earliest possible moment an effort on the part of the chairman, promptly and unselfishly made to raise the necessary amount, resulted in a few days in a sum being subscribed of over three hundred dollars for this object. On Saturday, February 10th, the first nail was driven. The men of the Society willingly gave over 1-100 hours free labour, thus helping and facilitating the work, so that on March 17th the rooms, nicely ceiled and painted, were formally opened, clear of debt, by His Lordship the Bishop. There were present the Premier, several members of the Legislature and prominent citizens, representatives of the various Temperance bodies, friendly societies, etc., and a good number of C. E. T. S. members.

The club rooms comprise a recreation room, 35 x 24 feet, with a billiard table, bagatelle board, two game tables and a splendid disc gramophone with 72 records, the last named being the gift of Mr. N. Outerbridge, who is deserving of special mention. The reading room is about 20 x 20 feet and contains a literature table, coal writing desk, wash basin and library. There is also a refreshment room fitted with a gas stove and crockery. A spacious lobby is at the entrance, and the whole suite of rooms are lofty, well-ventilated and lighted with gas.

THE LICENSING BOARD.

A vigorous controversy with the Licensing Board occupied a good deal of our time and attention during the past year, and aroused a strong Temperance sentiment. The question of certain licences, which the Board in the opinion of the Society had granted illegally, was taken up fearlessly by the Branch; and when the continued discourtesy of the Board went beyond all reasonable limits, the matter was placed in the hands of the attorney General. He instituted proceedings and the test case taken against one of the licences fell through on a technicality; but it is to be hoped that the incoming committee will continue to urge for a decision or ruling of the Supreme Court.

TEMPERANCE LEGISLATION.

At the same time it was felt that the Licensing law needed amendment, and resolutions directed to Temperance reform were unanimously passed at the C. E. T. S. public meeting in the Synod Hall, on September 22. Later on this was followed by a large and enthusiastic Temperance meeting, held in the British Hall, on Sunday, January 23rd, over which His Lordship the Bishop presided. The speakers were Rev. J. Bell (chairman of the Branch), Rev. C. Hackett (Methodist), and Rev. J. Thackeray (Congregationalist). At the close of the C. E. T. S. resolutions were unanimously endorsed and a committee was appointed to put the matter in shape for legislation. A petition was drawn up, and presented to the Assembly on February 2nd, within a week of the opening of Parliament, when members of both parties of the Legislature spoke and pledged their support. A Bill was introduced into the House

of Assembly on March 16th, embodying the resolutions with one additional clause, namely that relating to C. O. D., and passed both Houses without division.

The provisions of the new Act, which is now in force, are as follows: Reduction of the time public houses may remain open, which is now from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.; abolition of credit system for liquor consumed on the premises; penalizing the sale of intoxicants on the cash delivery system in Local Option Districts. A further section dealing with future licenses as to the arrangement of bar-rooms and the closing of all back and side entrances will apply to all new licensed premises.

The extraordinary expenses in connection with the purchase of the piano, the fitting up of the club rooms, and the Local Option campaign have caused strenuous efforts to be made in order to meet all liabilities. The total income is a record one, amounting, as shown above, to \$989.61. The Society starts this year with a clean sheet, everything having been paid for, no debts outstanding, and a creditable balance in hand.

THE CHAIRMAN.

Before concluding this report, the committee wish to mark their appreciation of the good work done by our Chairman (Rev. James Bell), who, humanly speaking, has been the life of our Society. In every matter affecting its welfare he has taken a most enthusiastic interest, and much of our success is due, under God, to his self-sacrificing labours and rare energy. To him is due the inception of many of the forward moves of the Branch during the year past.

CONCLUSION.

The thanks of the Society are due to the many friends who have helped us financially and in other ways. Especially have we to thank the members of other Temperance organizations who have stood loyally by us in the fight for Temperance Reform. We also tender to the Press of the city our hearty thanks for many kindnesses during the past year.

In conclusion your Committee would ask the indulgence of the Branch for any short-comings during its term of office.

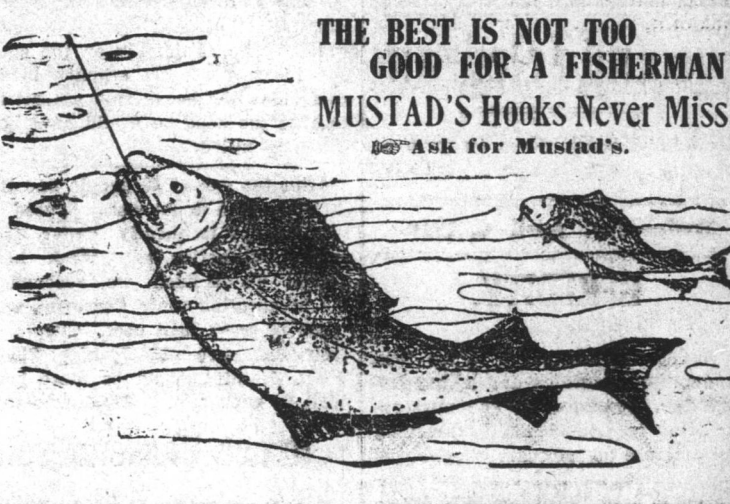

HEREDITY.

Heredity is now much to the fore. Students of Eugenics are taking lessons from stock-raisers and nurserymen, and contemplating the breeding and nurture of steeds, short-horns and Southdowns, and the cross-fertilization of seed. Providentially brawn and form are not the only attributes considered desirable in man. Abstract attributes are not conveyed from father to son with the fidelity of a photograph, and these physical qualities are of at least as much importance as the physical features. Human nature plays a large part in the world, and here hereditary influence is at its lowest ebb. Yesterday the descendants of the great poets, so far as they could be dragged out of obscurity, were banquetted. The object, we presume, was to convince the world that poets are not born but made, and that there is no dynasty of Shakespeares with a Shakespeare X, rivalling in name the fame of the Elizabethan Shakespeare. In the Republic of Letters there is no hereditary peerage, and the son of a Peer of Poetry is but a commoner, indistinguishable from the common herd. Once divine right did hedge in a King by heredity, and heredity was the chief of the titles qualifying a man to be a law maker. A few days ago the world was treated to the spectacle of a House of hereditary Peers passing by a vote of 171 to 17, a resolution expressing their conviction that such a qualification by itself was an anachronism, venerable and august, but abandoned a pretension which it has maintained for many centuries, there are many traits which are not transmitted hereditarily. And fortunate it is. How could even America stand a dynasty of Theodores, if they handed

down Rooseveltism from father to son. A second Barnum the world might stand, but not another Roosevelt. Otherwise, the world in self-defence would have to provide a lethal chamber to extinguish the brood to protect itself from the incessant annoyance arising from everlasting self-advertisement so characteristic a trait in Theodore the First.

Supreme Court.

Before Mr. Justice Johnson in Chambers.
In the matter of the petition of Harvey & Co. praying that Eli Mercer be declared insolvent. Mr. J. J. McGrath for the petitioners; C. E. Hunt, for Mercer; W. E. Wood for Thomas Smyth Co., Ltd. J. J. McGrath states the facts of the case of the petitioner, and calls Eli Mercer who is examined by J. J. McGrath. It is ordered that Mercer be declared insolvent, and that Herbert E. Brooks be continued as trustee, and that petitioner have costs paid out of the estate.

He was assisted to the firm's office store and Mr. George Marshall telephoned Dr. Cowperthwaite. He was quickly on the scene and inserted several stitches in the cuts. Channel Schrs. Arrive.

Scott, arrived last night with 1,300. Both vessels are anchored in the stream. The former has 10 men of a crew, and the latter 10, and both will make good bills. They report seeing the smoke of two steamers on the 17th March away in the direction of where the harks were known to be, and the captains believe these were the Labrador and Kite, and that the latter ship as well as the Labrador will have a good trip of fat. The Cedella picked up 5 families of hoods in the ice which the steamers alluded to forced through. There are two other schrs. in the Gulf and it is thought they, too, will get the hoods.

Complaint About Glencoe's Sailings.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—Most of the Government organs have announced that the change in time of the Glencoe's sailing was very popular on the West Coast. Now, Mr. Editor, west of Fortune I venture to say that it is not popular. Under present arrangements we of this district have unburdened the moral back-load of Fortune Bay by doing the Sunday work against which they kicked so lustily, as all our freight from west has to be landed on Sunday, say at Burnt Islands, Rose Blanche, LaPole, Grand Bruit, Burgeo and Ramea.

Secondly, all passengers bound across the Gulf have to wait over at Port aux Basques Saturday, Sunday and Monday, unless the Glencoe connects with the Bruce Friday night, and this seldom occurs. The same conditions apply to fresh salmon and halibut, of which there are large quantities shipped by Glencoe during the months of May, June and July from Hermitage and other points east, including this place. They will all have to lay over three days at Port aux Basques. Such a delay is most serious to fresh salmon and halibut.

Under former conditions, if the Glencoe failed to connect on Monday (and it was seldom that this occurred), the passengers and freight only remained over two days. And last, but not least, we only get one mail a week, whereas when the Glencoe came east on Wednesdays we had two, i.e., the Bruce's mail of Wednesday morning, as also any mail from St. John's, and the Bruce's mail on Friday morning was sent to Placentia and came up by Glencoe on Monday morning. Now the Glencoe brings Sunday morning's mail, and any mail arriving at Port aux Basques during the week has to remain over till the following Sunday, as the Glencoe leaves Placentia Wednesday evening. All this was, or should have been known to our doughty M.H.A., and yet he raised no objection, as it evidently suited his mentor, the worthy C. H. E. of Fortune Bay.

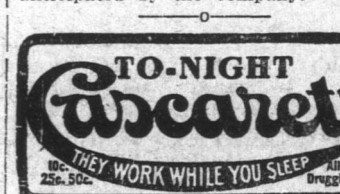

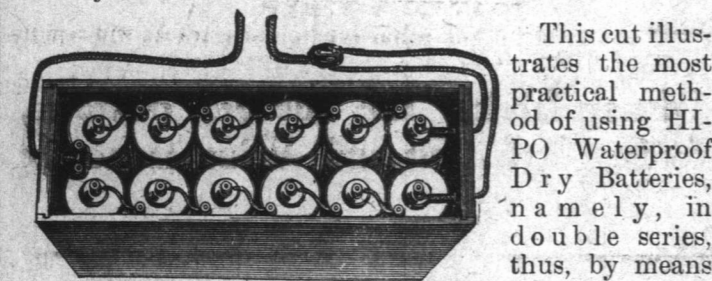

Big Strike Threatened In Germany.

Special to Evening Telegram. BERLIN, April 5. The prospect of the most extensive strike in the building trades which has ever occurred in Germany is held out by the decisive action of delegates, representing the Socialist Federation of Trades Unions, comprised of one

hundred thousand bricklayers, carpenters, masons, builders and laborers, at a meeting this evening, at which they unanimously rejected the proposed Wage Tariff which the master builders' union had drawn up. Such a strike would affect at least 350,000 men spread all over the country.

Trouble in South America

Special to Evening Telegram. GUAYAQUIL, April 5. In the face of the excitement and rioting, it is officially announced today that Ecuador and Peru propose to settle their boundary dispute directly at Washington. Ecuador's special Envoy will proceed to the American Capital. Calm may be restored this morning. During Monday groups of persons carrying Colombian and Chilean flags paraded the streets, crying Long Live Colombia and Chili. In the afternoon a

mob of five thousand persons seized four ferry-boats on the River Guayas, with the intention of using them in the capture of the new Peruvian steamer, Haultaga. Approaching the steamer to discharge their weapons, whereupon the Haultaga sailed out to sea. Throughout last night crowds paraded the streets firing small arms. It is assured that the relations between Colombia and Peru are strained and war at an early date is believed probable.

French Dreadnoughts.

Special to Evening Telegram. PARIS, April 5. The Senate to-day voted 32,000,000 francs for the immediate construction of two 23,500 ton battleships. One to be fitted with turbines.

Revolutionary Outbreak.

Special to Evening Telegram. CONSTANTINOPLE, April 5. A revolutionary outbreak and severe fighting between troops and Albanians are reported in northeastern Albania. Strong forces of troops have been despatched.

Poets' Descendants Dine

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, April 5. A unique banquet at which Lord Coleridge presided was held in London to-night, the gathering being composed of two hundred descendants of British poets. The occasion was the anniversary of the birth of Algernon Charles Swinburne.

Special Evening Telegram. ST. PIERRE, Mar. To-Day. The schrs. Maple Leaf and Hazel B. Mosher collided in the Roadstead here to-day, causing considerable damage to both vessels. They were bound to the harbor for dockage.

Russian Defence.

Editor Evening Telegram. ST. PETERSBURG, April 5. The Duma Committee for the defence of the Empire to-night adopted a bill providing for the recruiting of four hundred and fifty-six thousand and thirty-five soldiers in 1910. Curliana.

This is one of the best springs in Gulf ever reported. Forteau, in the Straits of Belle Isle, is on the Canadian side, opposite Flower's Cove, and on the Labrador Peninsula.

Candle grease can readily be removed from any fabric by laying blotting paper over the spot and applying a hot iron.

To wash colored silks, use cold water and but little soap. If the color runs, stir vinegar in the water until it sets.

Chopped pecan nuts, almonds and pine nuts may be sprinkled over salad and covered with French dressing; it is delicious.

When nuts are tasteless and dry, soak them in lukewarm water. It will make them swell somewhat and will improve the flavor.

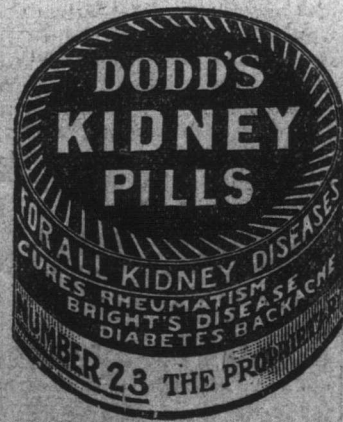
Fresh meat may be kept for several days by sprinkling a little salt on it and then wrapping it in a cloth wet with vinegar.

In making baked or boiled custard scald the amount of milk to be used and set aside until cool, then make your custard and bake it as usual; it will be perfectly smooth.

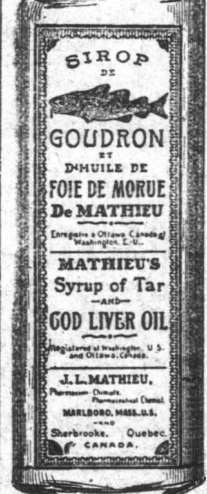

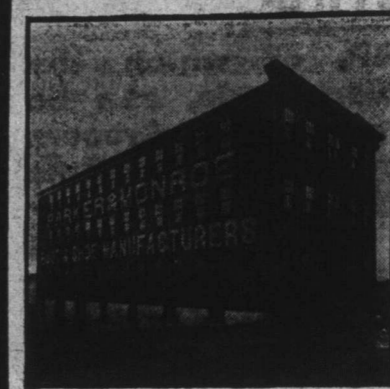
