

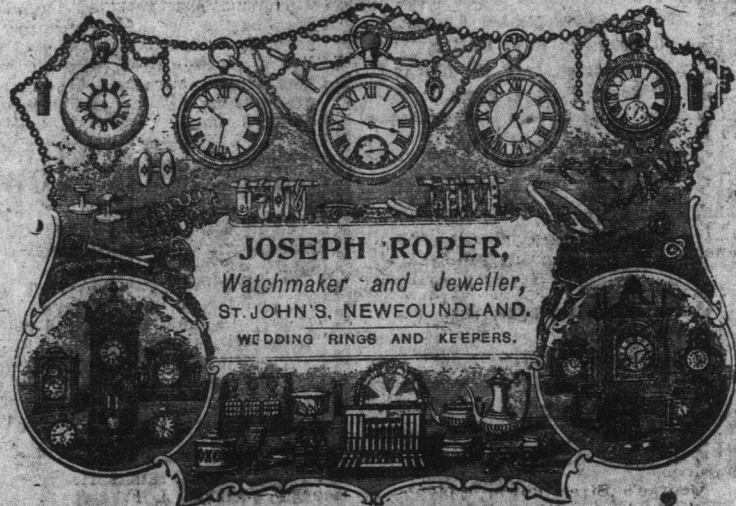

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

The Evening Chit-Chat

By RUTH CAMERON



I want to have a little chat today with the people who write letters to me suggesting subjects for me to talk about in this column.

And the first thing I want to say and the most emphatic is—thank you.

Of course I'm delighted, as our good friend of the obvious teeth would say, to know that you people want discussed in this column.

An actor, no matter how good his talents and his intentions were, would probably find it had to please if he played to an invisible and inaudible audience, and that's what we writers folks are always doing. So you can see that an epistolary echo of the feelings of that audience is always very welcome.

And never more so than when it brings a constructive suggestion.

Please keep it up, you folks who have taken enough interest in me to suggest some topics you'd like to hear discussed. And please take it up, you people who have thought of something that "would be good for Ruth Cameron to write about," but haven't quite gotten around to putting it down on paper and sending it along.

One more "Please."

And that is, please don't be offended when I don't write on the topics you suggest.

Much as I'd like to oblige, that isn't always possible.

It isn't that the subjects aren't just as good as many of my own. It's just that I'm not a penny in the slot machine into which you can drop a topic and inevitably get a half column of remarks. I have to feel that I have something to say.

For instance, sometime ago someone asked me to please write on "The detestable and filthy habit of chewing gum in public." I haven't complied with the request because it seemed to

me that anything I might say would be so ridiculously obvious, I don't believe I have a reader who doesn't know that it is a bad form to chew gum in public, and anyone who does it in spite of that knowledge, will undoubtedly continue to do it, no matter what I may say.

I am also asked to write about some special cases which do not seem to me to have enough of the universal in them to make them interesting. For instance, After writing about the unkind way in which the dependent, the maiden aunt or helpless grandfather or grandmother, is often treated—an unkindness which I think anyone will admit is cruelly common—I was requested to write about the person entirely dependent on a man for absolutely everything, who, on being taken into his household and asked to become a member of the family and take his share of the family life, declines to do so, but perpetually demands to be treated as a guest of honor, acting insulted if not so treated, who, in short, if not always and ever considered before everyone else raises walls to any friend or stranger willing to give ear to his complaints.

Such people may exist, but I certainly don't think the type is common enough to make a denunciation of it helpful or interesting to any large number of readers.

I am also asked to write on subjects which cannot be treated in a general way because they are of a class in which "circumstances alter cases." For instance: "How late a man should stay when he comes to call." "How long a time ought to elapse between a first and second marriage."

My correspondents occasionally inquire, "Do you live up to all you write? If you do, you must be an angel."

Of course I don't.

The lines of conduct I suggest are my ideals. Do you know anyone who lives up to all his ideals?

But I think I can truthfully say one thing. I never write anything I don't thoroughly believe.

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When putting away silverware that is not in use all the time, do not neglect to sprinkle a few bits of camphor gum in each case before rolling it up. Then if the silver is put away in a closed box it will not discolor.

When an umbrella is worn out, do not throw it away before you have enjoyed the ribs. They are just the things to use to support flowers instead of stakes, because they are just as strong and can hardly be seen.

An easy way to toast crackers that have lost their crispness, or bits of bread for croutons, is to place in a corn-popper and shake over the hot coals. They brown much more quickly and evenly in this way than by placing in the oven.

Household Notes.

Cheese scoops in nickel are now to be had in the shops. They have chony handles and are, naturally, much less expensive than scoops of silver.

Boiling liquids, jellies or fruits may be turned into glass without breaking the vessel if you have the bowl of a spoon up the bottom while filling.

To remove rust from steel articles rub them with kerosene oil and let them soak 24 hours. Make a paste of emery dust and rub on to give polish.

Kid gloves may be cleaned, when slightly soiled, with a small piece of offed silk wound tightly about the finger and rubbed vigorously over the surface of the glove.

Glass which has grown dull can be restored to a fairly bright condition by washing with diluted hydrochloric acid, and afterward rubbing with moistened chalk or whiting.

The birthday candles will burn longer and with less dripping of grease if they are kept on the ice for 18 hours before using, and not removed until just ready to be lighted.

To keep linens and white goods from turning yellow during the winter

and when not in use, wash all starch out, rinse in strong blue water, dry and put away unironed.

If the house is infested with roaches try this remedy: Strew the floor with pieces of cucumber peel cut very thin. One or two nights of feeding on these will destroy the pests.

For starching muslins, gingham and calicoes, dissolve a piece of alum the size of a bicory nut for every pint of starch. This will keep the colors bright for a long time.

An improved kitchen knife is of aluminum, handle and back cut in one piece, making it much stronger than ordinary knives. The knife is light, keeps clean and last almost forever.

A small churn for whipping cream is shaped like a butter churn, with the same kind of dasher inside. A few turns of the handle does the work and while the lid is closed not a drop can escape.

For washing silver put a half teaspoonful of ammonia into suds; have the water hot; wash quickly, using a small brush; rinse in hot water and dry with a clean linen towel; then rub very dry with a chamois skin.

There were no marks upon his body to indicate that he had been injured in any way, and it is supposed that having been seized by some sudden illness he fell from his wagon and expired. He was 56 years of age, and leaves a widow and five children.

New Government Dept.

London, Nov. 5.—It is officially stated that a new secretary of state will be appointed for the new department created to attend to the business of the self-governing Dominions whose affairs will henceforth be entirely separated from the colonial office. The arrangement has arisen out of the work of the imperial conferences in recent years. Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Newfoundland will be associated in the new department. All the crown colonies will continue under the control of the Colonial office.

Noted Actor Dead.

Philadelphia, Nov. 3.—Charles J. Pffe an actor of distinction more than a quarter of a century ago, is dead at the Edwin Forest Home for Actors in this city. He was 80 years old. Mr. Pffe supported Booth, Barrett, William Sheridan and other great tragedians during a period of about 40 years.

Of The Baser Sort.

It is the lot of editors to have experience of human nature in its many phases, sometimes pleasant, sometimes unpleasant. At times an editor sees human nature in its nobler aspects, and at others that of the baser sort is brought under his view.

It was our fortune this morning to have handed to us by the proprietor the letter which we embody in this article.

The text which we quote fully speaks for itself in some respect, the manuscript itself suggests other thoughts, and the general tenor calls for some comment. We give first the letter itself.

W. J. Herder, Esq.,
Proprietor of the Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I wish to draw your attention to two editorial comments appearing in your paper, one of which I enclose herewith, the other was on the recent appointment of Hon. D. Morrison as Newfoundland's special Fisheries Commissioner to the Hague Arbitration Tribunal, wherein Lloyd states that O'Reilly should have been appointed instead of Hon. D. Morrison.

Now this nomination of Roman Catholics for Government positions is a most improper attitude for your editor to take, and is certainly very repugnant to the feelings of Protestants.

Howley and the Romans themselves are well able to look after the interests of the Roman Catholic denomination without a Protestant editor fighting for them. I have noticed other instances where Lloyd has been a warm advocate of Papists.

It is a well known fact that Papists are robbing the Protestants of many thousands of dollars annually. There are more Government positions occupied by them in this country than they are entitled to, and notwithstanding that many of them should be dismissed from office and replaced by Protestants to the extent of a just and equitable denominational representation. We find particularly in the Morris Government fifty per cent. more of all Government appointments being given to Papists. It would be better for Lloyd to endeavour to secure for Protestants what is theirs by right than to allow them to be robbed, as is being done, and was done by the Bond administration, perhaps to a lesser extent. I am a regular subscriber and reader of your paper but I am disgusted with the attitude of your editor in this particular.

In reference to this latest incident (subject enclosed) I am of opinion that it was not necessary for that (wise) gent of yours to defend the Roman Catholic cause.

Trusting you will set him right and keep him right in future.

First of all, we draw attention to the address and the signature. Both have some significance. The letter is not addressed to the Editor but to the Proprietor. Assasin-like it is signed anonymously. Obviously the writer never meant it for the eye of the editor, but the proprietor brought it under the attention of the editor, and the latter gives it publicity to show publicly the contempt with which they both treat it.

"Watchman" is manifestly a poor Protestant. No good Protestant stays in the dark. A Protestant of the better sort gives the weight of his personality to his protests. The glorious record of Protestants shows that they backed their protests with their name and fame and at crucial times with life itself.

The M. S. itself convicts "Watchman" of cowardice. He is no plucky Protestant. He does not even prick the letter in its ordinary writing, but indignantly points with the pen the whole of the article in italics.

He thus labours with much pains to stamp himself as unworthy of the best traditions of Protestantism, and fit alone for works of darkness which will not bear the light of day.

We will now turn to the two editorial comments which have given occasion for the petty spite of "Watchman".

The first expressed disapproval of the appointment of Hon. D. Morrison as Hague Commissioner, and

mentioned O'Reilly as a more suitable appointee. It did not nominate O'Reilly. This comment offends the soul of this plucky Protestant, and it appears that, as the editor is a Protestant it was a most improper attitude to object to Hon. D. Morrison and mention Mr. O'Reilly. The editor of this paper is a Protestant in religion, and he is a Protestant, too, in civil life, and protests vigorously against such a prostitution of journalism as would solemly of the soul of this petty Protestant. At the time we stated the ground of our objections. The Award called for a Fishery Expert. America appointed one. So did the Hague. Newfoundland violated the spirit and letter of the Award by appointing Mr. Morrison. We protested. The question of denomination was absent from our mind. Will "Watchman" suggest that the Hague Tribunal's appointment was sectarian, or that the matter of denomination was a factor in the American appointment, or that sectarianism is a feature in the reasonableness of fishery regulation?

The extract which "Watchman" encloses was, however, the immediate occasion which prompted his letter. It covers a short editorial on the "Brigade Pictures." The title of our comments may be gathered from this extract:—

"The complaint seems to us a proper subject for inquiry by the local committee of the Festival of Empire, which made arrangements to have films of the evolutions of the Brigades taken. We have no doubt the members will feel it incumbent on them to inquire what became of the pictures when the C. C. C. passed the camera."

"Watchman" will derive little consolation from the fact that the committee acted on the lines of our suggestion on the motion of a Protestant, Mr. Gosling, and that another Protestant, Mr. A. H. Seymour, moved that the section of the film which had been put out be sent for, and that the motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

How rent the feelings of this anonymous Protestant must be when such Protestants and such a committee assume an attitude on all four like that "most improper attitude" of the Protestant editor of the Evening Telegram!

In conclusion, we inform "Watchman" and all of his ilk, if there are others, but this we doubt, that the Evening Telegram is not a sectarian organ. In the editorial chair the editor is neither an antagonist nor protagonist of anyone because of his creed. The Evening Telegram stands for right and will fight for right, whether it be due to Priesthood or Roman Catholic.

School Burned Down.

Under Suspicious Circumstances.

We learn by the Fogota that the Methodist school house at Carmanville was destroyed by fire near midnight, about 10 o'clock on Monday night. The fire broke out at a time when the place was wrapped in slumber and the building was almost destroyed when the alarm was given. The fire was very suspicious in nature. There was no fire in the stove used in the school during the day and the people believe it was of incendiary origin. There was a dispute between the people there over the appointment of a teacher for the school. Most of the people were decidedly averse to having a teacher from Carmanville and wanted a person residing in Noggin Cove. The key of the door was taken by some unknown person who locked the building, and the clergyman, Rev. Mr. Mercer, forced the door open and the school was held there for two or three days. There is a strong suspicion about that whoever took the key entered the place surreptitiously and fired it. Much excitement exists both at Carmanville and Noggin Cove over the matter.

Barely Averted.

Saturday afternoon as the Fogota was coming out of Seldom in a dense fog, the capt. of the Prospero, a whistle of the Prospero as that vessel was entering port. Capt. Barbour blew his whistle to guide the Prospero in. He was moving at dead slow when suddenly the Prospero loomed up close aboard of the Fogota and a collision would have occurred had not both ships simultaneously reversed their engines at full speed. The Prospero was also coming at dead slow speed but a collision would have done much damage to both vessels. So near were they to each other that both sides' light forward on either ship could touch the other.

20,000 Pounds Worth Destroyed.

Messrs. Bowring Bros. had advice yesterday that the ship *Carmanville*, stating that the fire at Carmanville was a very extensive nature and did much damage to the ship. The ship was valued at 20,000 pounds sterling and must be replaced. Though the ship will be 400 late to make port, the ship's cargo, she will be ready for delivery early in April, and coming here, when navigation opens will take up the St. John's Halifax and New York service. The ship will be built on the most modern lines and will be a beauty indeed.

A letter had been sent here, but this was not done, but the pictures arrived as shown. Mr. A. H. Seymour proposed that the section of the film which had been sent for be sent for. This motion was seconded and carried unanimously. It was also resolved to house the Newfoundland exhibits in the Palace grounds instead of the Crystal Palace itself, and will be on the line of an electric railway destined to show a trip from England to the Overseas dominions by the Air-Red route. This will be a more advantageous course than that originally decided.

New Seamen's Home.

The contract for the building of the basement and sub-basement of the new Seamen's and Fishermen's Home has been awarded to Mr. W. J. Ellis, and work was commenced to-day, as we intimated last week that it would be. It is hoped that by this time next year the whole building will not only be provided for but actually erected and open for the reception of guests. Dr. Gosling, who was congratulated on the success which he has already met with in furthering this scheme, and that success will attend his future efforts for the benefit of the scheme is a most worthy one.

The ladies of St. Thomas's W. S. Association will serve tea in Canon Wood Hall on Wednesday next, from 2 to 3. Candies will be for sale, also clothing, the work of the Association. There will be a musical programme in which Mrs. Joh. Mfs. LeMessurier, Canon Danfield and others will take part. Admission, 10c, tea included. J. SIMMS, Secretary—nov8, 11.

Reciprocity With the Dominion

Washington, D. C., Oct. 31.—The possibilities for reciprocity with Canada have progressed to the point where tariff board is about to take up some of the schedules of the present law, which would be affected. The chemical schedule, upon which a start was made several weeks ago, will be allowed to wait tentatively at least and it is said to be unlikely that an investigation of the lumber schedule, which would be one of the principal factors in the reciprocity arrangement, will take its place. Experts who have been working on the pulp wood and paper schedule, in which the Canadian arrangement also would be concerned, are also making progress beyond the expectations of the board. Several large paper companies have volunteered to furnish important information which at one time it was doubtful the board could obtain.

Dried Squid Shipment.

That there is a bright future for the new business of drying squid is now fully assured, and those who have gone into it are sanguine that their expectations will be realized. Already several shipments have been made to China where there is a splendid market for them, and those of the Celestials who have partaken of the food pronounce the fish to be excellent. Yesterday through the kindness of Sup't. Michael Power a Telegram reporter was shown through the stores of James Baird, Ltd., where the fish are packed for market. It was a surprise to see the great "bulks" of squid piled up, with a large gang of men and boys at work assorting and packing them in neat boxes which contain 100 lbs. each. The squid are very well cured, and in the process lose none of the qualities which the consumers so much like in them. Any of the squid which come to hand not dried to the required consistency are placed in the large drying room on the firm's premises and quickly put in proper order. Crippen's Execution Postponed.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Nov. 7. It was officially announced that Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, convicted and sentenced to death for the murder of his wife, Belle Elmore, would not be executed to-morrow, as originally arranged, for the reason that the law provides that two weeks must elapse

between the dismissal of an application and the carrying out of the sentence. The exact date for the execution has not been fixed. Meantime Solicitor Newton, Crippen's counsel, is filing application for a reprieve. Nov. 23rd was later announced as the date of the execution.

The Philadelphia press this morning published an interview with Francis T. Tobin, lawyer of that city, who stated he was in possession of proofs that Belle Elmore, for whose murder Dr. Crippen has been sentenced to death, was alive and hiding near Chicago. Mr. Tobin intimated that he would ask the State Department to direct the U. S. Ambassador at London to lay the matter before the British Home Secretary. Mr. Tobin's assertion and the official announcement

at London to-day that the execution (from postponement) would take place on November 23rd is a coincidence which is striking in view of the fact that the announcement was the first intimation that the English law provides for a fortnight's delay between the dismissal of an Appeal and the execution of death sentence. On the contrary, it was understood that the appeal hearing was set for Nov. 5th in order that the postponement of the execution would not be necessary. When the Appeal was denied on Saturday the announcement of the Court's decision was coupled with what was taken to be confirmation of the order of execution, which provided that Crippen should die to-morrow. As to Mr. Tobin's theory that Crippen's wife is alive, this is not original with him. It has been exploited in different quarters from the time of her disappearance, and not alone by the detectives, but by various other parties, who base their beliefs on all sorts of grounds, ranging from a plant for theatrical press agent purposes to an idea on the part of Mrs. Crippen, to allow her husband to experience the horror of a conviction before coming to his rescue. This latter suggestion was declared impossible of belief by Lord Chief Justice Alverstone, who presided at the trial. At no time since Mrs. Crippen's disappearance has anything definite been produced to substantiate the fantastic theory that she is alive.

The German ship 'Preussen' which went ashore at South Foreland after a collision in the channel with the steamer 'Brighton' yesterday, lies in a dangerous position on the rocks to-day. Several tugs are standing by but are unable to approach the 'Preussen' with lifeboats. Efforts during the night to take off the crew were unsuccessful.

Special to Evening Telegram. ELAPSO, Texas, Nov. 7. Bart Weir won the world's championship in the annual roping contest at Juarez, Mexico, yesterday, roping and tying five steers in 3 minutes, 23 seconds. Viviani made the lowest, his time being 23 3-5 seconds.

Special to Evening Telegram. WILLIAMINGTON, Del., Nov. 7. N. Dushane Cloward, aged 48 years, the well known American director, is dead at his home here from uraemic poisoning. He was the first man to introduce moving pictures in this country.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, N.Y., Nov. 7. Anton Schwartz, a millionaire brewer, President of the firm of Bernheimer and Schwartz, shot and killed himself yesterday in his apartments in Central West Park. Grief over the recent death of his son, whom he had expected to succeed him in business, is attributed as the probable cause of suicide.

Special to Evening Telegram. SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 7. The Rev. Herman J. Goller, Provisional Head of the Jesuits of the Pacific Coast, is dead at his residence here of heart disease.

Special Evening Telegram. MONTEVIDEO, Nov. 7. The revolutionary movement is spreading, armed parties have appeared in all districts. Many wounded soldiers on the Government side are being brought into the city. Several opposition papers have been suppressed.

Special to the Evening Telegram. SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 7. Eight are dead and four are injured as a result of a freight wreck on the Great Northern Railway near Chairo, Washington, late yesterday. The wreck was the result of a head-on collision on a sharp curve between two heavily loaded trains running at high speed; thirteen cars caught fire; three trainmen and five tramps were burned to death. The dead are members of the crew and 5 tramps. The main line of the Great Northern will be blocked probably until to-night.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, Nov. 7. A horse owned by Queen Wilhelmina, of Holland, and animals belonging to the French Army, besides large numbers of other thoroughbreds which are to compete in the coming horse show had a narrow escape yesterday when Durland's Riding Academy was damaged by fire to the extent of \$100,000. As it was, only 9 horses, all of them belonging to the Academy, were burned. There were hundreds of horses in the building when the fire started, but they were quickly run into the stand in Central Park until the blaze was under control.

Special to Evening Telegram. SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 7. Little hope is held out for the safety of any of the men who were caught in yesterday's Gas explosion in the Lampson Coal Mine at Black Diamond. Rescuers are working heroically to reach the entombed miners. At midnight they had reached the first level at a depth of 350 feet. The work is extremely hazardous owing to crumbling walls. It is thought to be hardly possible that five of the men who were in a car below the sixth level could have escaped death. The explosion occurred about this level, and it is believed the car was shut off by a slide and that the men may be imprisoned, 2,200 feet below the surface. The explosion completely wrecked the workings of the mouth of the shaft, with such velocity that they were shot hundreds of feet above the mouth of the mine. The cause of the explosion has not been ascertained.

Special Evening Telegram. CHICAGO, Nov. 7. To-day one of the greatest series of Clinics known to the medical profession begins at the Marsh Hospital. More than 2,000 surgeons of Canada, the Philippines and West Indies will attend. Other Clinics will be established at different hospitals simultaneously and will be continued until November 19th. Every branch of the medical science will be under study and everything known to be under investigation by the medical world will be discussed with the result that the medical men expect that the professional men will derive great benefits.

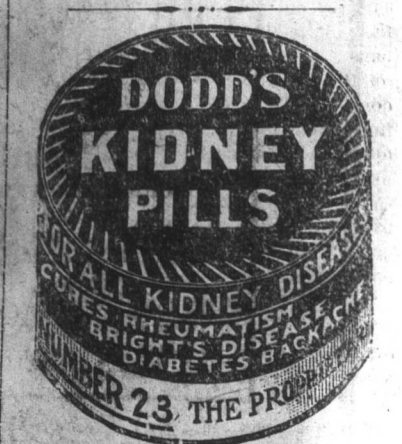
SOME FISH GOING. — Yesterday some nice catches of fish were made outside the Heads—from a half to three-quarters of a quintal. The fish are of a large size.

The man quietly dug into a bag, the only baggage he carried, and from it produced several smaller bags. These he proceeded to empty on the desk, and they were found to contain gold, silver and notes, amounting to \$6,000. Nor did the Greek stop at that but proceeded to take more money from his inside pockets, when the officials called enough. Needless to say they opened their eyes and quickly gave him his passport.—Record, Nov. 5.

S. A. Congress.

Owing to a serious breakdown in health, Commissioner Coombs has had to forego the pleasure of visiting Newfoundland this year to conduct the Annual Congress. The Commissioner right along has been looking forward with great expectation to his visit to St. John's and to meeting his people once again, but the unsatisfactory state of his health would not permit him to take the long journey or the strain of conducting public meetings. Colonel Gaskin, the Field Secretary for the Dominion of Canada and Newfoundland, has been chosen by the Commissioner to take his place at the Congress this year. The Colonel is a practical and eloquent speaker, and is fully qualified by natural endowments, as well as a long and varied career of successful service in the Army, to inspire and help his audiences, be they S. A. officers in Council, or the public attending our great Congress gatherings. During the past week the Colonel has been making a tour of Notre Dame Bay and conducting officers' councils at Twillingate. He is expected to arrive by Thursday's express. A public welcome will be given him at 8 o'clock in the Citadel on New Gower Street.

Left For Catalina.

Mr. W. D. Reid left by the yacht Fife this morning to go to Catalina and thence will start to go down the Bonavista Branch line and make a complete tour of inspection. Capt. Delaney is in charge of the yacht which will be several days down there.

Exploits in Flood.

As exclusively reported by the Telegram on Saturday last the Exploits River, Red Indian Lake and other streams and parts have been very much swollen the past few days owing to the almost continuous rainfall of the past two weeks. At Bishop's Falls the new dam erected there has been pretty badly damaged, and for a while the settlement was threatened with inundation, but the bursting of the dam took away the waters and saved the place from the threatened danger. At Grand Falls a heavy boom of logs was carried away and the A. N. D. Co., the owners of the timber, will suffer much loss and no little inconvenience, though it is likely that many logs will be picked up at Norris Arm. Not for years have such continuous rains been experienced in this section.

Bachelor of Divinity.

Shea, grocer, while down at Bolster's Rock, the past fall, tried to get some, but on all that section of coast only a few barrels were taken, and these were taken in cod traps. He could only get 2 barrels.

The schr. Jean, Capt. Kennedy, sailed to-day fish laden by Crosbie & Co. for Bahia.

The schr. Nicola which took the balance of her cargo at Balne Johnston's premises sails to-day for Barbados. Most of the cargo was shipped by A. Goodridge & Sons.

The S. S. Tobasco, Capt. Yeoman, arrived here at 5 p.m. yesterday, after a run of 9 days from Liverpool. The ship had terrible weather on the run to port, and latterly it was moderate, while dense fog prevailed the past few days. She brought considerable freight and some mail matter. She sails for Halifax this evening.

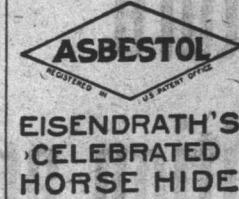
