

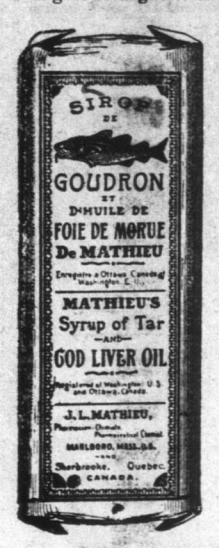

At the Re-Union of St. Bonaventura July 14th

My Dear Companions and Erstwhile Yellow-Students.—When I was asked to address a few words to you on this occasion, not being much skilled in the role of the orator of the breakfast table, I was somewhat at a loss to know what form these "few words" should take. Seeing that they were to be delivered within the classic walls of this noble shrine of learning, I thought that something of a literary or scientific nature might be expected; yet when I was told that they were to be delivered "at a breakfast," I feared that anything of too heavy a nature might not altogether conduce to the good digestion of the maturing students, which have been offered us in such profusion, and with such a nice sense of the gastronomic art as to be the requirements of the disciplinary laws of the church.

Hence I concluded to choose a somewhat lighter service of literary banquets, and to confine my remarks to a few reminiscences of the early days of education in St. John's, with a few excursions, an occasional suggestion, into kindred spheres and cognate subjects.

I will just take two out of the illustrious line of her bishops to illustrate my thesis.—The first will be found in the great sermon which he delivered on the 26th of that month, he presided at the dinner and confusion, was that of Newman. 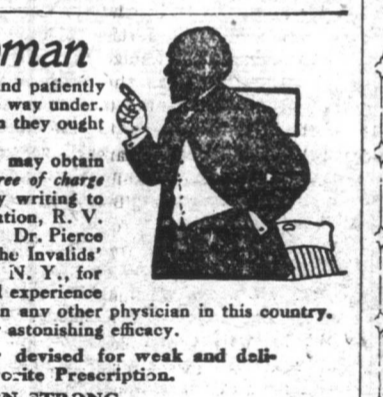
### Annual Meeting

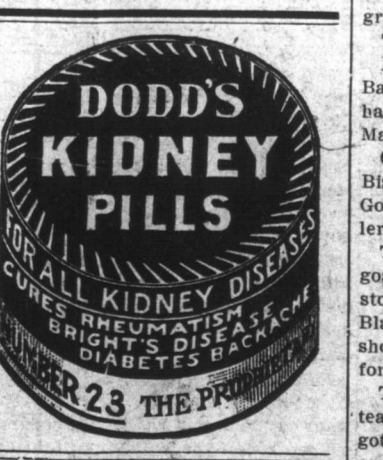

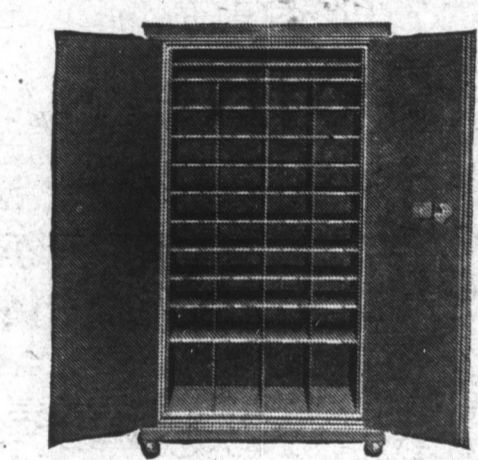

### Labrador Report.

The S. S. Solway returned from Labrador at 12.45 this morning having been down as far north as Hopeville. Capt. Parsons reports the weather fair and favourable the whole trip north but rather foggy on the return trip this side Occasional Harbor. The prospect of a good fishery this side of Holton is very bright, and Capt. Parsons believes that it has struck in below that point by this time. The loose ice that is below Cape Harrison is from three to seven miles off from the shore and does not interfere with schooners getting down or with putting traps in the water. From the White Bears sound to Battle Harbour the fish is in bnt at some places on this section there was not much done when the Solway came south as the fish and caplin were just striking in. The best operations were at Grady, Black Island and Spear Harbour. From Long Island to Emily Harbour there is a good sign. At Black Island crews have from 100 to 200 qts. Bateau, from 50 to 100 qts.; Spear Harbour, 50 to 100 qts. for traps; north of Emily no fish ashore; Murphy, of Battle Harbor, fishing at Chinney Tickle, has 250 qts. Several schools of the Twillingate fleet were met going down from the Straits and the French Shore. They have from 80 to 300 qts.

Capt. Parsons speaks highly of the S. S. Solway and says she is a very fine ship for the service.

### To Choose a Gas Cooker.

If possible, choose a stove that has the oven lined with enameled iron, as well as crown plates of the same material to fit on the top of the stove underneath the burners. Not only do these things and crown plates look well, but their glazed, light surface reflects heat, and only needs keeping clean with hot soda and water. A thoroughly good stove should be double-cased, the space between being packed with non-heat conducting material. This prevents waste of heat and thereby discomfort in the kitchen. It should be so constructed as to afford every facility for boiling, baking, and grilling and toasting successfully, while all parts possible should be removable, so that it can be easily taken to pieces for cleaning purposes.

# Centenary Celebration.

## BOWRING BROS. OBSERVE IT IN REGAL STYLE.

### Two Hundred and Fifty Hold Outing at Donovan's—Brilliant Fete and Great Enthusiasm—Gift to Charity.

It was anticipated by the many interested that the celebration of the Centenary of the foundation of Bowring Bros., Ltd., would be an occasion to be remembered by all who would participate in it, but the realization was far beyond what the most enthusiastic looked for, and to do the celebration the justice it deserves is beyond the capabilities of our paper to-day. None who took part in yesterday's celebration will forget it hurriedly. It was a continuous round of gayety and good fellowship, in which master and man joined, and from which each and every one extracted the maximum of pleasure. A special train in charge of Conductor Stephen Howlett was at the station and before the crowd entered the five cars in waiting, vociferous cheers were given for the Reid Nfld. Co., after which the run was made to Donovan's, where the outing was held. All last week Mr. F. W. Hayward with a large and energetic committee of the firm's employees were out at Donovan's preparing for the fete, and their handiwork was evident when the train arrived there, and certainly did them credit. The balconies were draped with bunting and covered with awnings, while strings of flags depended from the roof of the hostelry, running east, west north and south; the grounds were ablaze with bunting, and the effect on the eye of the beholder was pleasing to a degree. Over the train entrance to the grounds there was a transparency flanked on either side and exhibiting the legend in neat lettering, "Bowring's Centenary, 1811-1911." "Forming fours" after leaving the cars the 250 men marched across the bridge from the station to the grounds, headed by the C. L. B. band, which under the capable baton of Bandmaster N. Snow discoursed sweet music all the afternoon. Bowring-Stoddard, who motored from the city and who were given an ovation by their friends, the workers and other guests. Vociferous cheers were given for the four gentlemen named and for the firm, when all marched into the grounds, and after photographer James Vey had taken several groups of the assembled company, the afternoon's proceedings began.

A luncheon was served during the afternoon, and as 7 p.m. all sat down to a very sumptuous dinner provided in their best style by the proprietors of the hostelry. Amongst the many guests present were Hon. Jno. Harvey, Messrs. F. Ayre, Tasker Cook, Wm. Cook, Jas. Jardine, Jos. Roper, W. H. Rennie, Geo. Ellis, A. Donnelly, F. Donnelly, W. H. Green, J. W. Withers and A. D. Brown. The tables were beautifully decorated with flowers, &c., and the walls and ceilings were festooned with bunting, forming pretty devices, the Ensign and Bowring's Red Cross flag predominating. The tables were set in a very artistic manner and three of them ran the entire length of the saloon, at which all were comfortably seated. During the progress of the dinner the excellent band of the C. L. B. performed on the balcony at the west side of the opening into the dining room, and this enhanced the pleasure extracted from the discussion of the splendid menu prepared. Hon. E. R. Harvey; who in a very eloquent speech reviewed the history of the firm of Bowring Bros. during the centenary and paid a tribute to the various principals of the firm since its foundation by Benjamin Bowring, 100 years ago. He also referred to the personal friendship existing between himself and Hon. Edgar Bowring and the other members of the firm. Hon. E. R. 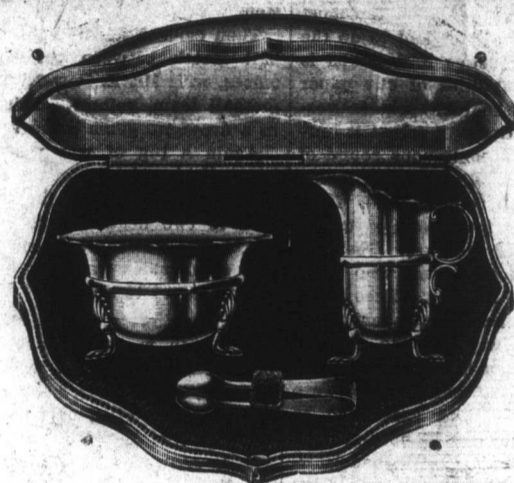

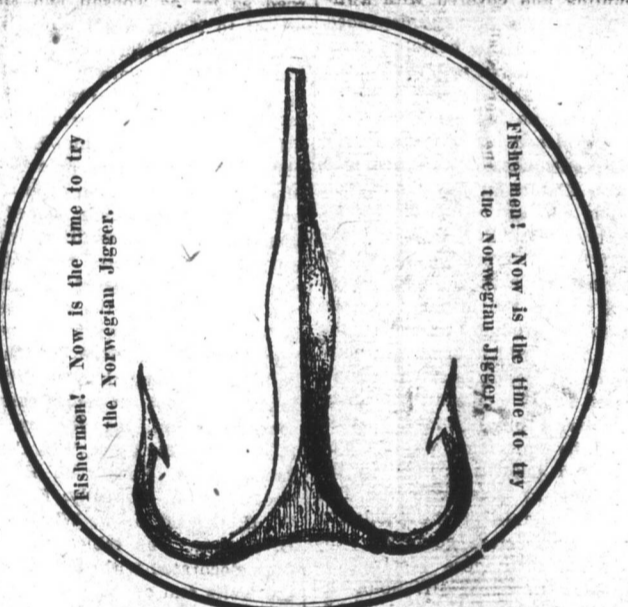
