

Complains of the Glencoe

NOT CALLING AT LAPOILLE.  
Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir—Kindly find space in your esteemed paper for a few remarks concerning the way we people are handled around here, by especially the mail steamer. When Capt. Drake and others were on this coast it was very seldom that LaPoille was omitted, but now if any place is passed it is La Poille. Sunday, the 20th inst., the Glencoe passed here. It was foggy when she was off here, but when she was about 5 miles from here (to the west) it was as fine as possibly could be and the Glencoe was sighted from West Point, why did she not return? Here there were four passengers waiting four days who had to go home without doing their work. One man lost nearly \$10, another a similar amount owing to this.  
It seems very strange to see that LaPoille is always omitted if any La Poille is an important port as there are five or six small places trusting to LaPoille for the shipping and receiving of their goods. On the 20th inst. when the Glencoe passed here we all knew that she had to get to Port aux Basques by midnight which she had plenty of time to do if she returned. I have been informed by the telegraph system that the Glencoe left Rose Blanche at 5 p.m. Sunday; being comparatively fine why did she not then return and deliver freight and take passengers who were waiting? She would have been in Port aux Basques then in time to coal, etc. Hoping to see in future that regulations will be better and that the Government will try and help us a bit re these circumstances.

### The Rhodes Scholarships.

Dr. Parkin, the Secretary of the Rhodes Trustees, who have charge of the Rhodes Scholarship Trust, has invited the members of the Council of Higher Education to meet him to discuss changes which the Trustees have suggested in the qualification of Newfoundlanders who are elected to proceed to Oxford as Rhodes Scholars. The main amendment suggested is that Newfoundland scholars should proceed to a Canadian University and spend two years at such an institution before taking up the Rhodes Scholarship at Oxford. The chief argument advanced is that Canadian Rhodes Scholars and others are taken from Universities, while Newfoundland scholars are chosen from students at secondary schools. Dr. Parkin also points out that Bermuda, which like Newfoundland has no University, has met the suggestion of the Trustees by providing Government scholarships at Canadian Universities for its Rhodes Scholars as a preliminary training to the Oxford University course. At this stage it may be well to state the standing of the C. H. E. in reference to the rules and regulations governing the Rhodes Scholarships. The Council has no power of making the rules in this connection. That power rests solely with the Trustees. But the latter have properly sought local advice before enacting any such requirement for Newfoundland scholars. The idea of making it compulsory on Newfoundland scholars to go to a Canadian University before proceeding to Oxford does not meet with much favour. The general opinion prevailing among the members of the Council is that such a regulation should not be made compulsory, but merely permissive, so that scholars-elect who wish to follow either course should be permitted. In a few days Dr. Parkin will arrive here and the matter will be thoroughly threshed out.

### A Polytechnic.

There is another matter which has been informally discussed at meetings of members of the Council of Higher Education which may have some bearing on the question under reference in the preceding article, viz., the desirability or not of advising the powers that be that the time is ripe for making provision for the technical education of those engaged in trades and commercial pursuits, and also for a continuation of the education of those who leave our colleges. The discussion of this matter is largely informal, inasmuch as it relates to provision for teaching and the establishment of a Polytechnic.

LONDON, Oct. 29. A despatch from Sofia to the Daily Mail says that a Bulgarian detachment, after destroying the railway for some little distance around Eskibaba, withdrew to that village. Adrianople is surrounded and its fall, almost immediately, is considered certain. Azim Bey, the Governor of Kirk Killiseh, who is said to have been responsible for the panic there, had been executed, according to a Constantinople despatch to the Mail.

**Cable News.**

**Special to Evening Telegram.**  
LONDON, Oct. 29. In the present nervous tension regarding the general European situation, extreme importance attaches to a telegram, which the Czar of Russia has sent to King Peter of Serbia, congratulating him that the Serbian armies had proved successful in Macedonia, without needing to invoke assistance from outside. At the time this despatch is filed, no information has come as to its effect in Vienna, but it may reasonably be surmised that it will be regarded as most unpleasant, and cause an alarming demonstration. One has only to remember that, but for German threats, Russia would have mobilized against Austria when the latter executed her Bosnia-Herzegovina coup. Serbia's territorial ambitions, now almost openly avowed, are the chief danger points in the relations of the Greater Powers. Austria will not tolerate any change in the status quo. Russia, by the Czar's congratulatory telegram practically approves and commends Serbia's ambitions. A despatch to the Daily Mail from Vienna clearly states the Austrian position. The overwhelming success of the Bulgarian and Serbian armies is not regarded as sufficient warrant for modifying the determination of Austria to maintain the status quo. Should it become evident, however, that such cannot be everything will depend upon the attitude of Serbia to her Austro-Hungarian neighbour. Serbia's ambitions for an outlet to the Adriatic through the Sandjak of Novi-Bazar, cannot be easily squared with Austria's policy, which regards Novi-Bazar as a special legacy on the demise of the "Sick Man." The Czar's despatch is a notification to Austria that, if she attempts to interfere with Serbia's plans, she will find Russia against her. This would be the beginning of a European Armageddon, because Germany, which supported Austria three years ago, when threatened by Russia would certainly do so again. This would necessitate France, and probably Britain, coming to Russia's assistance. It is significant that in England it is being pointed out that no better combination of circumstances could arise in favor of the Triple Entente than to embark on war with Germany at such a moment, for Austria, attacked by the Balkan States in the South, and Russia in the North, would be unable to offer any assistance to Germany, and Germany would, therefore, have to detail a considerable number of troops to guard her eastern frontier, and would be unable to hurl her full strength against France.

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
BERLIN, Oct. 29. The "Frankfurter Zeitung" prints a Vienna despatch, evidently emanating from official sources, saying it is time for intervention by the Powers, whether requested or not. If Turkey is defeated in the impending battle between Adrianople and Constantinople, it will be high time for Europe to look to its interests, since the destruction of European Turkey could not be tolerated; nor could the occupation of Constantinople by another Power. Blood enough has been shed, and peace can be offered to both sides if Bulgaria is defeated, with good prospects of acceptance. Austria is not likely to attack Serbia, as that would mean immediate war with the Balkan Alliance. A decisive battle is expected within a few days, hence intervention is probable within a week.

LONDON, Oct. 29. Speaking at Eiland, in Yorkshire, the Rt. Hon. Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Agriculture, criticized Lord Roberts, and apologized to Germany, saying,—"I can see no reason for which Britain need be involved anywhere. Whatever may be happening in the Balkans, there is nothing for England to go to war about. It is because of the supreme importance of never exciting animosities that I deplore the speech of Lord Roberts at Manchester a few nights ago. The Field Marshal is doing no service to this country when he makes, at a public meeting, what practically amounts to a statement that war between England and Germany is inevitable. I do not believe such a war is inevitable, and I think that statements like those of Lord Roberts are not only deplorable, but dangerous. If Germany resents it, I would like that nation to know that it is resented no less in England."

**The New Minister**

The new minister is a shy plant which is torn up by the roots every three or four years and located among total strangers. Sometimes this is done at the request of the minister and sometimes at the request of an irate body of parishioners.  
Whenever a minister is transplanted as the result of insurgency in the church it will usually be found that the leading insurgents are those who never attend divine worship except on Easter Sunday, but who contribute heavily from a front pew on the platform. Their criticism of the minister always is that his sermons are not interesting.  
The first thing the new minister is called upon to do is to revamp the Ladies' Aid Society and reorganize the choir, whose members stay away from church in order to show their respect for the old pastor. Some of the heaviest contributors express a deep sense of disappointment by cutting down their contributions to \$2.50 per quarter, payable in cord wood.  
As soon as the new minister lands in town he is taken to the home of one of the pillars and given an unbiased pedigree of the membership. This task is usually confided to some brother who is wholly free from notes and beams and who aims to be sound asleep when the collection box is being circulated.  
After the new minister gets acquainted, he finds that there isn't much of anything to do except dig out two sermons a week, heal up a large resonant split in the church, keep up the finances, collect his own salary, reconcile some of the warring brethren, and act as janitor. It is no wonder that the average community looks upon the minister as a pampered pet of luxury, with nothing to do but flit around in a Prince Albert coat and serve mixed metaphors twice on Sunday.  
If some of the caustic critics in the news could exchange places with the minister for a week, there would be less clandestine yawning at the evening service and fewer care-free comments on the morning discourse.

Mr. Higher Levels can bask in his nicely heated, brilliantly lighted and perfectly ventilated drawing room, there he can produce letters throwing cold water on a genuine offer, of a respectable citizen, and now that he is challenged by this gentleman to come out over his own signature he hangs back and sings dumb after having made his little dart. But surely the Council are not going to lose sight of this offer. Come, gentlemen, wake up and do something to improve the intolerable condition under which we exist.







**Special Evening Telegram.**  
LONDON, To-day.  
The keenest interest is aroused in Naval circles over the announcement that the guns for the new super Dreadnoughts will be of 15 inch calibre. They will throw shells weighing 650 pounds. The largest guns at present mounted on British warships is of 13.5 inch calibre. This will shoot a shell weighing 1,400 pounds. Admiral Bridge, retired, declares they are capable of destroying any warships that has been built or that is in contemplation. He says, naval architects can build ships that will carry bigger guns than 15 inches, but the question is are these big guns practically valuable. I strongly believe that their introduction is altogether in the nature of retrograde tactics. Sir Hiram Maxim, gun-maker, differs from the Admiral and believes that 20 inch guns are possible.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 29.  
Considerable anxiety is expressed in various quarters as to the whereabouts of the Rev. Father Bernard Vaughan, the famous English Jesuit. He left Moose Jaw on Friday for Winnipeg, intending to go to Chicago, and thence to New York, where he intended to remain for a fortnight. At Chicago he had an important lecture appointment for Sunday night, but failed to arrive. Inquiry at the Bishop's Palace here elicited the information that Fr. Vaughan expected to be there in a few days, but his present whereabouts was unknown.

According to the New York Telegraph, betting on the Presidential situation in Wall St. is still very light with an overwhelming sentiment in favour of Wilson. Taft, 1 to 3; Roosevelt, 1 to 2½. The odds on the Colonel have shortened somewhat. A bet of \$1,500 to \$400 that Wilson would be elected, found no takers yesterday, and it is a case of even money of Taft or Roosevelt winning the popular vote.

## Disorderly Characters.

On Monday Consts. Greene and Blundon were called to a house on Casey Street where a man was acting in a disorderly manner. When the officers arrived he had broken up most of the little furniture about his abode, and his wife was in a state of collapse from fright. The man resisted arrest so violently that the police had to handcuff him in his home. The same officers had to arrest another man at his residence on Prince's Street. He also was kicking up a noise, while under the influence. Later the man had to put both his sons under arrest for drunkenness in their home.

## Becker Will be Sentenced.

To death on Wednesday, but confident of acquittal on new trial.

New York, Oct. 25.—Police-Lieutenant Chas. Becker was found guilty of murder by the jury which has been trying him for instigating the death of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler. The verdict was "murder in the first degree," and was pronounced exactly at midnight last night. Becker was remanded for sentence until Oct. 30. Becker did not flinch when the verdict was pronounced. Mrs. Becker, sitting outside the door of the court room, fell in a swoon when the verdict was announced.

The case went to the jury at 2.20 p.m. after a three hours' charge by Justice Goff, which Becker characterized as distinctly unfair and "thin veiled summing up for the state." The charge was, in effect, that the guilt or innocence of the prisoner rested almost solely upon the debatable point as to whether Sam Schepps was an accomplice to the crime.

The court himself was doubtful as to Schepps' status, and declined to guide the jurors in a decision. What he did instruct them to do was to return a verdict of first degree murder, or second degree murder, or to acquit the defendant. Manslaughter was eliminated, and a no-compromise verdict was directed upon the motion of Becker's lawyer.

Flanked by counsel, face expressionless, Becker sat chewing gum while the court delivered the charge. Back of the railing at his wife, head bowed, eyes downcast. The white haired justice spoke in a monotone but with incisive deliberateness.

Twice during the afternoon the jury communicated with Justice Goff. Once it asked for the stipulations made by the State with the four informers, Rose, Webber, Vallon and Schepps, and Schepps' letter to Rose, written by the little gambler at Hot Springs, Ark. The second time the jury wanted the testimony of persons who talked with Schepps in Hot Springs. The first request was granted; the second denied, because portions of the testimony taken at Hot Springs had been excluded from the evidence by the court.

The jurors filed into the court room at 11.55 o'clock. A minute later the defendant was brought in from the tomb. As he waited for the judge he scanned, with anxious eye, the face of the jurors, but none of them returned his gaze. A tense silence prevailed. At 11.57 o'clock Justice Goff entered the room.

The clerk then asked the jury if they had reached a verdict. "We have," announced foreman Skinner. "We find the defendant guilty as charged in the indictment. "Do you find the defendant guilty of murder in the first degree as charged in the indictment?" asked the clerk. "We do," the foreman replied.

The court then directed that the roll of the jurors be called for their individual verdicts. John F. McIntyre, Becker's chief counsel, announced that he would take an immediate appeal.

## LATEST War News

DECISIVE BATTLE RAGING.

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
LONDON, To-day.  
The long awaited battle which will decide the fate of Turkey is now being fought, the army, under Maxium Pasha, Minister of War, as Commander in Chief. Constantinople official despatches, however, do not indicate where the chief action is taking place or how the opposing forces compare. It is Turkey's last chance to retrieve an almost hopeless campaign. Maxium Pasha is fighting with his back to a wall, his communication being cut it is impossible for him to get fresh supplies or reinforcements from Constantinople. Confidence is reviving and it is believed the War Minister has at last assumed the offensive, but this last is by no means certain. The battle may have been forced upon him. Sofia despatches report a continued forward movement of Bulgarians but with no details. There is still no confirmation of reported capture of Luleburgis, Demotica and Dramaud. The Bulgarians are still fighting in the direction of Vies, in pursuance of a plan to advance to an extreme direction to Constantinople. The Greeks also are marching with victories to their credit towards Saloniki, where a feeling of extreme anxiety is said to prevail. Provisions are running short. In fact no apparent effort has been made to stem the Greek advance to Saloniki. This is held to indicate that the Bulk of Turkey's army has been transferred to Thrace. No recent information has been received of operations around Scutari or other points to the West.




