(1) The Committee have met on six occasions and have considered exhaustively the matter of the coal supply, it having been represented that this was among the most uppent mather to drive the interior driver to be exercised with regard to any future imports made under their auspices.

We have the honour to be, Your Excellency's this was among the most urgent matters to be dealt with.

(2) As a result of the evidence ob-

tained and other information supplied, we are of opinion that there is a serious shortage of coal in Cape Breton, from which most of our supplies are obtained, a shortage which last year amounted to about 500,000 tons with an increasing demand, a condition which this year is likely to be accentuated. This short-age of coal is due in the first place to scarcity of labor caused by overrecruiting in Cape Breton; and in the second place to the increased demands for coal arising (a) from muni-tion making by the Nova Scotia Steel are drawn (July 31st) you win one Company at New Glasgow and the smelting of munition steel by the Dominion Company at Sydney; (b) by the requirements of the Canadian 1st P railways for the carriage of troops; c) by the requirements of the Cana lian Naval Department for transports plying with troops across the Atlantic; (d) by the requirements of the same department for ships for the proposed patrol service; (e) by the needs of liners calling in increased numbers at Halifax and St. John; (f) by the requirements for factories in Canada, the activities of which have been increased by the war.
(3) We are of opinion from the foregoing and from the evidence elicited, that it will be very difficult for coal dealers to obtain full supplies of coal from the Sydney mines of their own account, and that it is de

(4) Some sixty thousand tons of coal for domestic, factory and kindred uses will be required in St. John's for the next twelve months; and about 100,000 tons in the outports. Hall, Government Engineer, should be despatched to Sydney as soon as ssible to make arrangements with these Companies to this end, and also

(B) That the Bowring Coastal steamer Portia, which now has her terminus at Bonne Bay, should be permitted for the present year to terminate her fortnightly trip at Channel, on condition that she proceed to Sydney each trip and bring back to St. John's a cargo of not less than 500 tons of coal, to be applied towards this quantity of 60,000 tons, rovided that reasonable rates for the carrying of the coal can be ob-



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
