

Electric Lighting For Outports!

For a number of years there has been a growing demand for a satisfactory electric lighting system for use in the outports. There are dozens of so-called "farm lighting systems" on the There are dozens of so-called "farm lighting systems" on the market. Almost without exception they are unable to produce a steady flickerless current, without first charging storage batteries and then taking the lighting current from the batteries. In using this system they are up against many difficulties:—batteries of fair capacity are expensive; they require constant attention. When they are new, about 15 per cent. of the current attention. is lost when passed through batteries; after one or two years this proportion rapidly increases; this means that a large proportion of the current is wasted; batteries that will produce 110 volt current are very expensive, therefore the manufacturers of most battery systems use what is known as low-voltage. Low-voltage systems cannot use standard lighting equipment such as lamps, electric fans, electric irons, electric toasters, etc., but require special low-voltage apparatus from the factory.

After comparing the various lighting systems on the market, we found one that overcomes all these difficulties. Cable News.

FRENCH ADVANCE SIX MILES.

The French line in the Somme reion begins at Marchelhot and runs as follows—Licourt Potte Mesnille Petit west of Nesle, Solente west of Avircourt, Dives Divette west of Bois De La Reserve Divet Le France and Pas-sel. The French have advanced to a depth of six miles on a wide front. leaving the Germans in an awkward salient around Noyon.

BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, Aug. 28 (Router's) - Hard ighting continued to-day. The Canadian troops delivered another attack in the course of the morning on a fanlike front of about five miles, evenly flanking the Arras-Cambrai road. This fighting is carrying them into the main artery of the Hindenburg line.

HINDENBURG LINE PIERCED.

LONDON, Aug. 28. (Official.) This morning our troops perating astride the Scarpe again attacked, overcoming the resistance of the enemy in his old front line defenses held prior to his offensive of March 21st. The Canadians penetrated deeply into the German positions between the Sensee and Scarpe rivers and captured Cherisy, Viseen, Artoise and Boissart with many prisoners. On the right of the Canadians Scottish troops crossed the Sensee and seized ontaine les Croisselles, establishing themselves on the slopes of the spur south of the village and taking severa! hundred prisoners. North of the Scarpe other Scottish battalions carried Roeux, Greeland and Gavrelle, and English battalions gained possession of Arleux en Gohelle and the other German line south of this between Croiselles and Bapaume, and to the south English and New Zealanders again in heavy fighting repulsed attacks delivered by German divisions recently brought up to reinforce the battlefront. Heavy losses were inflicted on these divisions in their unuccessful attacks. Despite their efforts to prevent our advance, our troops stormed the village of Beaugnatre and progressed in several points between Beaunatre and Croiselles South of Bapaume also English and Welsh troops gained ground in the face of strong opposition. We reached the western outskirts of Flers, and have driven the enemy from Longueval, Deville wood and Bernanay wood. Counter-attacks by the Prussian Guards in this area were repulsed.

CHAULNES WOOD TAKEN.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FRANCE, Aug. 27. (by the A. P.) Activity behind the German lines on the Aisne and Avre fronts has increased generally since the French successes around Roye and on the plateau north of Soissons. In the region east of Roye the Germans seem ment. The French pushed on to-day and reached the edge of Chaulnes, after taking Chaulnes wood by assault. On the south they reached Amy, two miles southeast of Roye.

ROLLING UP THE BOCHES.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE, Aug. 27 (by the A.P.)-Having been still further extended by attacks launched north of the river Scarpe, the battle to-day was raging long, and the British with renewed vigor were rolling up the Boches before them and creeping constantly eastward.

EIGHT VILLAGES TAKEN.

PARIS, Aug. 27. In an advance reaching two and a half miles at a certain point on a twelve and a half mile front to-day the French captured Roye and seven villages, according to the war office announcement to-night. The enemy was forced to-day to hasten his withdrawal on both sides of the Avre. On a front of twenty kilometres our troops advanced more than four kilometres at certain points. We occupied Hallu, Fransart, Cremery, Gruny, Carrapmi, Roye, Saucourt and Crape au Mesnil. The artillery fighting con-tinued lively in the region of Lassigny and between the Oise and the Aisne.

ROYE CAPTURED BY FRENCH.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMIES IN FRANCE, Aug. 27. (By the A. P.)—Roye was taken this morning by the French in the course of a brilliant ater-attack by the enemy. The Germans are in retreat over a seven-mile front north and south of Roye.

MOPPING UP THE HINDENBURG
