Cable News.

AMERICANS AND MEXICANS CLASH.

NOGALES, Ariz., Aug. 27.—One American officer fell fighting in the streets of Nogales late to-day; one civilian was killed, another officer seriously wounded, and between ten and twenty American soldiers killed during a skirmish, which took place along the International Avenue between American troops and Mexicans, in Nogales, Sonora. Casualties on the Mexican side of the border were not known to-night, but it is estimated that one hundred had been killed, and at least a number of civilians were wounded. The fighting followed the alleged efforts of a Mexican customs officer to smuggle a fellow countryman across the border in to the United States.
An official announcement of the casualties in the fighting between American and Mexican soldiers here late to-day said that two Americans—one officer and one man—had been killed in action, and twenty-nine officers and enlisted men wounded. One civilian was reported to have been wounded.

HARD FIGHTING AT CROISILLES.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—At Epauvins the New Zealanders after fierce fighting, established themselves in the northern outskirts of the town. Further north English troops progressed toward Nougentre. We have had hard fighting about Croisilles. On the right of the battlefield the Australians continued their advance astride the Somme and made substantial progress towards Dompiere, and to the east of Suzanne. On the left of the battlefield the Canadians yesterday captured the ridge to the east of Wancourt, and established themselves to the east of Guemappes, north of the river Scarpe. Scottish troops renewed their attack last night and they have made substantial progress toward Ploevain. Prisoners taken since the morning of Aug. 21st exceed 21,000.

ADVANCES BY CANADIANS.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Canadian troops made notable advances south of the Scarpe River to-day, according to Field Marshal Haig's report, occupying Chorisy Vis En Artois and the Bois De Sart, taking many prisoners. Scottish battalions also made excellent progress.

MILL DESTROYED.

ALMONTÉ, Ont., Aug. 27.—The flannel mill owned by Wm. Thorburn, ex-member of Parliament here, was destroyed by fire this morning. The loss will be about \$100,000.

FRENCH CROSSING THE ALLETTE.

PARIS, Aug. 28.—General Mangin's troops began crossing the Allette river to-day. It was announced here this afternoon.

We are told that "he who gives to the poor lends to the Lord," and we trust our Catholic fellow-citizens will remember this on Sunday next, and give freely and generously of their abundance. Now that all conditions of our people are fairly prosperous it is to be hoped that the collection of Sunday next will be a record one in the history of the Belvidere Orphanage.

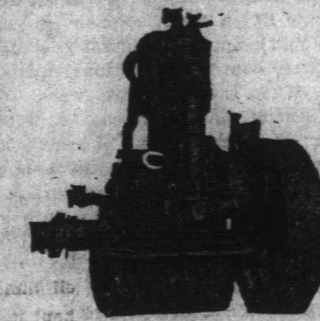

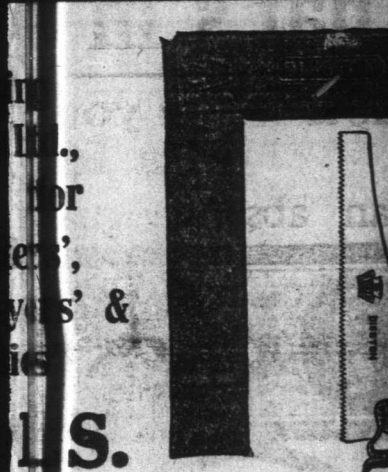

HAND TO HAND ENCOUNTERS.

WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES... THE TISLE, Aug. 28.—While the American troops gained ground in the vicinity of Baocoches, German forces were fighting with the night, and a hold upon Fismette. There were numerous hand to hand encounters in the town. German machine guns were being used in the hills overlooking the streets of Fismette. The Americans were driven from the houses by German artillery and machine guns. American troops are now fighting for possession of Fismette, and fighting with American troops and German forces continued all night. In the morning, the Americans secured a foothold on the east side of the town. Some German machine guns are being used in the hills overlooking the streets of Fismette, using cellars and houses for protection. American and French big guns are being used at the enemy and the Americans have been unable to bring reinforcements.

TOWARDS CHAVIGNY.

PARIS, To-Day. (Paris Agency.)—According to advices received from the Alsace battle front this afternoon, French troops are making progress northwards towards Soissons in the direction of Chavigny.

MORE TOWNS TAKEN.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE, Aug. 28. (By the A. P.)—The British have captured the town of Croiselles, northwest of Bapaume, and obtained control of all of the village of Pelva. East of Arras, to the northeast, patrols have entered Remy and Nécouart, while southeast of Arras the British have taken Ely and Malcourt.

ENEMY IN DISORDER.

PARIS, Aug. 28. In the direction of Chavigny the German forces have been thrown into disorder by the advance of the French troops towards the river. The retreat of the enemy in the direction of the east and the northeast on the whole front held French troops between Chavigny and Noyon. NO DICTATORSHIP.

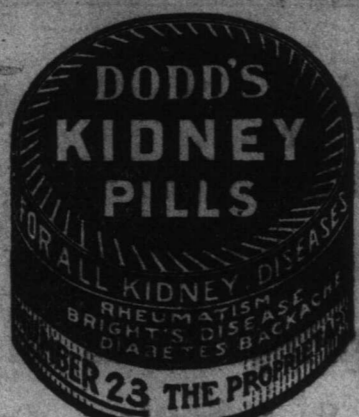
WASHINGTON, Aug. 28. The complete failure of the attempt of Gen. Horvath, anti-Bolshevik leader, to establish a dictatorship in Siberia is reported in advices to-day from Vladivostok. Representatives of the Allies at Vladivostok intend to uphold the authority of the Russian Government there.

ITALIAN REPORT.

ROME, Aug. 28. An enemy motor boat, seen on the Garda, the Trentino front, was sunk yesterday by Italian artillery, says the official statement issued to-day by the Italian War Office. Italian reconnoitering patrols captured prisoners in the Posina Valley and in Val di Aosta. Patrols also were active in the Grappa region and they took some prisoners and destroyed an enemy advance post. In the morning Italian reconnoitering patrols in the Canal River, drove back hostile detachments and captured prisoners.

THE QUEEN'S THANKS.

LONDON, To-Day. Her Majesty the Queen desires to convey to all the branches of the Queen Mary's Needle Work Guild and all who have in any way contributed to the "Heroes' Clites" the expression of her grateful thanks for the way in which they have seen fit to make the twenty-fifth anniversary of her wedding day the occasion of a special effort on behalf of the sick and wounded. No expression of loyalty could take a form more pleasing to Her Majesty than the mark of sympathy with the suffering in this terrible war, sympathy



in which she shares to the full. The shower of zits, hiccoughs, and every corner of the King's far flung Dominion, and is of a volume and variety truly wonderful. The Queen hopes that all who have contributed thereto will realize that Her Majesty is deeply touched by this manifestation of loyalty and good will.

AUSTRALIANS REACH OBJECTIVE.

LONDON, Aug. 28. The Australians have reached the line of Frenes-Herbecourt, according to F. M. Hair's report from British Headquarters to-night, but met with much opposition in their efforts to reach the crossings of the Somme River at Brle and Peronna.

PRESS REVIEW.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28. The A. P. to-night issued the following: The Germans facing the Allied forces from Arras to Soissons, everywhere are in dire peril. On almost every sector of the battle front the enemy line continues to crumble before the Allied attack, notwithstanding the violence, born of desperation, of the counter attacks. Near Arras the old Hindenburg Line is well outflanked from the Scarpe to the Somme and the hostile line gradually is falling back, while from the south of the Somme to Soissons the enemy front has literally been smashed, and the German hosts apparently are caught in two distinct traps, escape from which without heavy losses in men and prisoners, guns and material seems almost impossible of achievement. Scores of additional towns have been captured by the British, French and American troops, the Americans having entered the fray with the French northwest of Soissons, while all of the old German salients in the Allied lines have been flattened out, and the Allies themselves have dug deeply into the enemy's territory. The first trap in which the enemy finds himself is the triangle formed by the sharp curve of the Somme River with Peronna's apex, and with the British, French and American troops, the Americans having entered the fray with the French northwest of Soissons, while all of the old German salients in the Allied lines have been flattened out, and the Allies themselves have dug deeply into the enemy's territory.

Thoughts Upon the Times (By PATRIOT.)

The little coaster Earl of Devon sailed north again this week on the Northern Coastal Service. She was filled with freight and passengers. In fact so many people had booked to take passage by her that a few, not caring for the crowded capacity and the North East storm, refused to sail at the last moment. The ship is not suitable for the service and cannot take the passengers and freight offering. In the latter respect it seems strange to shut out freight North of Cape Bonavista and accept it for Catalina where they have a daily train service. It is high time the Government gave more attention to the requirements of the Northern people, or the Northern people gave more attention to the Government. Why should the Portia be sent West every trip and the North put off with the Earl of Devon? If the Prospero cannot be put on there the Portia should be sent West one trip and North the other. Why discriminate?

Time and again we see references to the high cost of living and the prices which the city grocers ask their customers for groceries. The following is a sample of the prices asked by some of the grocers. Ham butt pork 34 cts. per lb., or at the rate of \$68 per barrel. Salt beef 29 cts. per lb., or at the rate of \$58 per barrel. Butter and tea 70 cts. per lb. It is stated that greater profits even than this are being made on certain classes of dry good and fancy wares.

Pork is now selling in the wholesale market at \$45 per barrel, so that the profit figures out at something like \$23 per barrel. Before the war not even a Jew would ask so great a profit. He would have no chance of obtaining it even if he did. Of what use then is the Food Control Board? Is there one case on record where it interfered with the profiteers? Its usefulness to the public is about as great as that of the press censor. Yet the public have to pay for both.

Electric Lighting For Outports!

For a number of years there has been a growing demand for a satisfactory electric lighting system for use in the outports. There are dozens of so-called "farm lighting systems" on the market. Almost without exception they are unable to produce a steady flickerless current, without first charging storage batteries and then taking the lighting current from the batteries. In using this system they are up against many difficulties:—batteries of fair capacity are expensive; they require constant attention. When they are new, about 15 per cent of the current is lost when passed through batteries; after one or two years this proportion rapidly increases; this means that a large proportion of the current is wasted; batteries that will produce 110 volt current are very expensive, therefore the manufacturers of most battery systems use what is known as low-voltage. A low voltage current will only give a satisfactory light when used close to the battery. If the current is carried by wires to other buildings a short distance away, a great deal of energy is lost and it gives a poor light.
