

Obituary. MATTHEW KELLY.

Intelligence of the sudden death of Mr. Matthew Kelly, the well known gret by the whole community. Yesterday, Mr. Kelly was about town attending his daily duties, and appeared to be in his usual good health, although he had been suffering for some months past from an internal complaint. At six o'clock last evening he had tea with his family and remained at home until about 8 o'clock, when he started out with his horse to make the customery visit to the Central Cab Stand. About 11.15 p.m. as Mr. Harry Peckham was walking East, along Water Street, Mr. Kelly stopped him and asked him to drive him home as he was not feeling well. Mr. Kelly gradually grew worse and Mr. Peckham called on Mr. Louis Crocker to support him in the sleigh, when he was hurriedly driven to his home. Dr. Carnell was called in, but before he arrived Mr. Kelly lapsed into unconsciousness and died a few minutes later. In the meantime Rev. Dr. Carter was hurriedly summoned to the scene and administered the last sacrament to the dying man. The late Mr. Kelly was one of the most popular cabmen in the city, he was always called up to attend popular functions ,outings, etc., and "Matt," as he was familiarly known, always performed the duties required of him with entire satisfaction to the pat rons. Mr. Kelly always took an active part in the Annual Horse Racing Meets. For the past number of years he took his famous trotting horse "Finnister" to the winning post in a great number of races. He was a man of good sound Judgment and was greatly admired by all who knew him. The sudden passing of Mr. Kelly comes with added force to Mrs. Kelly, her son Jim, whose life is despaired of, and a daughter, Mollie, who are bereft of husband and father. Deceased was in his 50th year, and besides his family, leaves to mourn four sisters and a host of friends throughout the city. The Telegram offers sincere sympathy to the family.

Peter Reid, secretary of the Pomological and Fruit Growing Society of the Province of Quebec, reports that the heavy snow of this winter has saved the orchards of the province. The winter has been severe, he says, as far as long continued periods of cold weather are concerned, but two things have saved the trees, and they are that there has been plenty of snow and a lot of moisture in the air. "Black heart" and "root killing" have also been spared the trees, for the frost has not sunk very deep into the ground. Mr. Reid also reports that other fruit trees in the province are in good shape.
