(By Mail).—Many Canadian visitors to London make it a point to visit Hampton Court Palace, and now that the three Tudor rooms in the palace which are reputed to have been privately occupied by Cardinal Wolsey have been thrown open to the public their interest in Hampton Court will be considerably enhanced.

The rooms in question, which are situated on the south side of the Clock Court behind Wren's colonnade, are exceedingly interesting and curious, having their walls covered with the finest Tudor panelling, much of it of a rare pattern of linen-fold, while two of the ceilings still exhibit their original decorations of beautiful, artistic designs.

The story of how they came to be preserved so intact, in view of the ruthless destructions and drastic alterations perpetrated in the old Tudor Palace, by Sir Christopher Wren, the celebrated architect in the time of William III. and by Kent in that of George II. is rather curious.

Shoe and Leather Workers Meeting at Harbor Grace

A meeting of the Shoe Workers and Tanners was held in H. Grace on Saturday, Oct. 27th. Mr. Herbert Andrews was appointed Chairman and Mr. Michael Hayes Secretary. The chairman in his opening remarks stated the object of the meeting, which was to pass resolutions favoring the Anti-Dumping Act. In his relation to imported footwear. He also gave a very concise and comprehensive statement as to the conditions of the Shoe & Leather Industry and how they affect the workmen engaged therein. His remarks were well received by all present.

Resolutions were then brought forward which were proposed and seconded, and after some discussion several speakers spoke and showed that matters were serious for the shoe workers in general, and especially so in Harbor Grace, as our factories and Tanneries employ the bulk of our people, and unless something was done quickly, disaster would soon overtake us. The general feeling of the meeting was that our demands were just, that we sought no monopoly or over-protection, or that the taxes be increased; but we demand, and it is our right, that the Government do apply the Anti-Dumping Act, as regards footwear, so that we can be protected against the unfair competition of the importation of shoddy and cheap Allen footwear, which is flooding our country to-day, and which menaces our existence when it takes away the means whereby we live. It is also shown that those who oppose the measure by using the cry of the poor workman, are the very ones who fleece him by selling him such trash. The resolutions were then put and carried unanimously. All were united in saying that we have given a fair chance to work, so that we may be able to earn our livelihood in our own town, and not be forced to emigrate to a foreign land. The meeting then adjourned. The resolutions were presented to our local representative, Mr. E. Simmons, who will present them to the Governor in Council.

Britain's First Church

According to tradition, Joseph of Arimathea reached the shores of Britain in the year of the Christian era 61, settled at Glastonbury with eleven companions, and built the first church. Its length was 60ft. and its breadth 26ft. The walls were made of twigs and branches twisted together after the ancient custom.

Professor Willis, in his "Architectural History of Glastonbury Abbey," records that "on the spot where the present church stands there existed a structure of twisted rods, or bundles, which was believed to have been built as a Christian Oratory, and reported to be the earliest church in Britain. It bore the name of 'Vetusta Ecclesia,' the 'Old Church,' and was dedicated to the Virgin Mary."

PANGORA WINS PROFESSIONAL CONTEST, WRITING 8840 WORDS IN HOUR.

New York, Oct. 29.—(Canadian Press).—Writing 147 words a minute, a new world's record, Albert Pangora, New York, last night won the contest for professional typists, an annual feature of the National Business show. Pangora wrote 8,840 words and made 28 errors for a score of 8,840 words during a period of one hour. George L. Hoesfeld, former holder of the world's record, was second in the contest with 8,347 words and 21 errors. In the minute contest Pangora again came first and Hoesfeld second with 169 and 168 words respectively. Minnie Regelmeyer wrote 4,384 words in an hour and won the amateur contest.

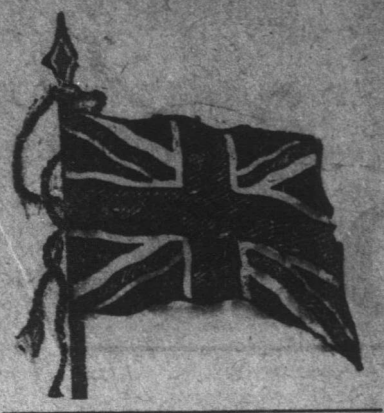

Discussion later took place on the substance of the address, and the consensus of opinion was that of the granting of the franchise to Quebec women, and the assistance of the provincial, municipal and school franchise in all other provinces, was adequate attestation of the justice of women's suffrage and their capacity to discharge responsibilities imposed. Declaring that anti-suffragettes today were either dead or speechless, Mrs. Scott remarked that Mr. Walter Mitchell "now brags that he once voted for a bill to allow women to practice law in Quebec;" that Mr. Lomer Gouin maintained that he had no suffragist feelings at heart, which "indicates clearly that his heart is a long way from his head," and then Premier Taschereau had better watch out or the latter counter would beat him to it in recognizing the status of the women. Mrs. Scott stated the law that permitted only widows and spinsters to have a voice in municipal elections, with no recognition for married women; that also ignored them in provincial elections; that a married woman could not administer property, give it away or sell it; that she could not deposit more than \$500 in the bank without her husband's consent; that if no marriage contract exists the husband has complete administration over his wife's property, etc. An inconsistency which the speaker stressed was that there was a woman Mayor in Quebec; the Mother Superior of the Longue Pointe St. Jean de Dieu Hospital being Mayor of St. Jean de Dieu. Mrs. Scott said that Mayor Martin failed to keep a promise to do what he could for them. With a bill covering the women's position here came up at Quebec, he had returned to Montreal, and though efforts had been made to obtain a two-minute interview on four consecutive days, no success had been realized.

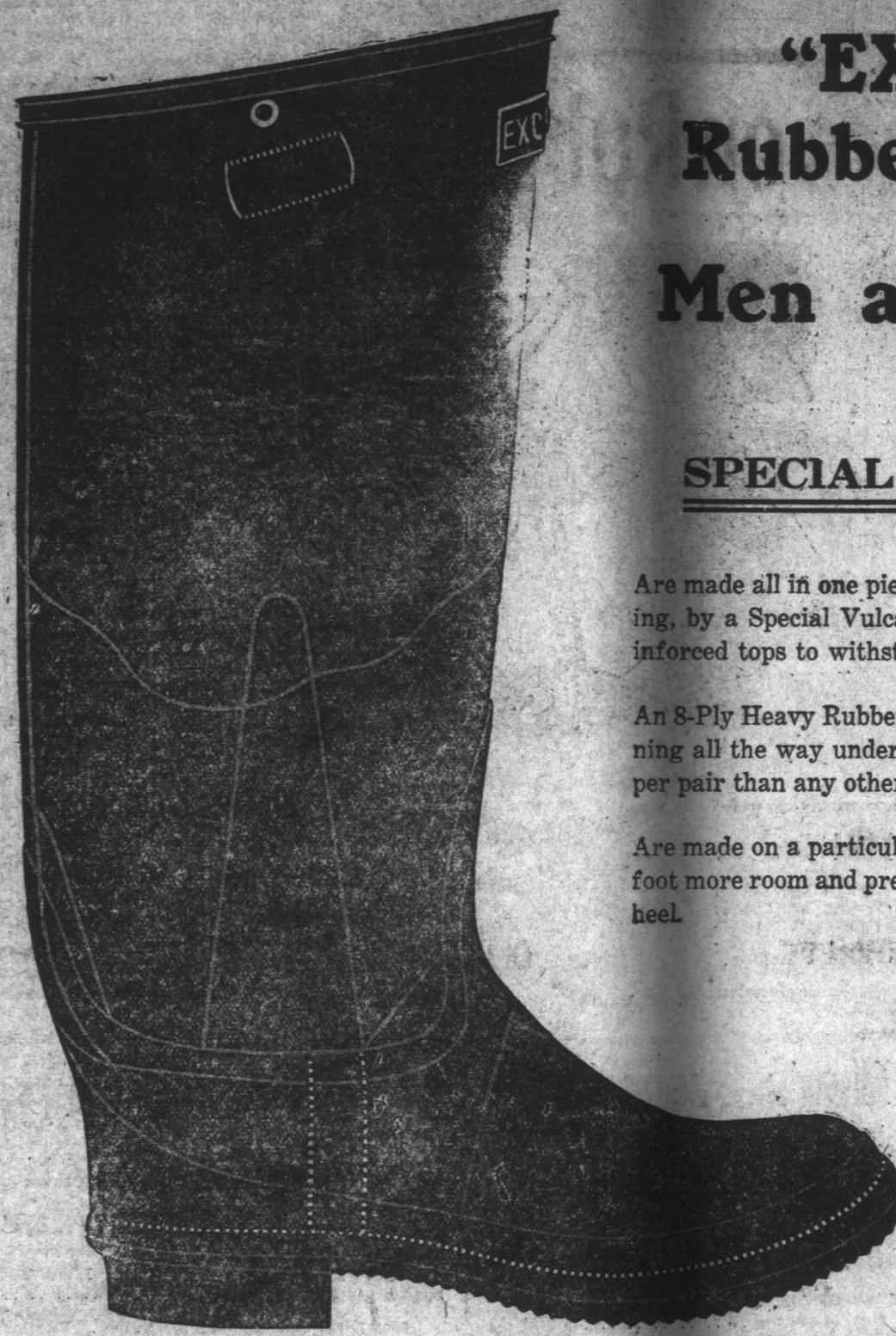

"Liveliness" in Mars

That there is life on Mars—vegetable life as well as animal life possibly—is the conclusion of the British astronomer, Mr. F. M. R. R. Rives, who has for a year been observing that mysterious planet with a powerful telescope placed at Teneriffe above the dust and clouds, at a level of 8,000ft. The following is a summary of his observations on the subject of the habitability of Mars:

Around each of the poles of Mars the telescope revealed a brilliant, round, white patch, which increased in the Martian winter and diminished as the Martian summer advanced. That these white caps are the Polar snows on Mars seems almost too obvious to be questioned, and is accepted now by astronomers.

If these Polar caps are snow, then Mars possesses not only water but also air. And as the Martian caps extend to nearly the same latitude as the earth's polar caps, they suggest that the climate is similar to that of the earth.

It is quite certain from the observations at Teneriffe that changes take place in parts of the Martian

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Expedition Starts

THE DEPARTMENT OF ANTHROPOLOGY OF THE MEXICAN GOVERNMENT, DR. THOMAS... The group will spend some three or four weeks in Yucatan looking over the ground in order to complete plans for the large expedition which will begin work later.

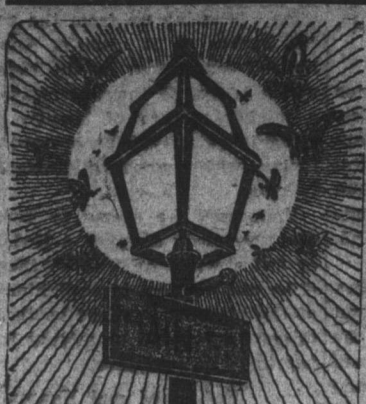
The first three of the above four systems of writing had a common origin, the traces of which are now lost. "If this is true," added Dr. Morley, "has been rightly prophesied, we have the art of writing invented but twice by mankind, once in the Old World by the progenitors of the Egyptians, Sumerians and Chinese, and once in the New World by the Maya."

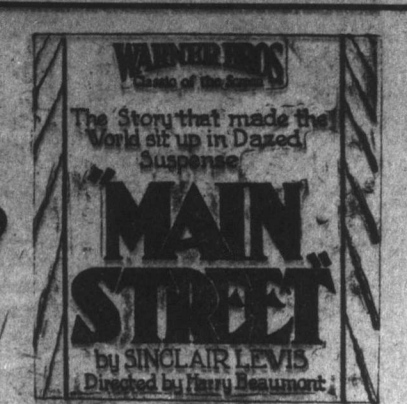

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Immense Mayan Pyramids. The Aztec hieroglyphic writing treats of the accession and deaths of their rulers, wars, conquests, the tribute exacted from conquered tribes, family histories, genealogical trees, and a number of natural phenomena, such as volcanic eruptions, earthquakes, unusual falls of snow, eclipses of the sun and moon, and the passages of comets.

Decrease Shown in German Birth and Mortality Rates Berlin--Germany's birth rate for the second quarter of 1923 shows a decided decline, according to official figures for 46 German cities. In the corresponding quarter of 1922 there were 76,784 children born, as against 65,584 this year. For the first quarter of 1923 the number of children born was 69,620. The birth rate is now down almost to the lowest level of the war period. 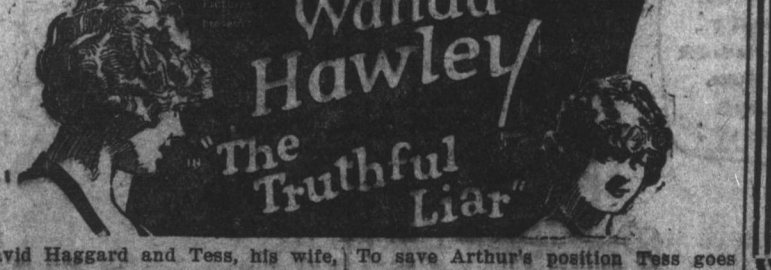
