Empire Parley Must be Held on Foreign Policy

LONDON TIMES SAYS THAT IS THE ONLY PATH LEADING TO UNITED ACTION.

LONDON, Feb. 5 .- The Times today in an article op the Dominions and the Foreign Policy of the Empire says it is manifest if the Empire is to have a foreign policy commanding the approval and support of all its peoples it will only be as the result of effective consultation between the Governments of which the Empire is concerned, and adds that extraordinary as it may seem there is no such consultation to-day.

In reality there is far less consultation between the Governments of the Empire about the policy upon which their peace and security ultimately depends than there is between foreign nations. The Times points out that personal contact is the very essence of successful diplomatic intercourse and the only means of preventing or removing misunderstandings inseparable from the written



The Programme of the Session

day in the proceedings in the Legislature may be taken as an indication of a reawakening of public spirit in Newfoundland, then it may well be said that the The New Members country has taken on a new lease of life, and the signs are propitious as to its future welfare. Not only were the ceremonies attended by an unusually large and representative gathering of citizens, but the intense interest which was taken in them, and particularly in the programme of legislation outlined in the Speech from the Throne, was even more impressive than the occasion itself, and it did not require any demonstration to indicate that the assembly felt they were witnessing an epochal even in the history of the country.

The Speech from the Throne contains a programme of legislation which indicates that events in Newfoundland are about to undergo many drastic changes in her social, political and economical life, and it could which had unshakeable confidence in the support of the general public, and which was placed in power solely for the cal welfare. purpose of effecting such chan-

The Speech in the first place sets the official seal upon the statement that Newfoundland has weathered the storm and has entered the calm sea of prosperity. Gratitude is expressed for the success which crowned the efforts of those engaged in the fishing industry, and confidence, in the pulp and paper and other enterprises. Legislation will be introduced to give a stimulus to another industry, namely, farming, which it is hoped will have the effect of bringing considerably more land under cultivation and introducing better methods of working

In this comprehensive programme of legislation the decisions to abolish the Business Profits Tax and to introduce a Redistribution Bill are of paramount importance. In the case of the former it has generally been felt that the main effect of the Act has been to throttle development, and in the manner in which it has been enforced in the past the tax has not been made to bear evenly on all alike. Few will be the regrets expressed at its passing. 

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
