The Specter of War Responsibility

German persistence in conjuring up the specter of war responsibility, especially in connection with discussions of a security pact, is said to be an ominous effort that might result in a renewal of all the international passions of the war period. That at least is the opinion of certain British journals, which feel that the controversy is not worth pursuing. As the London New Statesman sees it, in speaking of this or that country in relation to responsibility for the war, it is necessary to think not of the general trend of public opinion, but of the attitude of those who were actually permitted to exercise power, and it goes on to say:

"England—in relation to any Continental war—was utterly pacifist, half militarist. Russia was an unknown quantity, but the Czar at any rate was most pacifically inclined. The Kaiser, on the other hand, was a militarist from top to toe, and the he was a fool, for whom even his own Ministers had no serious respect, his influence was necessarily enormous and, probably, in the event decisive. The publication by Kaunitz of the records of the German Foreign Office show conclusively how energetic and how provocative was the role the Kaiser played in the negotiations of the fatal 'twelve days.' He refused the conference proposed by Sir Edward Grey unless Austria expressly asks me to, which is not likely. He enthusiastically endorsed Austria's ultimatum to Serbia. He definitely opposed any moderation of Austria's demands. In so far as he was responsible for the policy of the German Government at that moment—and certainly his word was almost, if not quite, decisive—he was the maker of the war."

"There has been an attempt to suggest that Russia was really responsible, because the order for the mobilization of the Russian Army was issued before the corresponding German order. But this suggestion seems to be conclusively disposed of by the reports of the German military attaches in St. Petersburg. On July 29, 1914, he reported that the Russian military authorities 'do not want any war and would like to be able to avoid it,' and on the next day he telegraphed his impression that the Russians were mobilizing 'from a dread of coming events without any aggressive intentions and are now frightened at what they have brought about.'"

If any man or Government in Europe was "responsible" for the war,

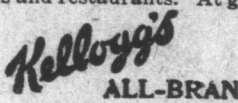

King and Many Ministers Defeated But Result Indefinite

Order Restored in Syria—Bulgarians and Greeks Retire Behind Their Own Boundaries

OTTAWA, Oct. 30. Canada's general election ends with the King and many Ministers defeated but the result is indefinite. The Liberals had 117 seats against the 97 announced as elected yesterday, a loss of twenty. The Conservatives had 49 as against 118 elected, a gain of 69.

Special Conference of United Church

The first session of the Newfoundland Conference of the United Church was opened in Gower Street Church yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. H. G. Coppins, convenor, in the chair. Hymn 56 was sung. Rev. E.C. French read the 3rd chap. of Ephesians and Rev. W. Swann and Rev. Dr. Curtis led in prayer. Hymn 151 was sung and Mr. A. Mews, C.M.G., engaged in prayer. The roll was called when 34 members and 13 lay representatives answered to their names.
It was unanimously resolved that the Acting Secretary of the Conference cast a ballot in favour of the election of Rev. Harry G. Coppins as President of the Newfoundland Conference. The President made an excellent speech in accepting the honour from his brethren.
It was unanimously resolved that the President cast a ballot in favour of the election to Rev. Elijah C. French as Secretary of the first conference of the United Church.

Upon the nomination of the Secretary, Rev. C. H. Blunt was elected Journal Secretary and Rev. G. B. Pickering, Assistant Secretary. Conference reporters elected were Rev. J. G. Joyce, Rev. C. H. Johnson.
Rev. Dr. Fenwick moved that a combined Nominating and Business Committee be appointed and that H. N. Burt be its convenor; carried.
At 11.30 Rev. Dr. Chown, the representative of the First General Council of the United Church, addressed the conference in a masterly and lucid way, dealing with the glorious heritage of the uniting churches, and emphasizing their outstanding characteristics that go toward the consolidation of the Kingdom.
The wish of the conference was that Dr. Chown place his address in the hands of the Secretary with the desire that the city press give it publication, and that the "Greeting" will also publish it.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

The afternoon session was almost entirely taken up with routine work. Dr. Curtis explained that the delay in seeking legislation in Newfoundland was intentional, and that proper progress would at once be made. The conference also took into consideration the arrangement that has been agreed upon that the funds which were raised separately under several names should this year and hereafter be put in one estimate under the name, Maintenance and Extension Fund.

EVENING SESSION.

The Methodist Church of Newfoundland has shown itself purely idealistic in the Church Union discussion. There was no pressure of local conditions. English Methodism would have welcomed a union with the oldest dominion for the preservation of the old name. Newfoundland Methodism in some ways ran a risk in entering the union. But none of these things moved the followers of the field preacher, who said, "The world is my parish." They said from Channel to the Straits and from Curling to Cape Spear, union is right. Christ prayed for it. We will do our part to satisfy Him. The question is settled. Let us go ahead with our business.

This settled any matter of fact attitude together with an unpleasant evening, accounts for the comparatively small audience present last evening, when President Coppins opened the service. "Where cross the crowded ways of life" was sung and Rev. S. Bennett led in prayer. Dr. Curtis read the lesson and then Dr. Chown, characterized by the President as one of the greatest ecclesiastical statesmen of the generations, began his eloquent presentation of the great question of Union.
The Doctor was a little husky, but there was no hesitation of thought. For many years, he said, before union was even discussed, co-operation with the Presbyterian church was commonly discussed, co-operation with the Presbyterian church was commonly practiced. For six years he was chairman of such a committee operating in Alberta, in 1902 at the Winnipeg General Conference. Principal Patrick, Professor Bryce, and "Ralph Connor" came as a delegation from the Presbyterian church. The former poured out his heart in a volcano-like flood of eloquence, urging the possibility of Church Union and challenging the conference to appoint a committee on the subject. This was done and by 1905 the first Union Committee met and after several sittings a basis was unanimously agreed upon.
The first rift was discerned when a section of the Presbyterian Church began to question the authority of the General Assembly. Under the provisions of the Barrier Act, the needed steps were taken, but then the dissenters began to defy the authorities of the church, their strongest ground being that while the Barrier Act did provide for the change of the church, it did not provide for the ending of the church. As a matter of fact, a change could be so great as to equal the ending of the church. Rumour is that said that the new church had no creed, but there is a creed carefully drawn and though the individual minister does not have to sign his name assent to the statement, he is to be

carefully examined. Next it was said that there were no elders. The name is not mentioned, but elders are being elected every week and the name is sure to stand. It is not true that a congregation cannot call its own minister. The charge was published that Methodism was financially bankrupt. As a matter of fact the Methodist church has \$17,000,000 more property than the Presbyterians and 100,000 more members of the church.
Though the many regular Presbyterian churches have stayed out, Methodism has willingly agreed, yes, enthusiastically agreed to go in to a union which will add to her burdens. Dr. Chown repudiated the charge that he desired to create a great political machine. He read a charge from "Auto" literature, which had been widely circulated that "the Methodist Church was an Apostate church, denying the Divinity of Christ and the value of His blood as an atonement for sin."
That charge was so serious that it required special consideration. It was not true. He knew no hint of it in any quality. Some men have unfortunately emphasized negatives in regard to Jesus, though they have been believers in Christ's full Divinity. Anybody that officially circulated literature like that was unworthy. Further, the same people have given their assent to the doctrine that God had created some men who never could accept under any circumstances the offer of salvation. For his part, the speaker would rather believe in no God at all.
In regard to the disposal of property, the legislature had decided that congregations had the right to vote their property into union. Fair treatment would in any case be given to anti-unionist Methodist Churches had a right to vote out, but not one of them had even taken a vote. The silence of Methodism was misunderstood, and public men began to say that Methodists were not interested any longer. It was then needful to send a short letter to our people, asking them to let their representatives know where they stood. This was called "Chown's Mandate." The telling of the story answered that.
Many naturally loyal people had actually forgotten that the General Assembly had pledged itself to union and had done so according to all the rules of their own denomination. 187 ministers had not forgotten, but as in the great day of the disruption had gone out, not knowing whether they went, Presbyterians had had greater difficulties than Methodists. These were doctrinal, national and historical even in their own circles there had been evidences of blessing through the stirring up of new workers. Locally, perhaps, it was best that St. Andrew's had been unanimous in its decision. In any case, Methodism had done its duty, as that duty was seen, and went prayerfully forward singing "I love Thy Kingdom Lord," with which hymn the service closed.

Ministers Hope Canada to Share Pact Obligations

BRITISH BELIEVE OTTAWA SIGNATURE WILL BREAK DOWN OPPOSITION.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Will Canada, and the other Dominions agree to share in the obligations of the Security Pact? This is the question which Ministers are asking with some anxiety, since they believe that if they can persuade Canada to assume them they will break the back of the opposition to the pact, and refute the charge of endangering the unity of the Empire.

No definite decision on the point is expected from Canada and Australia just now, owing to the elections, but it is confidently believed that New Zealand will sign the pact while the attitude of South Africa is regarded as highly doubtful. Opponents of the pact are emphasizing the fact that the Dominions do not realize how the Pact affects them, and that when they do they will have a great deal to say. They assert also that Canada cannot escape the Pact, even if she wishes to.

If Britain, for instance, goes to war because of a sudden violation of the Pact Canada, as a member of the British Commonwealth, will be automatically at war, whether she signs the Pact or not, since from the international point of view she cannot contract out of war without leaving the Empire. These opponents say that no doubt Canada will help Britain in the same spirit that they did in 1914, but they urge that Canada ought to realize the extent of her obligations under the Pact.

Diplomatic Eye-wash.

Then, further, if in the future the League endorses war, Canada, as a member of the League, is bound to contribute her quota, so that either way Canada will be involved as well as the other Dominions, and they say that this is perilous for the unity of the Empire. In every European war the exact origin is never quite clear, and the idea that the Dominions, by not being asked to sign are not included in the Pact, is mere diplomatic eye-wash. Opponents of the Pact also laugh at the idea that after Britain has gone to war, because of sudden aggression, the Council of the League can then sit down and determine who the aggressor is. Once war was started it would be impossible for the League to adjudicate the issue.

Officials of the Foreign Office, questioned on these points, say that the basic idea of the Pact is peace, and not war, and they say that Canada herself has to decide whether she will come in or stay out.

Would Like Signature.

There is no obligation, they say, on Canada or any other Dominion as to whether she will sign or not, but they admit that if war broke out it would be most difficult to keep Canada out.

"We are not troubling just now about war, or the possibilities of war," said a Foreign Office head, "since we know that if war breaks out Canada will make her decision as she did in the last war, and since we only go to war in case of clear and violent breaking of the Pact there will never be the slightest doubt who is the aggressor."

"We would like to see Canada sign the Pact, but we do not think she need have the slightest fear about the obligations she will have to assume for a single moment, and we will certainly take an early opportunity of explaining this fully to her. Yet the decision rests entirely with her and she is fully cognizant of our wishes in the matter."

Meanwhile, there is much speculation here as to whether, when the Pact is ratified, Britain will have to proceed to make military preparations for either France or Germany, or for both, in case of aggression that leads to open hostilities. This, of course, is pure speculation at present since the chief concern of the Government now is to proceed towards disarmament.

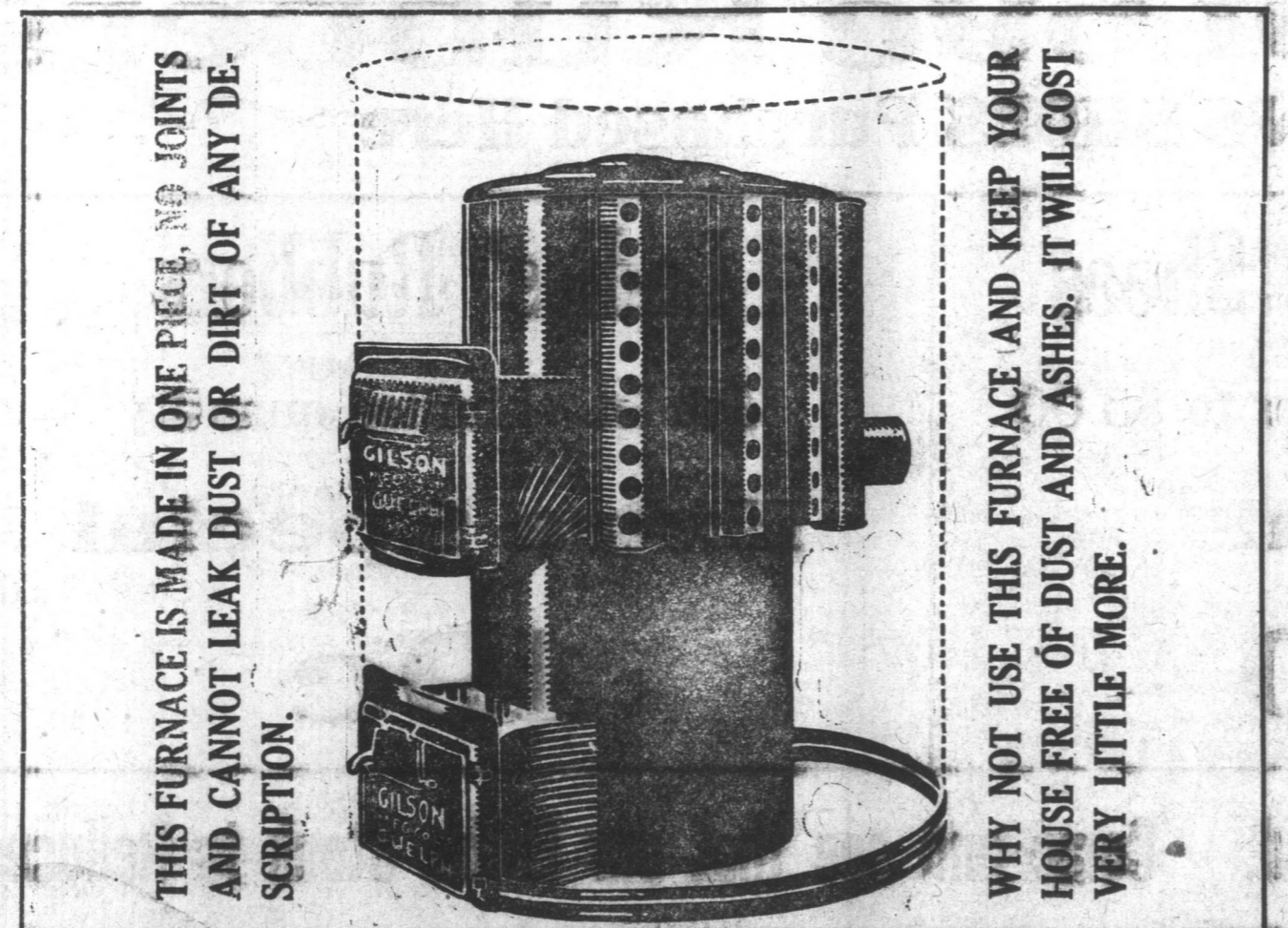

Fix Minimum Age of Boys at Sea

OTTAWA, Oct. 19.—By proclamation which will appear in this week's issue of the Canada Gazette, legislation fixing the minimum age for admission of children to employment at sea at 14 years becomes effective as from the first of next January. The legislation also fixes the minimum age for young persons to employment as sailors at 15 years and requires compulsory medical examination of children and young persons employed at sea. This legislation was enacted in 1924, and gave effect to certain conventions adopted at the International Labor Conference in 1920 and 1921 but was to come into force only on proclamation. It was a matter of discussion at the recent Child Welfare Conference at Ottawa.

Tribulations of a Mine Developer

The following letter is taken from Engineering and Mining Journal Press:

Sir—I have read with great interest "The Story of Tintic Standard. How J. Raddatz Overcame Serious Obstacles and Developed the Outstanding Silver-Lead Mine in the United States," as written by Arthur B. Parsons, in Mining Journal-Press, of Aug. 8. Mr. Parsons' description of Mr. Raddatz's early experience in connection with the Tintic Standard seems to me like my own that I have thought perhaps Mr. Raddatz may be interested to hear a little bit of my hard experience in this part of British North America.

To begin at the beginning, I started prospecting in 1875, but nothing uncommon to prospectors happened till 1905, when my Indian guide took me into a country 15 miles from tidewater, and showed me a number of large pieces of copper-bearing rock, some of them hundreds of tons in weight, and there were hundreds of them within a radius of two miles east and west and about 300 yards wide north and south. Samples taken from many of them have assayed from 3 to 8 per cent. copper, with small quantities of gold and silver.

In 1911, after six years of talking and persuading some of my immediate friends, I finally succeeded in getting them to join with me in "staking out," and later obtain from our government the exclusive right to twenty-seven claims, or locations, thirteen and one-half miles, along the mineral belt. In 1912 we did considerable surface prospecting, and found and located a large "outcrop" of copper and iron, in place, about four miles to the west of our stake claim, by the side of the Great Gull Lake.

In 1917 we formed a local company and incorporated under the laws of Newfoundland, capitalized at \$200,000. Since then we have proved a large body of copper ore on one of our locations by shaft sinking, crosscutting, and diamond drilling, over an area 1,400 ft. long east and west, with an average width of 57 ft., and 500 ft. deep—the extent of our boring giving

an average assay of between 2.75 and 3 per cent. copper.

On another location of this Great Gull Lake group we have rich ore, vein matter which gave assays from 9 per cent up to as high as 17 per cent copper. Notwithstanding this, the majority of men that I have met are of the "Doubting Thomas" family. If Mr. Raddatz or some of his plucky friends were near me I would take him or them to another property in which I am largely interested, where I can take samples from several veins that will assay 5 per cent copper, 8 per cent antimony, 6 per cent bismuth, and 23 oz. of silver to the ton of 2,240 lb.

Mr. Raddatz's ore was 1,000 ft. under "worthless rock," but his friends, like himself, were not of the "tender-foot," nor of the "Doubting" family; hence his success. But my friends argue, notwithstanding the fact that they can see the ore at "grass roots." "It is not likely," they say, "to continue at depth; it will 'cut out,' and we will lose our money, if we invest, instead of getting rich quick." "He that complains against his will is of his own opinion still," and notwithstanding that I can show from drill records anywhere from two million to four million tons of ore assaying from 2.75 per cent to 3 per cent. copper, on one location and at a depth of only 500 ft.—a depth that would be considered "hen-scratching" in your country.

Peace-Making in the Motor Boat

5 HOURS' LAKE TRIP.

(From Daily Mail Correspondent) BERLIN, Oct. 21.—A message received from Locarno to-night states that agreement has been reached.

Germany raised her objections to Article 16 of the League of Nations Covenant on the understanding that after entry into the League the Allied Powers will support a proposal to modify it. It is also stated that, as well as a Rhine Pact, arbitration treaties with Poland and Czechoslovakia will be signed, the drawing up of which presents no undue difficulties. The treaties will be countersigned by France.

On the other hand, the evacuation of Cologne will be made as quickly as possible. Excitement is running high here with regard to the impetuous doings of the little ship Orange Blossom, which with Mr. Austen Chamberlain, M. Briand, and Dr. Stresemann, the British, French, and German Foreign Ministers, Dr. Luther, the German Chancellor, and their respective experts aboard, left Locarno for an unknown destination across the Italian frontier.

It was at half-past two yesterday afternoon when the Foreign Ministers stepped aboard the racy little craft, berthed alongside the jetty, and before anyone was aware of what was happening she was far out on the blue waters of Lake Maggiore.

What occurred aboard the Orange Blossom during her five hours' trip only history will tell, but it may well be that the peace of Europe was finally settled around the little oak table in her cabin.

Out in the Dark

That agreement of some kind was reached is certain, and the optimists expect the seal to be set on this agreement at to-morrow's plenary meeting of the Peace Pact Conference. Support was given to this view by the statements of a number of people who, intrigued by the long absence of the Orange Blossom, chartered a fast motor-boat to go out to search for her.

When they saw was a group of Ministers in animated discussion in the forward cabin of the boat. One was said to be rapidly writing notes which were incomplete when the vessel arrived outside the harbour. The captain therefore headed the boat out on the lake again, and she cruised about for another hour in the dark.

Italy Joins

When the party landed they all seemed in very high spirits, and gripped each other's hands warmly before motoring away to their different hotels.

A very important feature of the last plenary meeting was Italy's formal request to be included in the proposed pact which is to guarantee the neutrality of the demilitarised zones of the Rhine. It is very probable that Signor Mussolini, the Italian Prime Minister, will come to Locarno on Thursday if the pact is ready for signature.

The main obstacle up to yesterday was the question of Germany's entry into the League of Nations. A special messenger was sent to Berlin to acquaint President von Hindenburg with the situation and bring back his final instructions.

M. Chicherin Discomfited

BERLIN.—According to a Warsaw despatch, M. Chicherin, the Moscow Foreign Commissary, stated to Polish politicians that Russia's attitude to the League of Nations must change when Germany has entered it. M. Chicherin, who must now realize that his furious propaganda against the Locarno Conference has been a complete failure, said that Russia had several times expressed readiness to send an observer to Geneva, but considered it impossible to find anybody to arbitrate on questions concerning Russia in view of the tremendous differences between the Soviet form of government and that of other countries.

He declared that Britain was trying to form a union of States against the Soviet Union, and added: "Consequently the Russian Government will insist on an authoritative statement that the British Government will alter its point of view before it can alter its own point of view."

£30,000,000 Estate

DEATH OF MR. V. B. DUKE—MAN WHO LED TO VACCO WAR ON BRITAIN.

Mr. James Buchanan Duke, the tobacco magnate, died at his Fifth-avenue residence, leaving a fortune estimated at £30,000,000. He was popularly described as "one of the last of the log-cabin successives of American life," for he was born 68 years ago in poverty on a small farm in North Carolina. His father grew tobacco, which James Buchanan and his brothers peddled about the countryside. In 1870 they started a small tobacco factory and James Buchanan was at the age of 14, its manager. This was the business, which by masterly consolidations developed into the mammoth tobacco trust the American Tobacco Company.

Mr. J. B. Duke was a magnificent philanthropist. Only last year he gave £11,000,000 for educational establishments.

He attributed his success to a capacity for hard work.

About 25 years ago Mr. Duke came to London to try to capture the British market. Buying up a Liverpool company, he started a price war, flooding the country with cheap cigarettes. He also introduced a system of bonuses and premiums to retailers.

To meet the attack most of the British tobacco manufacturers combined and formed the Imperial Tobacco Company, and some of them retaliated by entering the American market.

After a bitter and costly fight Mr. Duke and the British firms agreed to the formation of the British-American Company, and the Home trade was left to the Imperial Company.

Lord Birkenhead's Fees. Litigation followed with regard to the bonuses, and this lasted about three years. Lord Birkenhead (then Mr. F. E. Smith) was one of the counsel engaged, and at a banquet to celebrate the settlement he said that his fees in the dispute had enabled him to marry and set up his home.

France Registers Foreign Visitors

The registry of foreigners residing in France has been the object of much confusion in the past, and a new decree was recently issued giving simpler and clearer directions concerning identity cards.

According to advice received by the Bankers Trust Company of New York from its French Information Service, every foreigner over 16 years of age who intends to reside in France for a period exceeding two months, is now bound to apply for an identity card at the central police office, or the mayor of his place of residence within 48 hours from his arrival. The applicant must produce a passport or other sufficient proof of his identity as well as four photographs.

The identity card corresponds to a permit of residence and must be presented to local police or municipal authorities within 48 hours of every change of residence. It can be withdrawn in case of breach of regulations and this entails expulsion from the French territory. Identity cards have a validity of two years; the delivery or renewal costs 68 francs and a duplicate can be obtained in case of loss. This tax is reduced to 10 francs for parents of a person having acquired French nationality, for students matriculated in public or private schools, for scientists and members of foreign universities, for authors and journalists possessing certificates of the Ministry of Education of a corporate body, for salaried workers and their families.

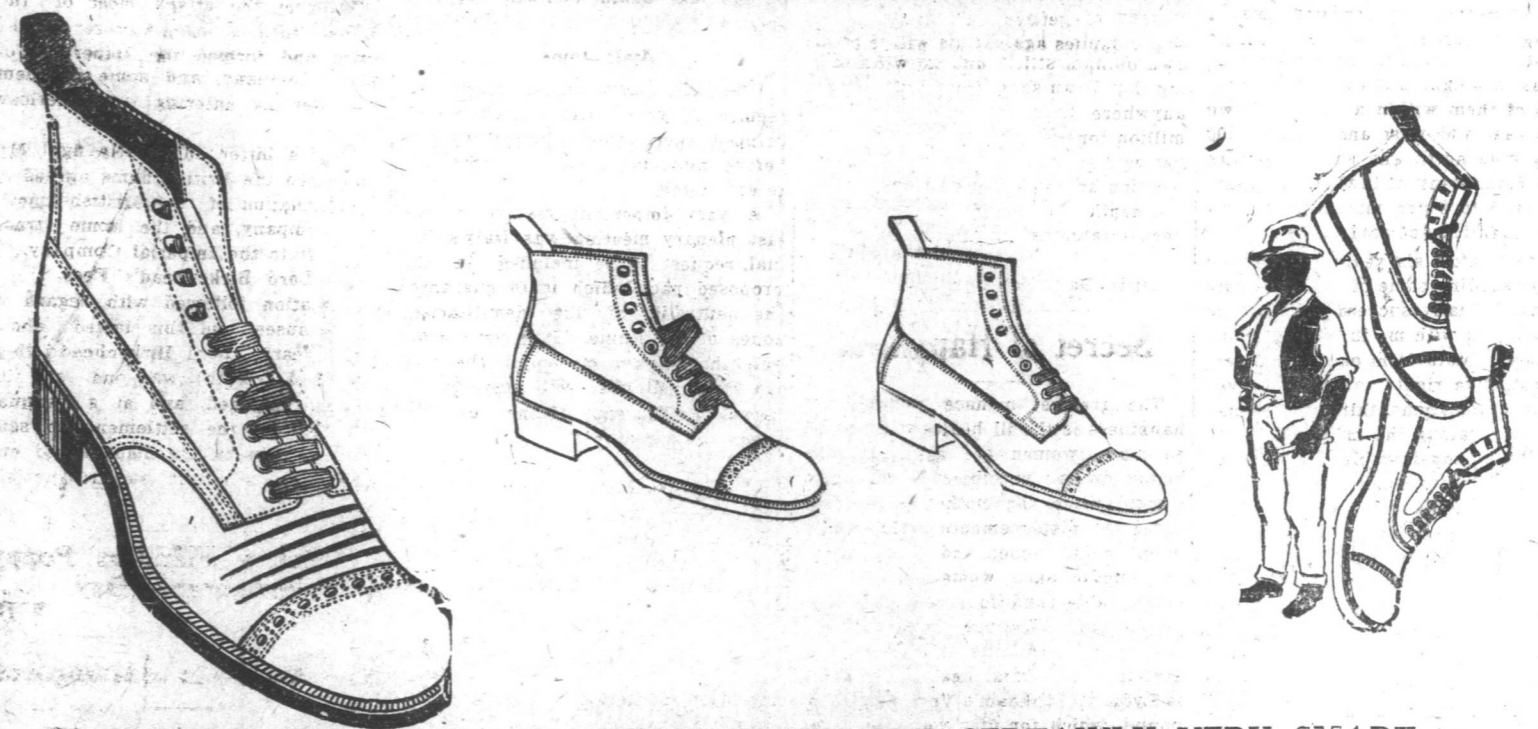

Taxicabs and the Public

HIGH FARES—OLD VEHICLES.
(By Lt.-Com. J. M. Kenworthy, R.N., M.P.)

London is an Imperial city. Visitors to our capital city have their judgment affected a good deal by the condition of the public vehicles. And more visitors come to London from every part of the globe than to any other city. The old London hansoms were our joy and pride. We called them the gondolas of our capital.

To-day there are about 8,000 taxicabs in the London area, and they have not enough work to do. In view of the congestion of the streets their numbers should certainly not be added to. The existing cabs are not patronised by the public as they should be. This is, firstly, because the charges are too high, and, secondly, because many of the vehicles on the streets are old, slow, and insanitary.

In consequence we have idle taxicabs on the ranks and "cruising" taxicabs plying for hire. These taxicabs are a danger. The driver must look out for fares and cannot pay full attention to his driving. And some of the drivers have a habit of turning very sharply when a customer's hand is held up; this has frequently led to collisions.

Paris is a contrast. There, taxicabs are much more widely patronised by the public than in London and there always appear to be just enough to go round. One reason is that the taxicab-owners and owner-drivers in Paris reduced their fares a long time ago. It is futile for the advocates of high fares in London to plead that this is because of the depreciation of the franc. The principal items of upkeep—namely, petrol and the rubber for the tyres—are not produced in France but have to be bought at world prices.

Again, in Paris there are two classes of taxicabs with two different tariffs. Why should we not have the same thing here? A single passenger could then take the second-class and a party the first-class cab.

Better still is the Brighton idea, where a good trade is done by the motor-cyclists with a kind of sedan chair on wheels, which will take two at a pinch. These little vehicles are handy and swift and can dodge in and out of the traffic very conveniently. Also they take up less road space. Most of the time taxicabs are in use they have only one passenger, and it is absurd that four-seater machines only should be allowed on the London streets. This the Home Office Committee has recognised.

Another plan we might follow is that adopted in Germany, Italy, Australia, and other countries where open cars ply for hire as well as the closed variety. If a certain proportion of open cars were on the London streets I believe they would be used for long-distance runs into the country to a far greater extent than closed cabs are to-day.

In any case the number should not be added to; but the new types of taxicabs suggested might replace many of the decrepit old machines which are no credit to the greatest and richest city in the world.—Daily Mail.

Arctic Nearly in Crash With Iceberg in North
Was Locked For Twenty Days In Sub-Polar Ice Field.
OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—How the government steamship Arctic was locked for twenty days in the ice; how she escaped by hoisting a sail at 3 o'clock in the morning, from the menace of an iceberg towering 200 feet above her decks, and how the mounted police detachments had given her up for lost, are among the stories which are being told how that members of the expedition have returned to the capital.

Information received at Godhaven, the capital of Greenland, caused the Arctic to change her course and go directly north to Etah, where the MacMillan expedition of the United States had established its headquarters. Following the interview the Americans stopped their place, flights over Canadian territory and left for home.

During the coming winter, Sergt. Joy of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police will make a personal patrol from the Craig Harbor detachment across Ellesmere Island and encircle Axel Heiberg. By this means, Canada's claim to the island will be strengthened. Sergt. Joy will be the first white man, so far as is known, to reach Axel Heiberg Island.

Former Kaiser's Wife Wins Suit

EFFORTS TO INSTIGATE CHARGE AGAINST PRINCESS HERMINE ENDS IN FAILURE.

Stuttgart, Germany, Oct. 21.—Efforts by republican guards to begin proceedings against Princess Hermine, wife of former Emperor William, for alleged unlawful usurpation of the title "Kaiserin Hermine" have failed.

An attempt to lodge a criminal complaint against her under the penal code was made at Nurnburg, but the court there passed the allegations along to another court, which declined to present the charge to the district attorney. Likewise the public prosecutor would not take any action.

It was charged that Hermine deposed her husband as "Wife of His Majesty William II., former Emperor." Also it was alleged that she was registered in the list of visitors to the Spa at Wilbad as "Empress" and that a local photographer issued picture postcards of her with the words "Kaiserin Hermine in Wilbad, 1925" on them.

SIDE TALKS.

By Ruth Cameron.

A PARTNER NOT A BOARDER.
How much should children do in the home? Should they be expected to do any service at home during school days? Should they be paid for whatever they do?
These are questions you often hear discussed.
One of my most delightful Letter Friends, who often gives me cross sections of her very normal home life, in answer to something I had written about the child who fights against helping, wrote me as follows:
"Not A Matter To Be Argued."
"About having the children go on errands and do dishes and their unwilling attitude towards work, I believe in and practice a stand of absolute authority about such things."
"Where the dishes are very greasy or the bundles to be carried are numerous, I go along to the kitchen or the store to give my aid; I never yet heard any one say that they enjoyed doing dishes, and I think a little help makes a child more contented."
"My 12-year-old niece makes all her own dresses" and underslips. She hastens to complete whatever prices are offered for sewing and it is all due to my sister's firm hand in governing her and in making her see that she's a partner in the home not a boarder."
I particularly like that last phrase—"making her see that she is a partner in the home not a boarder."
"How few children, comparatively, do realize that they are anything except star boarders with no board to pay."
A partnership means that all concerned share both duties and advantages.

They Eat Up The Privileges.
The average child accepts all possible advantages, of course, but regards duties as something uncalled for. He either expects to be paid for them (and sometimes even when he is paid) he expects to be reminded and urged on, and to be constantly praised and thanked. The idea that certain duties, a certain contribution to the carrying on of this business of home-making, are theirs as naturally and rightfully as their privileges many children never even glimpse.
And it isn't really their fault either. We are born helpless and for years we are ministered to because we have to be, and the habit of acceptance becomes strong with us. There's no reason we should do anything but accept unless someone tries to instill in us a better sense of values and obligations.
We've got to be made to see, as my Letter Friend puts it, that we are partners and not boarders.
It Will Not Hurt Him.
I don't believe in giving a great deal of housework on the child who is working hard at school. But I do think the busiest child has time for a few hours work a week a half hour of dishwashing every day, a couple of hours' work in the garden on Saturday, the few minutes of picking up after themselves that saves the mother in the aggregate so much and helps them to acquire in self-defense the habits of orderliness that they might never acquire if picked up after.
Of course children, most of them fight against work. It's their instinct. But as they look back in later years they won't be sorry that they did a little toward carrying on the home. And they will be very sorry and very much ashamed if they feel that they accepted everything and gave nothing.

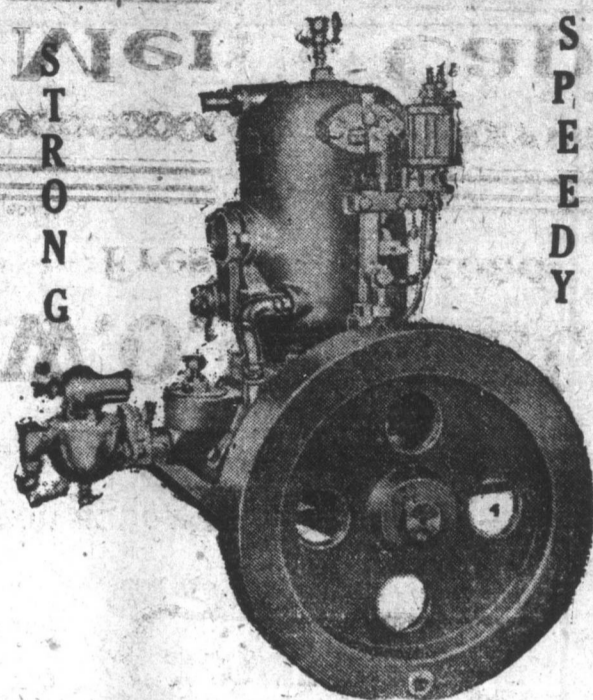

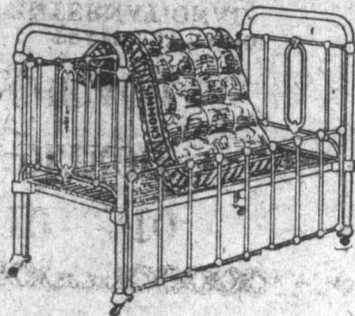
