Terrible Storm in Halifax. Halifax, N.S., Aug. 25.—A heavy thur storm passed over this city on Saturday night. All night long the thunder pealed and the lightning flashed with terrifying vividness, and the rain poured in torrents. Yesterday mosning it looked like clearing up, but towards noon the lightning flashed with the peak of the rain poured and McGuire. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. rain commenced again; the wind blowing strong from the north-east, and increasing to a perfect hurricane tewards evening. The gale raged all night and was one of the heaviest experienced here for many years. In the city the damage mostly done was to windows, shutters, sky-lights and chimney tops. Fences and trees were blown down in every direction, and debris is scattered through the streets. Most of the shipping in post had prepared for the gale and rode it out. The coal-laden schooner "Lucy Agnes" dragged her anchorage and went ashore. A number of small yachts were swamped and smashed at their anchorage. WIND ARD OIL.—The Petrolia correspondent of the Globe describes a new-feature in oil working, namely, the application of wind power to the pumping of wells having a small supply of water, furnishing from say 5 to 15 barrels of fluid per day, or such as are better known as accumulating wells. The mill sensitive to the lightest wind, furnishes sufficient power to operate the pump satisfactorily. power to operate the pump satisfactorily It is mounted on a tower 52 feet high and in its construction several entirely new features have been introduced—the new features have been introduced—the use of concave iron slats for sails and the improved method or regulating the same, being the most prominent. The introduction of this power must necessarily give an impetus to the production of crude oil, because several hundred wells that are now abandoned may be operated at a profit, whilst previously the productwould not pay the expense of running them by steam power.

A vote has recently been taken in Toronto upon a by-law submitted by the Council in the city to the rate-payers, for the purpose of raising the sum of \$37,000 for school purposes. The school law now in force com. The school law now in force com pelled the Toronto Board of School Trustees to provide increased accom modation for children of school age, afternoon, and spoke for several and the Board had accordingly applied to the City Council for the sum Doull, M. P.'s for Pictou, were present. named. They proposed to raise it by issuing debentures, and the bylaw published was to that effect When the vote was taken the by-lav was negatived; but only a small fraction of the ratepayers has taken any interest in the proceedings-like our own rate payers on a recent but dissimilar vote. The total number of votes polled was less than two hundred. The two leading city papers next day briefly commented upon this state of things, and we re produce their remarks. The Globe

says:—

We never object to any outlay for city purposes that is really necessary or would serve a good end. But certainly here is no use in throwing money away, and when the City Council took a vote of the citizens on the by-law for the rection of school-house, it might as well have thrown all the money that the vote cost into the Lake. The expression of the will of the citizens on the subject is not worth the snap of one's finger, for, according to law, the School Trustees, both in town and country, can call for money either for building school-houses or for prying teachers up to the full value of all the property in the section, or municipality, as the case may be. The City of Town Council has no choice. Whatever the Trustee demand they must supply, and the voice of the people is powerless in opposition except by their by-and-bye putting out extravagant Trustees and cheosing more economical ones in their place. So long, however, as the Trustees are in power they can build and premise salaries at discretion. The only limit is thought to be all sufficient—that they canot vote away other people's money without correspondingly voting away their own. The vote against the \$37,000 of debentures, then, is of no avail whatever, and the \$1,000 or \$100 incurred in taking the vote was a piece of absolute waste.

We can conceive of nothing more farcical than the submission to the ratepayers of a city like Toronto, whose assessment is something like \$12,000,000, a

Our reason for calling attention to these proceedings in Toronto is that the ratepayers of Guelph are soon to record their votes for or against a by-law to be submitted by our Town Council for raising \$30,000 to erect a 1872) new school building in this town.
The School Board ask the sum to The School Board ask the sum to enable them to comply with the COMPLETE SUCCESS! School Act of 1871, which compels them to provide adequate school acdation for all children of school age in the municipality. We know there is a good deal of feeling amongst a portion of our townsme against the contemplated expenditure; and in the event of the people here voting down the by-law, as citizens of Toronto did theirs, the Received Every First Prize for question will be an interesting one -How will our Council raise the money? For our readers will re member that the School Board must provide the increased accommodation; and that the Council must provide the money to pay for it. The Council have no power to refuse the sum demanded, nor have even the people. Indeed, we believe that the Board could, if they thought proper, prescribe to the Council the manner in which the funds should be raised. We may have more to say on this subject in a future issue.

Some apprehension seems to be felt by the supporters of the Separate School that if the by-law is passed their property will be liable to assessment for the erection of the new building. They need not fear this. Their property can no more be assessed for the support or erection of Public Schools than can the property of the general rateapyers be assessed to support Separate Schools. The Act bearing on the point contains the following clause:


