NINET'S JRUEL JAILERS. THUMB-SCREWED AND ROBBED

London, Oct. 25-Ninet writes protestlance. He gives a graphic account of the filthy condition of his prison in Cairo. He says thumbscrews were put on him during his journey from Cairo to Alexandria. At the latter place he was thrust-into a prison filthier than that at Cairo and swarming with vermin. He was robbed by the jailers and then put on a vessel for deportation to Smyrns, but was smuggled ashore at Piracus by aid of the Armenian officer of the ship. He went then to Berne. Ninet believes that there are 3000 innocent men in Egyptian prisons such as he described.

THE INDEMNITY COMMISSION.

CAIRO, Oct. 25—The British government has made a fresh proposal to Egypt with regard to the indemnity, according to which Egypt will have two representatives on the commission, and England and France one each; the United States and Greece will be invited to send representatives and the minor states will have collective Tepresentatives.
