From a Regular Correspondent of The World. WINNIPEG, June 18 .- The duilness of the season here is relieved only by the loings of the city council and of the provincial legislature. Of the former I shall not at present speak, but shall endeavor to give the readers of The World some idea, in a rambling way, of the latter body, what it is doing and who compose it.

This year the legislature moved into

fresh quarters-the new court house, which has been temporarily fitted up for that purpose, and suits admirably. It was at first feared that the members would be greatly inconvenienced by its distance from the main part of the city, but as a branch of Poyntz's Bodega has been established in the mmittee room most adjacent to the legislative chamber, it is presumed that this serious difficulty has been overcome. No one knows whether a seperate license has been granted, but not even the most emperate citizen can object to the honorable members seeking thus to break the monotony of their oppressive duties. The thankful, for it probably is owing to this cause that they have been at unusual hours delighted with social songs and spirted

choruses.

After the usual absurdly lengthened debate on the address the assembly has attempted to settle down to work. A good deal of important legislation with reference to property and civil rights is being pushed through—a dangerous business in a house which contains but three lawyers, and on which the vast majority of the members know nothing and care less about the subject. However the Ontario statutes are being pretty literally followed and not much harm may result.

The opposition though not strong numerically certainly in point of ability compares most favorably with the government and their supporters, Mr. Norquay, the premier, is undoubtedly the best man in the cabinet. He is a liberal by instinct and a conservative by interest. He is possessed of some administrative ability and of considerable shrewdness, while his long experience of affairs in this province stands him in good stead. His worst characteristic is his utter want of moral backbone. Next in point of ability in the cabinet is the minister of public works, Hon. C. P. Brown, also a man of liberal proclivities prematurely checked by circumstances. Mr. Brown is a man of great, though sometimes not well directed, energy. Whether from lack of courage or from motives of policy he has directed, shergy. Whether from lack of courage or from motives of policy he has never been decided in his expressed opinions and it is not impossible that he may some day be the premier of a liberal ministry. The Hon. Attorney-General Sutherland is one of the youngest and most popular members of the house as well as its most impetuous politician. A sort of a Manitoban Randolph Churchill in fact. "How do yeu propose to pass through the rapids?"

"I'll explain my plan. The current, they say, is thirty-nine miles an hour and the river is ninet-rive feet deep. It is wide just below the falls and nor rows at the rapids. I am only afraid of two awful ledges of piffed rocks which jut out from the shores into the whir pool. The water fairly skricks and hisses as it boils over them. Now, I want to savoid the sides, and yet I dare not go into the middle, for there lies the vortex, and that means death. I will go out into the middle of the river in a small boat just about the suscension bridge. The only clothing I shall wear will be the sitk trunks I had on when I swam the English channel. At this time appointed I will leap fort the river and float into the rapids. Of course I will make no attempt to go orward, for the fearful speed of the water will carry me through. When the water gets very bad I will go under the surface, and remain beneath until I am compelled to come up for breath. That will be pretty often, I'll wager. When I strike the whirlpool I will strike out with all my strength, and try to keep away from the suck hole in the centre. I will begin with the breast strokes and then us overhand stokes. I may take me two or three hours to get out of the whirthool, which is about a quarter of a mile long. When I get through I will try to land on the Canadian side, but


