An important order has been issued by the Post-Office Department, whereby the amount in the post-office savings bank may be increased from \$3,000 to \$5,000. Formerly only \$1,000 could be placed to the credit of any account yearly, now the amount is increased to \$1,500 in any one year, and the maximum limit of an account is fixed at \$5,000, exclusive of interest.

No children are to be allowed to attend a moving picture show after June 1st unless accompanied by an adult, under a bill passed by the Ontario Legislature to regulate moving picture theatres. Infractions are to be punished by fines of not less than \$50 and no more than \$200. A board of censors consisting of three members is to pass upon all moving picture films before they are displayed in public. The censors will have absolute power to permit or prohibit the exhibition of any films in the province. All films are to be stamped, and all films so stamped cannot be questioned by the authorities of any municipality or any police officer.

A RECENT change in the liquor law provides as follows:—"If ten per cent. of the electors of a municipality petition the council before the 1st of November in any year, asking for a specified reduction in the number of licenses, the question of making such reduction shall be submitted to the electors, and a majority vote will prevail. The council must submit the question when asked and must give effect to a vote in favor of reduction. When the question of license reduction has been submitted to the electors and voted upon, no other reduction vote may be taken for a period of three years."

DR. WM. SAUNDERS, director of Dominion experimental farms, has tendered his resignation to the Minister of Agriculture. It will take effect at the end of the present month. Dr. Saunders, who is one of the best known men in the Dominion of Canada, has been director of experimental farms since 1886. His reason for resigning is that of late his health has not been good. He proposes to take a long holiday in Europe, and will sail for England in May next. He is 75 years of age and lived formerly in London.

LAST SUNDAY was the day set apart by the Church of England to commemorate the three hundredth anniversary of the gift of the King James version of the Bible to English-speaking people. During his sermon in Trinity Church that evening Rev. S. F. Irwin in referring to the subject made some trite remarks on the influence of the Bible on the religious life of the world. He asserted that its educational influence, its purity of language and grammar, made it a classic of English literature, that its spiritual influence upon the souls and lives of men showed it to be the one book that unites all religious bodies, and that the great strides civilization had made during the past 300 years were largely due to the Bible.

The route to London would largely parallel the G.T.R. and C.P.R., touching Glencoe Thamesville and other points along the line, with feeders on both sides.

few minutes, then he said: "It's veneered,—like so many other things. The ground wood is not good enough to carry the top sheet of oak." The carpenter did not seem cheerful—on the contrary. He sighed, "Canada is the worst place for veneering I ever saw. Nothing is honestly made."

The indictment would be a stern one, even if it applied only to furniture. No one will deny that immense quantities of very ordinary stuff are manufactured—not because people are fond of it, but because they want to get furniture of fine appearance at a low price. Veneering is the remedy. A thin slice of oak is glued to a thick slice of basswood and the thing is done. This is not an attack on the furniture industry. Our manufacturers produce much goods of the highest quality, massive and honest in every joint. People of taste buy them. The rest of us get furniture that looks all right, and think that we have a bargain. We all seem to forget that we get what we pay for—no more, no less.

But veneer is used elsewhere. We have too many men in political and social life, who are not so good as they look. A cross-section would give the secret away. They are smooth in their appearance, but they do not wear. Time shows the defect. Our political annals are filled with the stories of men who tried to make polish stand for merit. They always failed. The parliamentarian who seeks self-aggrandisement instead of the safety of the country is a veneered person who cannot be grateful to people of good taste.

In like manner the extravagant wealthy are of bargain quality. They imagine that the outward appearance makes the gentleman. But the rough diamond is of far greater

## Boy Scouts to Coronation.

Boy Scouts from the Overseas Dominions will have official standing in the Coronation procession, although provision had not at first been made for them. How detachments are to get to the old country and who is to pay the expenses of the trip is another question. The Canadian Century of Montreal is sending a squad of twenty, the boys to be drawn from all parts of Canada and it is not unlikely that Colonel Sherwood and the Dominion Council will arrange to send a second squad. The Century party will sail on the Empress of Ireland with the Canadian Coronation Contingent of Canada's official delegation and will travel like real soldiers under transport of war conditions.

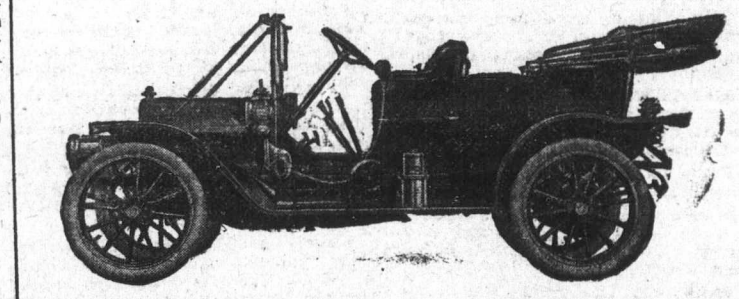

**Work of the Session.**

The session of the Ontario Legislature was brought to a close on Friday last.

Among the measures dealt with may be briefly summarized:—

Defined Pay-as-You-Enter cars. Gave City of Toronto power to purchase Toronto Electric Light Co.

Passed bill to provide for technical education and industrial training. Passed a new milk bill.

Passed bill for the better protection of workmen employed on scaffolding, designed to compel contractors and the public authorities to see to it that the scaffolding put up for men to work on is safe. It is probable that the new act will be the means of saving many lives.

Adopted resolutions against the reciprocity agreement and in favor of the use of English only for instruction in the public schools.

Passed a measure taxing stock transfers and increasing the tax on railway and express companies.

Passed Mr. Hanna's measure imposing a five per cent. tax on bar receipts over \$60 a day in the cities and \$50 a day elsewhere.

Extended the jurisdiction of the Hydro Electric Commission.

Passed an amendment to the drainage Act providing that municipalities must be notified of defects before drainage actions can be instituted.

Two important additions were incorporated in the Liquor License Act. Under the new reading, ten per cent. of the electors in a city, may on petition, require the council to submit a license reduction bylaw to the people and to pass it upon a majority vote of the electors.

Still more important is the addition providing that only residents of three months' standing may vote on a local option by-law.

A far-reaching bill is that introduced by the Hon. Adam Beck to provide for the local distribution of hydro electric power. This bill requires the council of a county to undertake the work of installing electric power for any section of the county or group of residents, the rates to be adjusted so that the cost of the undertaking shall be borne by those benefitted.

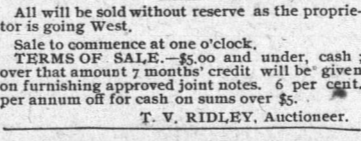

#### Would Join Dominion.

According to cables, newspapers and private letters received during the past few days, the Bahama Islands, a part of Britain's possessions in the West Indies, are anxious to become a part of the Dominion of Canada, and a large delegation of politicians and prominent men will shortly leave Nassau to officially place the views of the Islanders before the Governor-General at Ottawa. Canadians who know the Bahamas say that the islands would prove a most agreeable acquisition to Canada's family. Mr. T. B. Macaulay, of Montreal, who has spent many winters at Nassau, describes them as the "future Florida of Canada." He also declares that there are fine business opportunities offering and that Canadians who have invested money there up to the present have been more than successful.

#### Paris and Poor Children.

Paris sends its children to school and supplies the poor ones with clothing, shoes, and food, as well as with free books, slates, stationery, and instruments. And it arranges that no child shall know which of the others are charity pupils. It sends poor children on summer outings. It builds houses and rents them at low rates, giving preference to the poorest and largest families. It taxes every theatre ticket ten per cent. for a public fund which furnishes every year fifteen thousand free beds in hospitals and as many more in asylums. This fund has also built a maternity hospital, where no questions are asked. It helps to bring up thousands of poor children. It furnishes free medicine for the sick poor. It collects a per diem from the employer for a workman who receives injury in the discharge of his duties. It spends ten million dollars yearly for benevolence.

#### Golden Wedding.

Mr. and Mrs. Alex. McDougall of Sarnia, formerly of Banticklen township celebrated their golden wedding on Wednesday, March 15th. The noteworthy event was honored by the gathering of the immediate relatives, children, grandchildren and great grandchildren at the home of Mr. and Mrs. McDougall, who were the recipients of congratulations from many friends and were presented with a purse of gold. Mr. and Mrs. McDougall were born in Lanark county, Ontario, and were married in the town of Carleton Place in 1861. The family consisted of three sons and two daughters, all of whom are living, with the exception of the eldest daughter, Mary (Mrs. Duncan), who died in 1898. The other members of the family are: D. 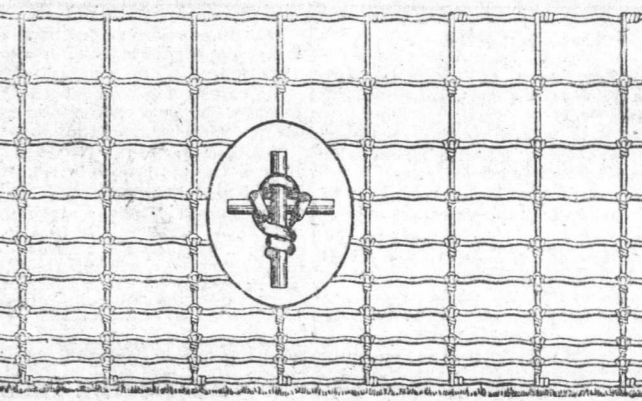

This is a change from previous years and allows the High School to complete the week which formerly was broken by the examination. The examination of entrance to Model Schools will be held on the same dates, as instructions have been issued to that effect. In order to prevent that over-crowding of High Schools by the admission of ill prepared pupils, the chairmen of Entrance Boards are instructed to follow exactly the ruling of the Department, 40 per cent on each subject and a 60 per cent total for promotion. The Educational Department has issued a circular to the chairmen of the H. S. Entrance Boards, calling for a more rigid marking of the answer papers and complaining that in the past both public and high schools have been demoralized by the passing of students quite unfit for advanced work. The report of the next examination is not to be published till the Department revises the finding of the examiners, and no students below the required standard are to be passed on trial except with the approval of the Department.

A report comes from Pt. Colborne that an 18-inch garter snake was found imbedded in a large apple. This sounds very snaky indeed, but as Pt. Colborne is a license town and the above happened on the day following St. Patrick's celebration, there is a possible chance that it really did occur.
