

"The weather is depressing and many people find it impossible to sleep. All sorts f vermin, including snakes, spiders, beetles frogs and typhoon flies, become unusually active. The larger animals, such as horses, cattle and dogs, show all the signs of nervous terror that may be noticed in a very heavy thunderstorm in western lands. "There is no thunder with a typhoon, though the sound of the wind may be often mistaken for it. The air becomes very dry, and the wind blows in sudden, short and terrific squalls, lasting perhaps 6 to 10 minutes. The sky is black and threatening, and has a peculiar ominous appearance.




